CRONJE'S SURRENDER.

Its Effect On The Continuance Of The War.

While it would be idle to question the subjective importance of Lord Roberts' victory in forcing the surrender of Gen. Cronje and his army at Paardeberg, it would be rash to estimate hastily the effect which the achievement may have in contributing toward future British success. The delay caused to Roberts' campaign by the siege of the Boer position may more than compensate the allied burghers for the loss of Cronje and his command.

It is possible that the captured Boer leader may have foreseen and accepted the result of his forlorn hope fight when he entrenched his little force in the bed of Modder river. His remarkably brave defence of this untenable stronghold for nearly two weeks, against odds of ten to one, was not, perhaps, wholly due to a spirit of desperate stubbornness. Cronje's previous record in warfare shows him to be a cautious strategist as well as a valorous fighter. His conduct in facing about and confronting the victorious British 40,000 with his own retreating column of 4,000, instead of abandoning artillery and baggage and continuing his fight, must not be unqualifiedly accepted as out of keeping with this record.

Before passing judgment it would be well to consider all the circumstances and possibilities of the Boer situation. When Gen. Roberts succeeded so brilliantly in turning the army which had defeated Lord Methuen's force, and had started Gen. French with a flying column to the relief of Kimberley, Cronje's army was left without an immediate occupation. It also stood in imminent danger of being caught between the armies of Roberts and Methuen.

No time was lost by the Boer leader in trying to avoid the latter contingency. By a rapid night march he passed his forces safely between French's rear guard and Roberts' van. Then came the discovery of his retreat followed promptly by a rapid pursuit by the British. For several days Gens. Kitchener and Kelly-Kenny were held in check by the Boer rear guard before Cronje finally entrenched and was surrounded.

In the meantime the dispatches told of Boer troops being hurried from all directions toward Bloemfontein, the capital of Orange Free State. These reports still continue and no doubt they are true. The deduction is that while Cronje, at the risk of comparatively small loss in the event of total defeat, held back the invading army, the burghers were massing all their available strength to meet Lord Roberts when his legions were finally turned loose upon Bloemfontein. Time was everything to the defenders of the Free State capital, and the sacrifice of Cronje and his little command may have been what the old adage calls "reasting a sprat to catch a mackerel."

There is, besides, the possibility that Cronje's entire army was not captured. When he faced Methuen the Boer general was credited with having a force of from 15,000 to 20,000. The bulk of these may now be near Bloemfontein, having continued their march when Cronje elected to remain behind and fight. It is significant, too, that but four guns were found in possession of the troops taken at Paardeberg. —Denver Republican.

CAPITAN CORRESPONDENCE.

Capitan, New Mexico, March 6 1900.

Editor EAGLE:
The expected big day, consequent upon the public opening of the new town, has come and gone, and from most every standpoint it was a "fizzle." Only about one dozen lots were sold, and several of those were purchased by members of the town company. The day's sales were a disappointment, even to outsiders, who expected to see a large crowd present. The special train and reduced fare only brought four intending purchasers from El Paso and only one of these invested. Several things combined serve to check the growth of the new town:

First:—The coal company want to (and have) so arranged it that they will get every cent the miners earn, by the "script method," they having every branch of business represented. Leaving the outsider to take what they do not want, which will be precious little.

Second:—The location of the townsite at the junction of Oso and McGow canons, is a veritable water trap and overflows every season and with most every rain in the mountains. From a sanitary standpoint the location could not be worse in New Mexico.

Third:—The water is rank and not suitable for even stock to drink and the smell of it would run a polecat out of a hen house on a dark night.

Fourth:—The new townsite is located more than a mile from the nearest coal mines and practically impassable barriers are placed between the new town and the mines. The sale of liquors are prohibited in the new town, the company reserving that right for themselves, and as they already have a saloon located near the mines, it is natural to suppose that a majority of the miners will go where they can get at least a glass of beer to improve the taste in their month after drinking salado albaque waters all day. The situation reminds one of the story of Lazarus, the rich man and the beggarly gulf.

Fifth:—The contracts for deeds given by the company are drawn on "the hog plan," with everything in favor of the purchaser of a town lot is do most everything where he can make any money, that right reserved for themselves. What circumstances might have fairly good town in Lincoln been killed a burning by the greed of a monopoly that has divided the county into a few hands. A large per cent of the miners here are union men and a charter has been applied for to organize a union at Capitan.

The steps in No. 4 has come up against a solid stone wall but it is probable it will not be far through it and the vein will be caught on the other side of the dyke, but may be it will prove as No. 2 has, that the coal is too far on the opposite side to find it. The original No. 4 has been abandoned and a new slope has been christened No. 2.

The post office called Gray will soon be a thing of the past. The office will be moved to the new town and called Capitan. The coal camp will be called North Capitan. The two towns are about two miles apart.

