TEACHERS DISCUSS WAYS AND MEANS

For Bettering Public Schools—Sessions of New Mexico Educational Association.

Santa Fe is well represented at the twenty-first annual meeting of the New Mexico Educational Association now being held at East Las Vegas. Besides Superintendent J. A. Wood and Professor W. E. Garrison the following teachers are in attendance from the local public schools: Mrs. Dora Fletcher, Miss Edith Walker, Miss Louise Schmepple, Miss Ellen P. Daniels, Miss Ella F. Miller and Miss Amelia Guterman. Superintendent of Public Instruction Hiram Hadley is also present.

The opening general session was held last evening in the assembly hall of the New Mexico Normal University. From early morning every arriving train from north and south yesterday brought delegates for the convention and by evening representatives were present from nearly every city and town of any consequence in the Territory.

At the initial session last night invocation was pronounced by Rev. H. Valkenburg, the new pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church at East Las Vegas. Attorney C. W. G. Ward, who is also city editor of the Las Vegas Optic, delivered an address which had for its subject "A Foreword."

"The Evolution of a Citizen," Mr. Ward was followed by William H. Decker, president of the New Mexico Educational Association and superintendent of the public schools of Gallup. Mr. Decker spoke on "The Evolution of a Citizen." President Robert P. Noble of the School of Mines at Socorro was the third and last speaker of the evening. The subject of his address was, "The Measure of Success." All three addresses were very interesting and warmly applauded. Before adjournment last evening the various committees to act at the meeting were announced.

The real work of the convention began at the general session this morning. The first number on the program today was an address by Superintendent of Public Instruction Hiram Hadley, who talked for about an hour on "The Educational Problem in New Mexico." It was not a set speech and he was not hampered by notes. The educational problem is familiar to him and he has his own ideas about solving it. One of them is the removing of the office of the county superintendent from politics and having the appointments made through the Territorial Board of Education.

Papers by Santa Fe Instructors.
Professor Garrison, Mrs. Fletcher and Miss Ellen Daniels were on the program at the section meetings this afternoon. Professor Garrison delivered an address at the high school section on the subject, "Why So Many First Year Pupils Leave the High Schools." At the elementary school section Mrs. Fletcher discussed "The Kindergarten and Its Progress," and Miss Daniels read a paper on "Method in Primary Reading."

The visiting delegates will be tendered a reception this evening from 8 to 9 o'clock by the teachers of "Greater Las Vegas." It will be followed by a social program which will be interspersed with music. The detailed program today was as follows:

Paper—"Efficient Supervision," A. B. Stroup, superintendent of schools of Bernalillo County, Albuquerque.
Discussion—E. P. Bradley, principal of third ward school, Albuquerque.

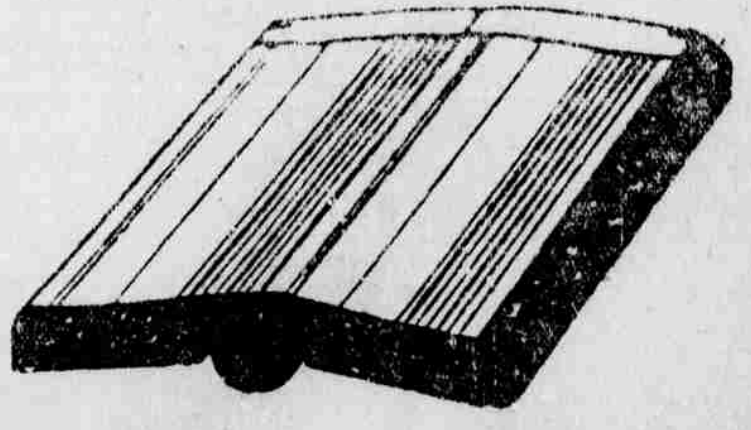
