ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

THE TECOLOTE LAND and LIVE STOCK COMPANY.

I, J. W. Reynolds, Secretary of the Territory of New Mexico, do hereby certify there was filed for record in this office, at 9 o'clock a.m., on the sixteenth day of December, A. D., 1902, Articles of Incorporation of The Tecolote Land and Live Stock Company. (No. 3292.), and also, that I have compared the following copy of the same, with the original thereof now on file, and declare it to be a correct transcript therefrom and of the whole thereof.

Know all men by these presents, that we, the undersigned citizens of the United States, desiring to organize an industrial corporation under and by authority of the laws of New Mexico, do hereby agree to and accept for ourselves, our associates and successors, the following articles of agreement:

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be "The Tecolote Land and Live Stock Company" and the principal place of business of the corporation shall be in the town of White Oaks, in Lincoln County, New Mexico.

ARTICLE II.

The objects and purposes of this corporation shall be to acquire and hold Lands ranches and to sell, lease and rent same as may or shall be provided by the by-laws of the company; Such lands and ranches to be acquired by purchase, lease, gift, donation, inheritance and in any way and manner that lands, or ranches, may or can be legally acquired, or the right to the possession and use of same obtained, under and by authority of the laws of the United States, or of New Mexico, and to carry on and conduct a general live stock business, including the purchase and sale of cattle, horses, burros, sheep, goats and swine, and the breeding and rearing of same on the lands and ranches of the company as shall be decided upon by the Board of Directors of the Corporation and also any and all business incident to or pertaining to ranching and live stock business, and necessary to the conduct of same.

ARTICLE III.

The capital stock of this corporation shall consist of One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Shares, of the per value of One Dollar (\$) per share.

Fifty thousand shares of the capital stock of the company shall be issued to the ten original incorporators, five thousand shares to each of them, in lieu of the lands, ranches and improvement on same to be by them conveyed to this corporation by good and sufficient deeds and leases, transferring to said company all the right title and interest of the said original incorporators in and to the said lands, ranches and improvements, the said fifty thousand shares of the said capital stock of the company, to be duly transferred to the said original incorporators, whose names are signed to these articles of incorporation, on the delivery of the said deeds and leases, duly executed by them to the said company, for the said lands and ranches, which said lands and ranches are to be sufficient as regards the amount of water, and feed ordinarily produced upon the same, to carry,

maintain and support four thousand head of stock cattle at all times, as well as a sufficient number of horses to care for said stock. The said lands, ranches and improvements on same when conveyed, leased and transferred to said company as herein provided, to be accepted by it in full payment for the fifty thousand shares of the capital stock of the company issued to the said original incorporators as herein provided; and when so issued the same shall be fully paid for and forever non-assessable, and it shall be conclusively presumed as against all persons dealing with this corporation, whether the creditors, stockholders, or others, that the sum herein fixed, as the value of said lands, ranches, and improvements, is the fair and reasonable cash value of the same, and all persons shall be forever barred and estopped from setting up or claiming in any proceedings equitable or legal, that the price herein fixed is not the actual cash value of the same, and was not at the time of the conveyance and transfer of the said lands, ranches and improvements to this corporation, or that the said fifty thousand shares of capital stock issued in lieu of same is not fully paid up.

One hundred thousand shares of the capital stock of this corporation shall be set aside as treasury stock, the same, or any part thereof to be sold at such prices as shall be fixed by the Board of Directors, and the money derived from such sale shall be used to purchase such live stock as shall be by the Board of Directors directed to be purchased for the stocking of the lands and ranches of this corporation, or in the furtherance of any of the objects and purposes of the company, as may at any time be directed by its Board of Directors; and at no time shall any of the funds derived from the sale of any of the said stock be used for any other purpose than those designated in these articles as objects and purposes of the corporation, or such as are incident and necessary there to and then only after the Board of Directors shall have decided upon such expenditure and directed same to be made by a majority vote of the said Board. No stock shall be voted until sold and entered upon the books of the company, and cash paid into the company's treasury therefor, except the fifty thousand shares of stock which shall be issued to the said original incorporators and it may be voted when issued as herein provided and entered upon the books of the corporation.

