TWO GOOD ARTICLES.

The New Mexican, always alive to the best interests of the Territory, today publishes two articles, replete with facts and figures, showing that this commonwealth is entitled to join the sisterhood of states. The articles show the wonderful progress the Territory has made during the past few years and the healthy and regular growth of all its varied industries.

EVERY DELEGATE SHOULD ATTEND.

The question of irrigation is the most important to New Mexico. As important as other industries may be to this Territory, it could spare them all rather than its irrigated lands. Yet of its area of 78,690,160 acres only 326,873 acres are under irrigation, about one two-hundred-and-fiftieth of its area; while only 203,893 acres were under cultivation, in the census year of 1900. Still, on this comparatively small patch, were raised products to the amount of \$10,800,000, exceeding the total production of the coal and all minerals, of manufactures and all other industries in the Territory.

The irrigation congress which meets at Ogden, Utah in a few days, will deliberate on ways and means to bring about this much desired increase of lands under irrigation in the West. New Mexico is as vitally, in fact more vitally interested in this convention than any other state or territory. The representatives appointed from this Territory to this congress should attend it by all means and should make their influence felt in the deliberations and in the action of that convention which will outline the plans of legislation on the subject of irrigation that will be brought to the attention of the National congress at Washington.

The time for the strict and impartial observance of the Sunday closing law in New Mexico is at hand. The handwriting on the wall is plain.

Much unrest among the Moros is reported. General Leonard Wood is the commander of the United States forces on the island of Mindanao and can prescribe for this condition of affairs, either as a military commander or as a doctor.

The New Mexican will publish tomorrow an illustrated article showing the great growth and rapid advancement of the town of Roswell, the capital of Chaves County. The New Mexican is always at work for the Territory at large and every section of it in particular.

Although the Territory of New Mexico has no institution designated as "Melon Day" to place emphasis on the importance of its melon culture, nowhere within the confines of the country, Colorado not excepted, are such fine and luscious varieties of the watermelon and cantaloupe grown, as in New Mexico. The fame of the Rocky Ford melons of Colorado is as nationally compared to the enviable position occupied by the varieties of cantaloupe grown in New Mexico.

It seems that the White Czar is becoming somewhat concerned at the universal sympathy expressed for the unfortunate Jews of Russia by intelligent people in the United States, in Great Britain, in France and in Germany and that active measures are now being taken by the Russian government for the punishment of the perpetrators, aiders, and abettors of the Kischeneff massacre. Certainly the world is advancing when foreign public opinion can make itself felt even in Russia.

The Carlsbad Argus advances the following very timely and pertinent suggestion: "While the government is casting about for desirable reservoir sites with a view to future irrigation systems, here the plant of the Pecos Irrigation company, completed and with water in the canals, which could no doubt be induced very easily to surrender to government control. The experimental stage has been passed here, and in the hands of expert operators the government could determine just what it is possible to do under an operating system. It would certainly be well to have one proved system to stand as the model for those yet to be built."

The illiteracy of immigrants that infest the shores of the United States has occupied the attention of Congress for many years. More stringent measures along the lines of the somewhat drastic Chinese exclusion law should be enacted by Congress requiring a rigid examination of all immigrants entering this country, which would result in the return to their mother country of all those who cannot read and write. Such legislation is advocated by some of the leading statesmen of the country, and it can come none too soon to keep on a high plane the moral and social conditions of the communities of our country.

The Carlsbad Current makes the following statement concerning applicants for the vacancy existing on the New Mexico Supreme bench: "The candidates for the judgeship are withdrawing one by one. Pope and Clancy have recently expressed themselves as having given up the fight. This practically leaves the field to W. C. Reid of Roswell and as he is eminently qualified for the place we would like to see him secure the appointment at once." Our Carlsbad contemporary is mistaken in these statements. Frank W. Clancy, Esq., was never a candidate for the position and Judge W. H. Pope has in no shape, manner or form withdrawn.