The Baptists have organized a church here and services will be held each month.

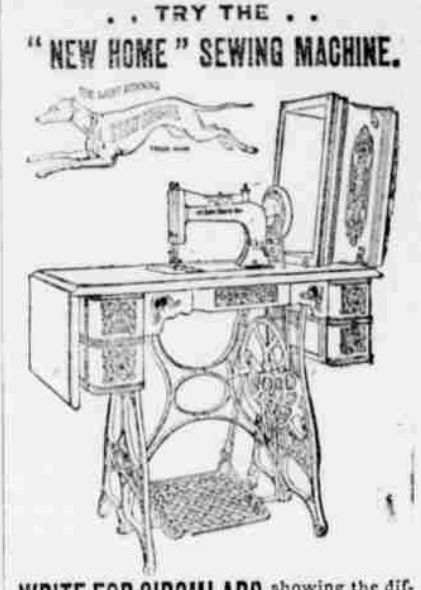

Going Out of the Sheep Business.

Spence Bros., the wealthiest sheep men in this part of New Mexico, are selling off their sheep with the view of going out of the business altogether. They sold 30,000 head some time ago, and have this week negotiated a sale with buyers to close out the remaining ten or twelve thousand head. Everything has been agreed on provided the sheep come up to the average of the buyers' estimate, of which there is little doubt, as the sheep have been graded up for several years.

The EAGLE has not learned the price agreed on, neither do we know whether the two ranches on which the sheep have been ranging are included in the deal.

PASSED THE HOUSE.
 Had a Majority of Eleven.

Washington, Feb. 28.—The last day of the struggle over the Porto Rican tariff bill opened in the house with nearly every member in his seat, and a large attendance in the galleries: Leaders were actively engaged in rallying their forces and making computations upon the final vote to be taken under the order for 3 o'clock. Mr. Underwood (Ala.) democratic whip, said the result would be very close, and would turn upon the votes of two or three democrats. Tawney, republican whip, said the bill would have votes to spare. The clerk began reading the bill for amendment under the five minute rule. When section three was reached Payne, chairman of the ways and means committee, offered a substitute fixing the duties at 15 per cent. Berry (Ky.) said that the amendment proposed was petty, instead of grand larceny of the people of Porto Rico.

Payne explained that the substitute reduced the duty from 25 to 15 per cent and also removed some confusion regarding double taxation. The amended bill would raise about \$1,250,000 a year. The bill was opposed in short speeches by DeArmond, (Mo.) Fitzgerald (Mass.) Otey (Va. and defended by Grow, (Pa.) Graff (Ill.) Bromwell, (O.) who hitherto had opposed the measure, and Grosvenor, (O.) The Payne amendment was adopted without division.

The substitute for the Porto Rican bill was defeated, 159 yeas to 175 nays. This indicates the passage of the bill. Richardson (Tenn.) moved to recommit the bill. The motion to recommit the Porto Rican bill to the ways and means committee was lost, 162 to 172.

Payne offered the additional section agreed on by the republicans, providing that the act shall not continue in force after March 1 next. Agreed to without division. Payne offered a preamble to the bill, reciting the serious condition of affairs in the island. Adopted on a rising vote, 163 to 151.

Cummings (N. Y.) described how he believed it to be the duty of every man in a great crisis to rise above party and support the government as he had done during the Spanish war. "I believe now we should follow the lead of the president," said he emphatically, "and I will vote for this bill." The republicans arose en masse and cheered, while the democrats sat dazed. Cummings stood with his arms upraised, until republican applause ceased. "I will vote for this bill," he continued, ad-

ressing the republican side, "provided it is amended in accordance with the advice of the president for absolute free trade with Porto Rico." The democrats made the rafters ring with cheers. McCall (Miss.) offered a substitute bill for trade with Porto Rico, originally introduced by Payne. Yeas and nays were ordered. The republicans who voted for the adoption of the substitute were Heatwole, (Minn.) Littlefield, (Me.) Lorimer, (Ill.) McCall, (Mass.) Crumacker, (Ind.) Democrats who voted with the republicans against the substitute were Davy and Meyer, (La.) Sibley, (Pa.) Devries, (Cal.)

The Porto Rican bill passed—172 to 161.

FIGHTING IN YUCATAN.

Oaxaca, Mexico, March 3.—General Bravo's government troops made an aggressive advance against the Maya Indians in the state of Yucatan during the last few days. His army is within a few miles of Santa Cruz, the main stronghold of the rebels. An attack on this stronghold will be made early next week. Three thousand Mayas were strongly entrenched at aguada. Six hundred Mexican troops, commanded by General Bravo, drove them from the trenches. Thirty-two Indians were killed.