ARTICLE IV.

The life of this corporation shall be fifty years unless sooner dissolved as provided by law.

ARTICLE V.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be forever non-assessable, the law and court decisions, if any there be, to the contrary notwithstanding, and all of said stock when issued and paid for at the price fixed by the Board of Directors, shall be fully paid up and forever non-assessable; and it shall be conclusively presumed as against all persons dealing with this corporation, whether creditors, stockholders, or others, that the amount paid for its capital stock and accepted by the company was at the date of purchase and payment the value of the same, and all persons shall be forever barred and estopped from setting up or claiming in any proceeding either at law or in equity, that the said stock, or any of it, is not fully paid up.

ARTICLE VI.

This corporation shall have the power

and authority to make such rules and by-laws for the conduct of its business and the control of its officers and agents, as may be deemed advisable and may do and perform any and all things and acts necessary to the carrying out of the objects and purposes of the corporation in accordance with these articles and the laws of New Mexico.

ARTICLE VII.

All conveyances of the lands and real estate of the company and all incumbrances of the real and personal property of the company shall be done in the corporate name, by the president and secretary and attested by the seal of the corporation, after the same shall have been decided upon and ordered by a majority of its Board of Directors, and any and all conveyances of real estate and any and all incumbrances of the real and personal property of the corporation, not made and attested as above set forth shall be null and of no effect whatever.

ARTICLE VIII.

The private, or individual property of the stockholders of this corporation shall not be liable for any of the corporate debts or liabilities at any time or under any circumstances and no amendment to these articles shall ever be made, in any wise changing or modifying this provision.

ARTICLE IX.

These articles may be amended as now or hereafter provided by law except article eight which shall not be altered or amended at any time; but shall forever remain as drafted herein and all laws making provisions now or hereafter for amendment to articles of incorporation, in New Mexico, shall not apply to said article eight.

ARTICLE X.

The business of this corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, which shall consist of not less than five and not more than nine stockholders of the corporation, and the Board of Directors who shall manage the business of the corporation, for the first three months and until the election of a board to serve until annual meeting of the stockholders is held shall be composed of the following stockholders: Geo. E. Sligh, Nogal, N. M.; Geo. W. Harbin, Nogal, N. M.; W. A. McIvers, Nogal, N. M.; W. R. Scott, Quincy, Ill.; Frank M. Shoemaker, Waterloo, Iowa.

ARTICLE XI.

The officers of this corporation shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary, General Manager, and a Treasurer, and the same shall be filled and the duties thereof discharged until their successors are elected and qualified by the following:

The statehood fight is still on and there is nothing in the situation that indicates compromise.

The contestants lost out in the Socorro county election cases, and the will of the people has prevailed.

C. C. Emerson, editor of the Roswell Journal, has sued the Carlsbad Argus for libel, asking \$25,000 damages.

Martinez and Hawkins have sold their interests in the El Paso Daily News. It will probably be a better paper.

The Capitan Progress is getting out a special edition, illustrated and giving prominence to Lincoln county resources.

If you have money to spare why don't you build a number of neat cottages with it? It will beat 12 per cent in White Oaks right now.

Deming has secured the national sanitarium, which will give her the advantages of the expenditure of a large sum of money which is to be used for this purpose.

Mrs. Howard is local editor of her husband's paper, the San Marcial Bee, while he is helping to make laws at the territorial capital. We notice the local columns are up to the standard.

The White Oaks Eagle, which has been the only paper in the territory that has opposed statehood, has found a chance to step into the procession and is now advocating the admission of New Mexico and Arizona as one state.—Raton Reporter.

Fortunately the Eagle has always been able to give its reasons for opposing, and now also for favoring admission.