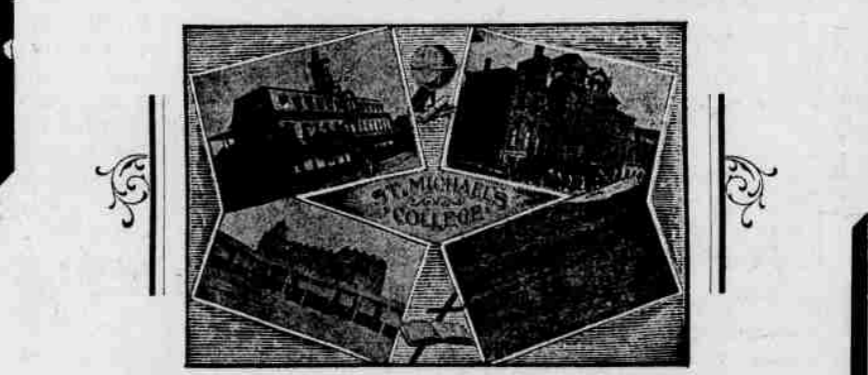

## SOCORRO COUNTY NEWS

### Cloudburst Brought a Wall of Water Down the Canon But Little Damage Done.

Special to New Mexican. Socorro, N. M., Sept. 10.—A cloudburst fell Tuesday at 1 p. m. on the Socorro mountains and brought down quite a volume of water which swelled the size of the lake near the depot. The people living south of the Magdalena branch were not flooded as they had closed up one of the railroad bridges. The flood of Tuesday demonstrated the fact that the arroyo has filled up, as the water ran evenly over a great portion of the city. Should we get a big cloudburst, like the one of July 15, there is no telling the damage it would do, the only hope for safety is that the Santa Fe people will rebuild the dam at the point of the mountain.

Janitor Brown of the School of Mines has been over the city canvassing the number of rooms for rent. From the present outlook, rooms for students will be scarce this year. Professor Keyes has surely been at work the past two months in the interest of the School of Mines.

Mrs. L. B. O'Gara will open a kindergarten school Monday next, with twenty odd pupils, she will also resume her music teaching.

John Fullerton returned home from his trip of a month and will reside in the city so that his children can attend school.

District Clerk John E. Griffith will move into the residence he purchased from Joe Wickham.

Harry M. Dougherty, Esq., returned Monday from California, where he and his family spent several weeks at the noted watering resorts of the coast.

Socorro County and its business men are losing considerable from a financial standpoint on account of having no district judge. The county has passed four terms without holding court.

The market is overstocked with peaches and pears.

### WILL SOON RESUME.

#### Shut Down of Cerrillos Smelter About at an End—Plenty of Work Ahead.

R. B. Thomas and W. A. Brown of Cerrillos are in the city looking after matters that require their attention. In speaking of the affairs at the smelter Mr. Thomas said that the shut down occasioned by the burning out of the water jacket would soon be at an end and the indications are that the smelter will be in operation in about ten days. The shut down has existed for about thirty days and the delay in the resumption of the work has been due to the trouble experienced in securing the material for repairs and this had to be gotten from Pittsburgh.

In the employ of the smelter now there are two or more men and there is plenty of work ahead. The mines are running full capacity and there are about 300 men on the pay rolls. The concentrating plant at Hanover is giving 75 men employment at present and is shipping enough copper concentrates to keep the smelter going.

## OFFICIAL MATTERS.

### Colfax Assessment Rolls.

Territorial Auditor Sargent has received the assessment rolls of Colfax County for 1903. The following are the figures given: 29,209 acres of agricultural lands assessed at \$146,005, and the improvements of same at \$63,460; grazing lands, 1,486,890 acres at \$149,166, and the improvements at \$79,285. There are 2,975 town lots valued at \$131,795 and the improvements at \$314,215. There are 77 miles of telegraph and telephone lines and the assessed valuation of the same is \$4,392 while the 108 miles of railroad, rolling stock, machinery, etc., are assessed at \$523,373. There is a valuation of \$151,850 put on the surface improvements and net mines of the county and output of the mills \$1,500. In the county there are 1,480 horses valued at \$11,700; 45 mules at \$1,300; 33,162 head of cattle at \$438,022; 87,343 sheep at \$87,343; and the total valuation of vehicles of all kinds, and harness and saddles is \$5,025. The assessed valuation of the merchandise is \$101,865. There is a valuation of \$3,575, given for the farming implements and that of \$2,200 for the fixtures of the stores and other places of business. There is \$5,000 in money and the valuation of jewelry, etc., is put at \$2,450, while the household furniture is valued at \$109,200. The total assessed value of all kinds of property is \$2,981,411, and the exemptions and reductions amount to \$140,400, leaving the valuation for taxable purposes \$2,841,011.

