ROUSING STATEHOOD MEETING AT ALBUQUERQUE.
 Governor Mills, O. A. Larrazolo, E. A. Mann and Isaac Barth, Representing Both Parties

Albuquerque, N. M., Dec. 30.—That the question of the adoption of the present constitution is simply a question of statehood or no statehood; that the constitution is as fair and as satisfactory as any 100 men in New Mexico could draft; that any plan for a second convention is useless and politics has no place in the discussion of the organic act was brought out eloquently and convincingly last night in Elks' theater, before a large enthusiastic audience by Governor William J. Mills, O. A. Larrazolo of Las Vegas, Isaac Barth and Judge Edward A. Mann in this city.

The meeting marked the opening of the vigorous campaign for the ratification of the constitution of New Mexico at the polls on January 21, next. It was a significant meeting in many ways. In the first place, picked leaders of both parties addressed a non-partisan audience on a non-partisan platform. In the second place, there was a rampant enthusiasm which shows at least that Albuquerque and Bernalillo county are in favor of statehood. In the third place, a discussion of the constitution from a business standpoint appealed strongly to a crowd composed largely of plain business men who have no interest in the politics of the situation; only an interest in being a state and the prosperity and business it will bring.

The crowd began to pour into the theater early in the evening and by the time the band had ceased playing and the gathering was called to order, the big building was packed. On the stage were seated representative business and professional men of both parties whose mere presence there was an eloquent testimonial of their attitude toward statehood.

The organization of a statehood league and the beginning of active organized effort to make the majority for the constitution as nearly unanimous as possible took place under most auspicious circumstances and there is no doubt that Albuquerque will have the honor of having started the movement which will finally lead to a decisive victory for the organic act at the polls and the consequent assurances that we shall enter the union as a state this winter.

The speakers were not unanimous that the constitution is "perfect." Few have made that assertion. They were agreed however, and convinced their auditors that the act, as framed, is as nearly satisfactory to the mass of the people as any document could be when drawn up by 100 delegates representing all classes of people and all shades of thought. They were agreed, Republican and Democrat alike, that it would be a sheer impossibility to reconvene the delectable and improve on the constitution, even were money provided for holding a second convention.

Governor Mills, who was the first speaker on the program presented his brief for the constitution in a masterly and judicial manner bringing to his criticism the benefit of a long experience on the bench and as chief executive of New Mexico. Governor Mills has studied the constitution thoroughly, looks at its flaws and its merits impartially and fairly, and was eloquent in his declaration that it is as good as framed by any of the states within recent years. Ignatius Stauffer.—Ignatius Stauffer, who had resided in Grant county for the past 25 years, was stricken with heart failure at his room in Silver City, dying almost instantly. Deceased was born in Pennsylvania and was aged 65 years. He was a single man and was formerly engaged in the cattle business in the vicinity of White Signal. Except two half-brothers living on the Gila he had no near relatives. He was a Catholic.

and one of the most effective orators in New Mexico, was at his best and his appeal to cast off the shackles of territorialism and accept the "main chance" for statehood was a powerful one. Judge Mann, another jurist of experience, a thinker and able advocate, pointed out the merits of the constitution in his usual effective forcible and at times picturesque style and like the other speakers was greeted with thunderous applause.


The frankness and sincerity of Attorney Isaac Barth made his address a telling one. In the first place, Mr. Barth made it plain that he was speaking, not as chairman of the Democratic central committee of Bernalillo county, but as Isaac Barth, citizen.

Mr. Barth said he was uncompromisingly in favor of statehood and believed that the only chance for immediate admission lies in the ratification of the constitution by a big majority.

"It would be useless," said Mr. Barth, "to try to send the same delegates back and hold another convention for the reason that they would not know definitely why the act was rejected or what changes to make."

Mr. Barth deplored the omission of the initiative from the constitution but recognized the fact that it is impossible to substitute the will of the minority for the majority. "I often write a brief myself which I re-write next day," said the attorney, "and I could not expect 100 men to write a constitution which would suit me in every detail." Mr. Barth took occasion to pay his respects vigorously to the prohibitionists. He said he did not question the motives of his fellow Democrats who opposed the constitution but he did condemn the obstructive tactics of the prohibitionists who, constituting a minority, were working for the defeat of statehood because the constitution does not contain statewide prohibition, although its advocates will have every opportunity to present their case before a state legislature.

