THE WOMAN'S INFLUENCE.

At the meeting of the Federation of Women's Clubs now being held in this city some of the really practical things of the day are being taken up and the program is one of very great interest.

It is education that is taking up the attention of the women at the opening of the regular session and the discussion is of very great interest and must be of genuine value.