15c 25c, 30c, 35c, Ax Handles at GOEBEL'S.

The Capital City band will give a concert in the plaza at 7:30 this evening.

J. S. Candelario has received a fresh stock of Apache baskets and other Indian goods.

A new brick pavement is being laid in front of the Lowitzki place of business on San Francisco street.

A fine eagle is attracting much attention at the store of J. S. Candelario on San Francisco street.

Santa Fe Lodge No. 2, I. O. O. F., will meet in regular weekly session at 7:30 this evening at Odd Fellows' hall.

There are electricians at work extending the wires and improving the system of lights in the Loretto convent.

The official proceedings of the board of county commissioners of Santa Fe County are published in the New Mexican today.

If you have any clean cotton rags that are suitable for cleaning machinery, bring them to the New Mexican office and receive cash for same.

Considerable quantities of salt are now being brought into the city from the lakes along the line of the Santa Fe Central and is disposed of to the merchants of the city.

The penitentiary authorities expect to finish the burning of a large kiln of brick Monday. So far everything connected with the matter has gone very successfully and smoothly.

The regular monthly board of trade meeting will be held this evening at 8 at the rooms of that body. Important business will be brought before the meeting and a full attendance of members is requested.

There are quite a number of the Jicarilla Apaches in the city, having been summoned as witnesses in a case now before the United States court. Some of them returned to the reservation this morning.

The one-fare round-trip rate on the Santa Fe Central to Alamogordo offers an opportunity to the people of this city to take a cheap trip over the new road and to spend a few days in the beautiful Otero County town.

The Santa Fe Mechanics have issued a challenge to the Santa Fe Centrals to play the third and deciding game of the series. The Mechanics ask for a game next Sunday and that it be played on the grounds of St. Michael's college.

The predictions are for colder weather tonight and Saturday. The maximum temperature yesterday was 75 degrees at 2:10 p. m., and the minimum was 44 degrees at 5:45 a. m. The temperature at 6 o'clock this morning was 55 degrees.

For the annual meeting of the grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias at Alamogordo on September 16 and 17, the Santa Fe Central will sell tickets at one fare, \$11.35, for the round trip. Tickets on sale September 14, 15 and 16, return limit, September 21.

City Clerk Facundo Ortiz says that there are a number of buildings being erected within the city limits for which permits have not been procured and that he will allow the erection of no buildings unless the law has been complied with.

The sudden illness of a man in the plaza this morning gave rise to the report that a person had fallen dead. The man was a native and was seen to suddenly fall from one of the benches. He was soon restored to consciousness and was all right in the course of an hour or two.

From this morning on the Denver & Rio Grande passenger train will leave at 10 o'clock instead of 9 o'clock, so as to make connections with the Santa Fe Central train from Torrance, which in turn makes connections at Torrance with the El Paso & North-eastern train from El Paso.

The work of varnishing and repainting the wood and iron work of the stairs in the Territorial capitol building is progressing rapidly and the improvement is very noticeable. The laying of the floor in the basement is delayed owing to the inability to get the necessary supply of bricks for the work.

The city authorities should take immediate steps to have a vitrified brick sidewalk constructed in front of the Cienega property on Palace and Washington avenues. The rotten board sidewalk in these localities is in a dangerous and very bad condition and complaints concerning it are heard often and are well founded.

C. H. Yontz, who has been in the jewelry business in Cerrillos for some years, has concluded to move to Santa Fe and while in this city yesterday rented a location where he will open a jewelry establishment. The store rented by him is situated in the Lamy property on the southeast corner of the plaza and was formerly occupied by the Santa Fe Gold and Filigree Jewelry Manufacturing company.

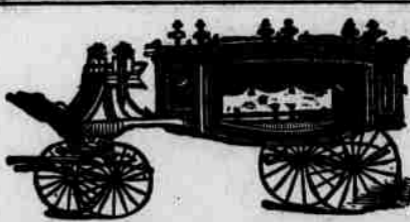