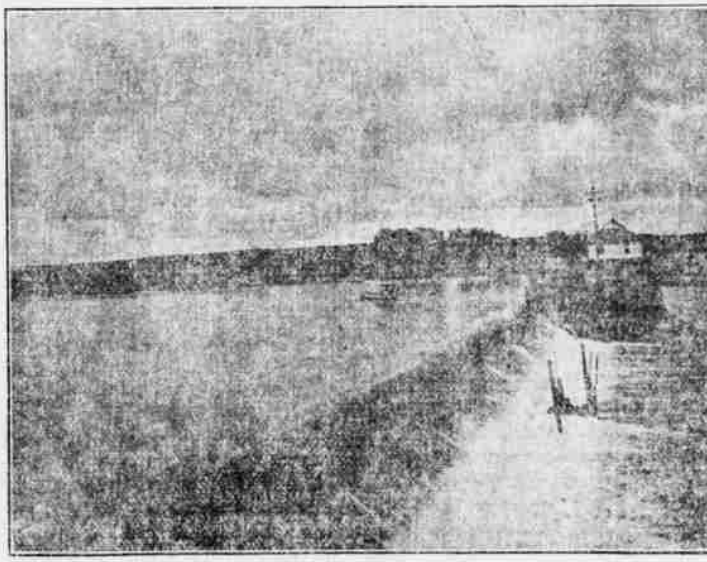

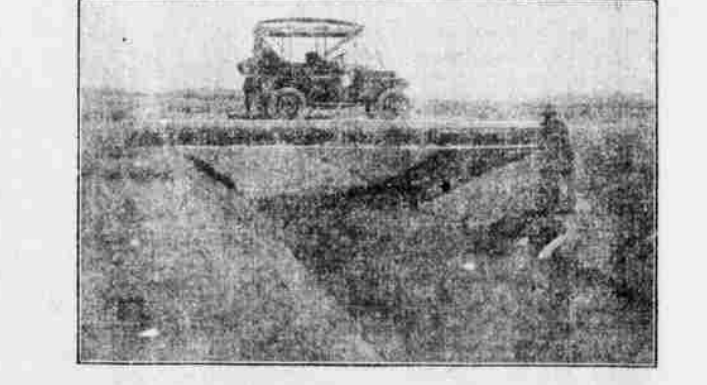

ALBUQUERQUE ONCE MORE HAS REPUBLICAN MAYOR.

Dr. John W. Elder Succeeds Felix H. Lester After a Recount of Ballots Cast Last Spring.

Albuquerque, N. M., Dec. 30.—Dr. John W. Elder is mayor of Albuquerque. Following the decision in the district court yesterday morning in the mayoralty election last April...

Briefly Mr. Lester stated to the council the purpose of the meeting was to determine...

"Gentlemen, as you are doubtless all aware, Mr. Elder, the Republican candidate for mayor at the last election, has been declared entitled to the office...

"And before turning the office to Dr. Elder, I wish to thank all you gentlemen for the courtesy, consideration and assistance which you have extended to me during my term...

Before Dr. Elder made any statement, Dr. J. H. Wroth secured the floor and paid a high compliment to Mr. Lester and his work as mayor.

Dr. Wroth said in part: "Mr. Mayor and gentlemen of the council: I desire on behalf of the council and of myself, to express at this time our appreciation of the work that has been done by our retiring Mayor, Mr. Lester...

you, Mr. Mayor and gentlemen of the council, I make a motion that there be spread on the records of the council, a resolution indicating our respect and appreciation for the uniform and successful work done by Mr. Lester during his term of office."

Mr. Lester, seated on the bench reserved for the common geese, arose and simply said, "I thank you Dr. Wroth."

Mayor Elder then put Dr. Wroth's motion before the council and it carried unanimously. The new mayor then addressed the council briefly, saying that he was much in the same position as the girl to whom a young man had proposed marriage.

"It's all so sudden and unexpected," said Mayor Elder, "that I do not know exactly what to say. But I will say, however, that in taking up the office, I wish to thank the retiring mayor for his kindly sentiment toward me, and hope that our relations will be entirely agreeable and satisfactory. I have nothing to put before you at the present time in a business way and anything which may occur before the next meeting will be presented at that time for your consideration."

Dr. Wroth made a motion that the next meeting of the council be held on Tuesday, January 3, 1911, instead of Monday, January 2, which is to be observed generally as a holiday.

A motion to adjourn followed and Mayor, former mayor and aldermen broke up into little groups, the various city officials and spectators present joining in. The scene was rather a solemn one, being a little different from any other which has been enacted in Albuquerque since the organization of the town as a city.

The history of the mayoralty contest is well known to almost every voter in Albuquerque and is equally familiar, if not more so, to yomen than the men. Dr. Elder was nominated for mayor on the Republican ticket and Mr. Lester, to succeed himself, on the Democratic ticket, last March.

A vigorous campaign was conducted, being as indicated by the returns from the various wards, the closest campaign in the history of the city. The returns, counted on election night, April 3, last, showed that Dr. Elder had received 1,019 votes and Mr. Lester, 1,018. Through his attorney, Summers Burkhart, Mr. Lester began legal proceedings to contest the election. Suit was filed against the judges and clerks of the election in the second and third wards, it being alleged that certain votes cast for Lester under socialist tickets, had not been counted. An injunction was issued prohibiting City Clerk McManus from issuing a certificate of election until the matter was finally determined.

Mr. Burkhart asked for a writ of mandamus to compel the recount of the votes in the second and third wards. Attorney E. A. Mann, counsel for Elder, fought the matter out in the lower court, refusing to accede to the proposition made by Burkhart that the votes be recounted. Losing in the lower court, Mr. Mann took the case to the supreme court, where the decision was reversed on a technicality. Before the case was again taken up in the district court, Mr. Burkhart and Mr. Mann agreed to a recount of all the ballot boxes used in the election.

