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E. P. & S. W. to Build from Deming

Judge Norman W. Haire, of Houghton, Mich., and J. E. Saint, of Albuquerque, who returned to Albuquerque yesterday morning from Silver City, having completed the incorporation of the big Mangus Copper company, brought with them the news of the biggest mining deal in the history of New Mexico, closed Friday.

By this transaction Phelps, Dodge & Company, of New York, owners of the greatest copper producing mines in Southern Arizona and owners of the El Paso & Southwestern railroad, become the owners of the Burro Mountain Mining company's properties in the Burro Mountains, twelve miles southwest of Silver City, the largest copper property in New Mexico, and destined, mining experts say, to be one of the world's great producers.

Phelps, Dodge & Company have held a minority interest in the Burro Mountain company for some time, the property

having been held as a close corporation in which Alfred and Nathan Leopold, of Chicago, held the control, or about 65 per cent. The Leopolds have sold their entire interest in the mine, together with their stock, to the Phelps, Dodge company. Messrs. Haire and Saint were not in a position to say what price was paid for the stock, but advices received by the Morning Journal last night from Silver City and from the east indicate that upon the basis at which this 65 per cent of the stock was purchased, the mine is worth \$2,340,000.

The Burro Mountain property has for a long time been recognized as one of the great copper properties of the country and the price for which Phelps, Dodge & Company secure control of the property is the largest price ever paid for a mining property in the territory. The size of the price, however, is not the most important feature of

this deal, as it relates to the mining industry of New Mexico.

While no statement has been given out to indicate that the action is contemplated, it is generally believed in Silver City that Phelps, Dodge & Company will soon build an extension of the El Paso & Southwestern railroad into the Burro Mountain mining district. The Southwestern already has a branch line reaching to Deming. The extension would not be a very large one and it is confidently expected that it will be made. This will result not only in greatly hastening the development of the Burro Mountain company's property, but of the Chemung, another great property adjoining it, and of the recently incorporated Magnus property, which lies right in the heart of the district, adjoining both the Burro Mountain and the Chemung holdings.—Albuquerque Journal.

Will Go into Grape Culture

Prof. Ploutarchos Flettoides, of the Island of Samos, Turkey, and Heras Sotires, also a Turk, who were brought to New Mexico some two months ago, following correspondence with the bureau of immigration at Albuquerque, have purchased the farm of E. Delegate Andrew's Good Work.

Ever since Delegate W. H. Andrews visited us some weeks ago he has been actively urging the Reclamation Service Bureau and other departments of the Government to detail an engineer to Luna county for the purpose of investigating the character of our underflow. Nothing is more vitally important to this community than that it should know beyond doubt as to the strength of our water supply, and while this can only be determined absolutely by use, experiments conducted by skilled men employed in this kind of work by the U. S. Government can determine the reliability of this underflow beyond any reasonable doubt, and the seal of their approval would, in Mr. Andrew's judgment, go a long way toward establishing the faith of new comers in the abundance of this water supply.

In this connection one of our local townsmen has been actively in correspondence with Mr. Andrews and is in receipt of the two letters following. While these do not give assurance of an early visit by an expert, they show Mr. Andrew's interest and give us reason to believe that he will be ultimately successful:

Albuquerque, N. M., Oct. 4, 1909.

Hon. H. C. Rizer, Acting Director, U. S. Geological Survey, Washington, D. C.

My Dear Mr. Rizer: Your letter of October first, in which you state Mr. O. E. Meinzer cannot stop at Deming for the reason that he left Utah prior to receiving the Director's letter instructing him to stop at Deming, received.

I very much regret this as the people at Deming are wild over the fact of having a geologist sent from your Department. I notice what you say about limited appropriations.

Can't you possibly send some one there, as it would be of great benefit to those people? There are a number of people waiting to go ahead and put in irrigation plants and do not like to do it until the Government first passes upon the water supply.

Thanking you in advance for anything you may be able to do for the relief of the people, I remain,

The first snow has struck New Mexico. The Panhandle country also got a covering of the beautiful.

The awful drouth in Missouri, Arkansas and Oklahoma, has at last been broken by a good rain. The drouth at Fayetteville, Ark., our old home, was so severe that the city water supply gave out. It was about the driest dry spell that state ever experienced.

Mr. Taft's Visit at El Paso.

Throughout our nation's history it has been the rule that our Presidents have never left American soil. Mr. Roosevelt visited Niagara Canal after that strip of territory had been ceded to the United States government, but he was transported on an American man-of-war, which, wherever it may sail, is theoretically American soil.

In the past our territory has entertained great men and Princes of royal blood from abroad; but except for a visit of Don Pedro to the United States in 1876, no ruler of a great nation has ever visited our country. The occasion of Mr. Taft's visit to El Paso will therefore be unique in our country's history in two particulars. At that time a ruling president during his term of office will actually set foot on foreign soil, and he will on the same date entertain President Diaz in El Paso. While the visit of Mr. Taft to any city will for the moment attract the world's attention to that city, the incident of the meeting of the presidents of these two great republics, and the exchange of courtesies, will be striking in its character and will attract an immense amount of attention to that city. In coming years we will tell our children of the fact of our participation in this event and no one can afford not to have been a party to it.

It is a favorite hobby of an American to say that all men are equal; but, regardless of party, a man who is great enough and good enough to be elected the Chief Executive of a nation of 80,000,000 of people, is good to look upon; and we should see President Taft and our children should see President Taft on this occasion and swell the throngs of patriotic Americans, who pay tribute to him, and through him to the institutions for which he stands, and which are dear to us.