Lewis N. Barksdale, Deming, N. M., won over Clay McGonigle at the El Paso roping tournament. Thus New Mexico wins over Texas and holds the world's championship among cowboy ropers. Barksdale's record is 31½ seconds. James Gibson, winner of the second prize, made a record of 36 seconds. The prizes were \$1,000 and \$500.

The plan of combining New Mexico and Arizona as one state is said to be gaining supporters in certain quarters in Washington. In New Mexico the scheme is gaining ground also, for the White Oaks Eagle, the only paper in the territory that has fought the statehood proposition, now approves of the two territories uniting their fortunes.—San Marcial Bee.

Unless the present session of the territorial legislature makes a better record than many preceding ones, it were better for statehood, had it never convened. The recent statehood squabble has directed the attention of the whole country to New Mexico, and a little common sense thrown in with the usual political sney will raise us in the estimation of our fellow countrymen. Less poker and whisky and more business would improve matters wonderfully.

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Geo. T. Gould, many years editor of the Las Vegas Optic, is now employed as managing editor of the Las Vegas Record.

The governor's message to the Thirty-fifth legislative assembly of the territory is rather a lengthy document, all things considered. However, we fail to see where he has recommended the repeal of the coal oil inspection law.

W. A. Hawkins and A. B. Fall have returned from Washington, D. C., to take charge of the Santa Fe, New Mexico, legislature. These gentlemen were looking after statehood matters at the national capital. There is in all probability a senatorial and representative ambition microbe under the sombreros of these worthy Texo-New Mexicans. There was no wool pulled over the eyes of the democratic voter in the Ninth Council district last election, it grew there, and hung like icicles in the klondike.

Bull Fighter Killed.

A famous bull fighter was killed in the Juarez bull ring last Sunday, says the Alamogordo News. The humane society should take the matter up and see if some action cannot be taken against the bull, he is certainly liable for cruelty to animals.

Statistics of Mining Production, 1902.

The summary of the output of minerals from the counties of Colorado shows the production during the year to have been \$49,545,000 (estimated). While this amount is a small percentage less than the production of 1901, yet it is a very gratifying exhibit considering all things.

While the price of silver during 1902 was the lowest yet recorded, the improved methods of handling have so reduced the cost per ton that the decreased value of the output of that metal is but 20 per cent. The gold production has increased to an appreciable per cent., the same factor, i. e., reduced cost of production, entering somewhat in this result. The action of the American Smelting and Refining company in reducing treatment charges on certain low grade ores stimulated the production toward the last of the year and should the charges now obtaining prevail during 1903 a very large tonnage of hitherto unavailable stocks of ore will be marketed, which will affect favorably the results for 1903.

South Dakota's production has materially increased, due to the increased capacity of the reduction plants and the investment of capital in development. The state has a great mining future; its resources are but just beginning to be understood, many large mills are under construction and 1903 promises well. Montana and Arizona have continued their contributions of gold and copper to the wealth of the country, and although the production of the territory of Arizona hardly equal the production of 1901, the causes are well understood. The great fire at the mines of Senator Clark being the most important factor.

The production of mineral in Utah exceeds that of 1901 and with the extensive production promised from the Cactus and other large properties, 1902 should be a banner year.

While there has been no "bonanza" district discovered, the year 1902 has been a very satisfactory one for the industry of mining, and the future is full of promise.

Officers Elected.

At the annual meeting of the International Miners' association held in El Paso on Tuesday, the 13th, the governors of Texas, New

Mexico, Arizona, Chihuahua, and Sonora were elected as honorary presidents of the association, and Britton Davis, of El Paso, president.

At the meeting of the executive board held yesterday, the following officers were elected:

J. S. Eldridge, of Dos Cabezas, Sonora, first vice president; H. P. Simmons, of El Paso, second vice president; J. W. Fleming, of Silver City, N. M., third vice president; L. A. Dunham, of Clifton, Ariz., fourth vice president; R. Anderson, of Chihuahua, Mexico, fifth vice president; A. W. Gifford, of New Mexico, secretary; A. W. Davis, of El Paso, assistant secretary.—El Paso Herald.