Yesterday morning Judge Mann, representing Elder and Mr. Burkhart, representing Lester, appeared before Judge Ira A. Abbott, in the district court and entered into a stipulation that all the boxes be opened in the presence of the court and the votes counted there and then by two tellers, P. F. McManus and T. K. D. Maddison. Mr. Burkhart and Mr. Mann assisted in the recount.

gained two votes in the third ward, which had not been previously counted either for him or for his opponent. In the fourth ward Lester gained one vote. With each candidate gaining three votes as the result of the recount, Lester's total was boosted from 1018 to 1021 and Elder's total from 1019 to 1022. The only case in which the tellers appealed to Judge Abbott, sitting as a referee, for a decision was when a ballot was taken from the first ward ballot box which was quite a novelty. The ballot was a Democratic one, but the names of all Democratic candidates were scratched off, with the exception of John B. McManus, candidate for city clerk. The pencil mark over Lester's name, however, seemed to have been gone over a second time with an eraser. The court ruled that the ballot should be cast into exterior darkness and not considered with reference to the mayoralty count. The tellers decided that the man who cast the ballot was "sore," at every candidate on the Republican, Democratic and socialist tickets, with the

exception of McManus. In the third ward, two blank votes cast for mayor, were declared illegal. In the fourth ward a vote on a Democratic ballot, for Paul Teutsch for mayor, was discarded, Teutsch not being a candidate for that office.

The final decision in the mayoralty case yesterday ends a matter which has been in the courts for over eight months, and over which quite a bit of discussion has been waged by friends of the two candidates for the office. The seating of the Republican candidate is quite probably, will not affect the government of the city in a great measure. The Democrats hold a majority in the council, Aldermen Auge, Reidy, Conroy, Coen, Isherwood, and Wroth being of that political faith, while Aldermen Clarke and Thomas are Republicans.

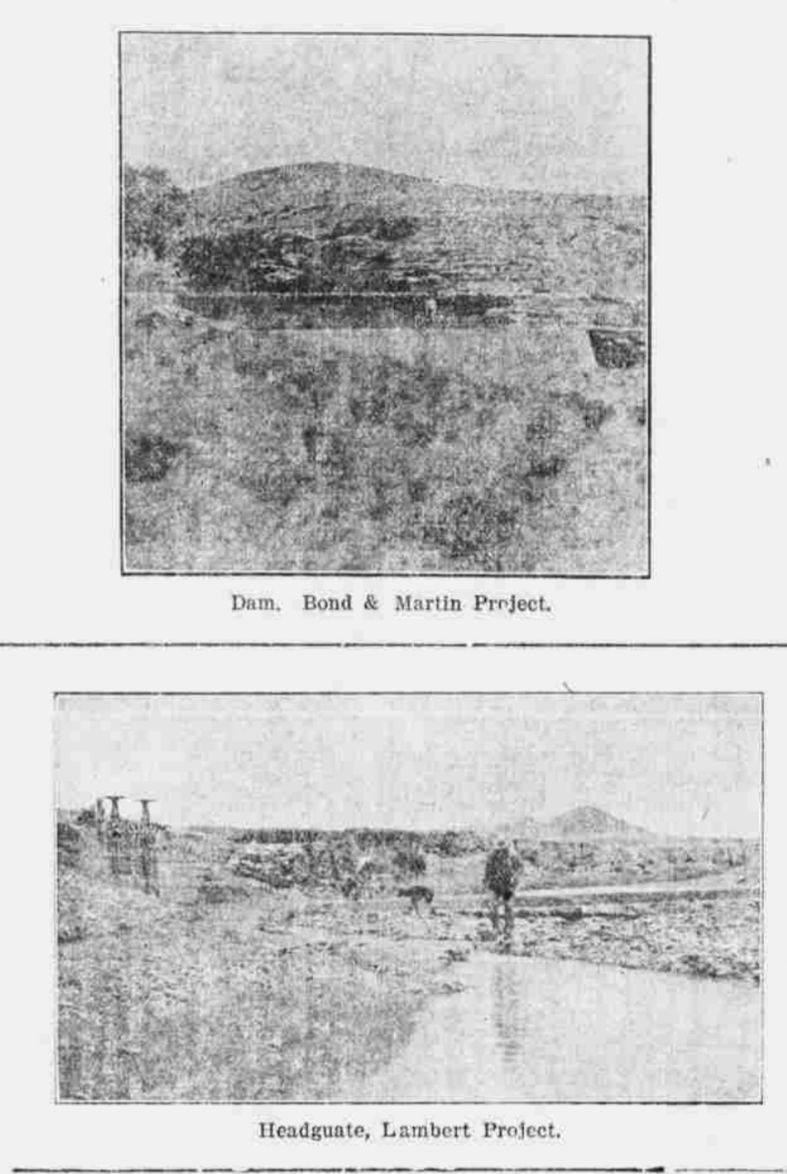
