RED TAPE AND GOOD POSTAL SERVICE.



The monthly mean pressure at Santa Fe (reduced to sea-level) was 30.03 inches; the highest was 30.56 on the 27th, and the lowest was 29.37 on the 16th; absolute range 1.19 inches. At Roswell the average pressure was 30.05 inches; the highest was 30.57 on the 27th, and the lowest was 29,29 on the 17th; absolute range 1.28 inches. Durango, Colo., had an average pressure of 30.02 inches; the highest was 30.48 on the 27th, and the lowest was 29.35 on the 17th; absolute range 1.13 inches. Amarillo, Texas, had an aver. age pressure of 30,10 inches; the highest was 30.64 on the 27th and the lowest was 29.24 on the 16th; absolute range 1.40 inches; while El Paso had an average pressure of 29.99 inches: the highest was 30.36 on the 27th, and the lowest was 29.34 on the 17th; absolute range 1.02 inches.

Temperature.

The mean monthly temperature, as determined from the records of 53 stations, having a mean altitude of about 5,000 feet, was 40.9°, or 1.0° below the normal for the month, as shown by the departures of 16 stations having data for periods of ten years or more. The highest recorded was 86° at Monument, Eddy Co., on the 10th, and at Socorro on the 5th. The lowest recorded was 12° below zero at Tres Piedras on the 20th, on which date and the 21st many stations recorded temperatures below zero. The greatest daily range was 59- at Orange and Springer. The highest monthly mean temperature was 51.4° at Lordsburg, and the lowest 30.9° at Elizabethtown and Red River, stations that are on opposite sides of the same mountain range at practically the same altitude. High temperatures were common over the Territory from the 8th to the 15th, but a few stations recorded the highest temperatures of the month on the 1st, 2d, 5th and 6th. Low temperatures prevailed on the 20th and 21st, but a few northwestern stations recorded their lowest readings on the 26th and 27th.

Precipitation.


The average precipitation for the Territory, as determined from the records of 61 stations with full monthly data, was 1.38 inches, or 0.69 of an inch above the normal for the month, as shown by the departures of 18 stations having data for periods of ten years or more. The greatest amount was 4.06 inches at Roswell, and the least 0.20 at Vermejd. A considerable area along the northern border and in the middle and upper Rio Grande valley received less than an inch of precipitation, while a small area in the southeastern part of the Territory received more than three inches! Much snow occurred with the storm of the 17th to 20th, especially over the eastern counties. The average for the Territory during the month was 7.9 inches. Precipitation occurred on an average of 5 days.

Relative Humidity.

The mean relative humidity at Santa Fe was 64 per cent, at Mesilla Park the same, at Las Yegas 51 per cent, at Roswell 78 per cent, at Durango 71 per cent, at Amarillo 78 per cent and at El Paso 62 per cent. Observations are

Sunshine and Cloudiness.

There were 15 clear days, 6 partly cloudy and 9 cloudy days during the month, considering the Territory as a whole, a record of cloudiness that is rarely equalled in New Mexico. Santa Fe had 63 per cent of the total possible sunshine, 3 days without sunshine, 10 days with 90 per cent or more and 7 days with 100 per cent. Roswell had 48 per cent of the possible sunshine, 9 days without, 5 with 90 per cent or more and 4 with 100 per cent. Durango had 75 per cent of the possible sunshine, 3 days without, 13 with 90 per cent or more and a like number with 100 per cent. Amarillo had 62 per cent of the possible sunshine, 1 day without, 8 with 90 per cent or more and 7 with 100 per cent, while El Paso had 62 per cent of the possible sunshine, 6 days without, 13 with 90 per cent of more and 12 with 100 per cent.

Wind.

The total wind movement at Santa Fe was 5,807 miles, or 8.1 miles per hour. The highest velocity was 37 miles per hour from the southeast on the 23rd. Mesilla Park recorded 5,265 miles, or 7.3 miles per hour. The highest velocity was 48 miles per hour on the 16th. Roswell recorded 3.952 miles, or 5.5 miles per hour. The highest velocity was 42 miles per hour from the northwest on the 13th. Durango recorded 3,684 miles, or 5.1 miles per hour. The highest velocity was 24 miles per hour from the west on the 16th. Amarillo registered 5,345 miles, or 7.4 miles per hour. The highest velocity was 32 miles from the northwest on the 19th. El Paso recorded 8,809 miles, or 11.5 miles per hour. The highest velocity was 50 miles per hour from the west on the 17th. The prevailing direction for the Territory was from the west.

Without a good digestion health is impossible, and lack of health is mis-


