Beavers and New Haven, Conn., Sept. 11-United August W. Machen, former postoffice lumbia Supply company of New York: and Eugene D. Scheble, a dentist of Toledo, Ohio, interested in he firm of Maybury & Ellis, Detroit.

All are indicted for conspiracy to defraud the United States. Huntington, McGeihan and Machen are indicted for conspiracy to commit bribery. Scheble and Machen for the same, McGiehan and Huntington for bribery, and Machen for accepting a bribe.

Beaver's counsel gave notice they would insist upon the government producing its complete evidence against the defendant. The complaint against Beavers is based on the Washington indictment.

The charges against August W. Machen, general superintendent of the company, with Beavers and James W. Erwin, did conspire with divers other persons to defraud the United States by giving the Postal Device and Improvement company an exclusive opportunity for furnishing the free delivery service certain supplies at unreasonable and exorbitant prices. The complaint further charges that the articles so secured were 100 indicated devices and that Machen concealed from all other persons desirous of furnishing such supplies an opportunity to compete in the sale of same. It is others all the unlawful gain accruing from this conspiracy.





Colfax Assessment Rolls.

Territorial Auditor Sargent has re ceived the assessment rolls of Colfax County for 1903. The following are the figures given: 29,209 acres of agricultural lands assessed at \$146,005. and the improvements of same at \$63, 460; grazing lands, 1,486,890 acres at \$449,166, and the improvements at \$79,285. There are 2,975 town lots alued at \$131,795 and the improve nents at \$314,215. There are 77 miles of telegraph and telephone lines and the assessed valuation of the same is \$4,392 while the 108 miles of railroad rolling stock, machinery, etc., are assessed at \$523,373. There is a valuation of \$151,850 put on the surface improvements and net mines of the county and output of the mills \$1,500 In the county there are 1,480 horses valued at \$11,700; 45 mules at \$1,300; 343 sheep at \$87,343; and the total valuation of vehicles of all kinds, and harness and saddles is \$5,025. The assessed valuation of the merchandise is \$101,865. There is a valuation of \$3,575, given for the farming implements and that of \$2,200 for the fixtures of the stores and other places of business. There is \$5,000 in money and the valuation of jewelry, etc., is put at \$2,450, while the household furniture is valued at \$100,200. 





NEW MEXICO STATEHOOD

Nearly Every President in Fifty Years Has Declared for Admission of Territory.

STEADY ADVANCEMENT

The Commonwealth Has Made Wonderful Progress During the Past Few Years.

In the course of the past fifty years the House of Representatives of the United States has repeatedly declared by small and large majorities that New Mexico by right and fitness should be a state. The United States Senate noted for its deliberation and conservativeness has put itself on record to the same effect, and nearly every President since New Mexico has become part and parcel of the United place among the family of states but that this is a privilege and a right of the great political parties have deplatforms and but less than a year ago he House of Representatives by a large majority passed an enabling act. More than fifty years ago, the reaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo was signed by duly authorized plenipotentiaries of the United States and of Mexico. This treaty contains a clause that the residents of the acquired territory should be given all the privileges and rights of American citizenship if they swore allegiance and demonstrated their fitness for such citizenship. While this promise was conditional, yet it was implied and understood by the plenipotentiaries, that the acquired territory would soon after annexation be admitted as a state or as several states. As far as California is concerned this pledge was speedily redeemed although California had less population, was more isolated and had a greater per cent of Spanish speakfar more lawless and less fit for state. sale by all druggists. hood than was New Mexico even at that date. It is true, that gold had been discovered in California in 1848 but gold had been mined successfully in New Mexico for several centuries before that.

Since California was admitted to statehood, New Mexico has multiplied its population more than four times and its wealth many times more. It has developed in part its wonderful resources and has demonstrated that its growth and prosperity are permanent and give unquestioned promise of still greater increase than the past has shown. In fact, its boundary lines do not separate one kind of country or one kind of people from another and better class of country or better people, even though the neighboring commonwealth of Texas and Coloraco enjoy and have enjoyed for many years the boon of statehood.

New Mexico in 1900 had a population of more than 195,000 according to the census, which was more than that of Delaware, of Idaho, more than twice the population of Wyoming and more than four times the population of Nevada, all of them states. But since then owing to the phenomenal extension of railroads, the growth of population has been phenomenal. Today the Territory has 288,-000 people and by the next census it will have more than enough to form two congressional districts. It is certainly an anomaly, that if a large population is deemed necessary for admission to statehood, that Indiana, Illinois and many other commonwealths were admitted with less than onefourth the population that New Mexico possesses today. The character of the population has been drawn into question. As a matter of fact, the population does not differ from that of the states bordering on New Mexico. It is certain that the population of that part of Colorado and of Texas immediately adjoining New Mexico was far less fitted for the privileges, duties and rights of citizenship when it was thrust upon them, than are the people of New Mexico today. Of the present population of 288,000, fully 144,000 are natives of the states or their children, while the remainder are of Latin or mixed stock, as loyal,


