



When this territory was admitted into the union near ly every big paper in the east had some ridiculous cartoon displayed on their front page depicting a wild and wooly country on the ragged edge of nowhere. This is not only untrue, but it is unjust As a matter of fact there are more fruit pickers in some counties of New Mexico than there ever were cowboys in the whole territory. There are more farmers, miners, railreaders, merchants and business men in New Mexico than there ever were in many of the states of the east. The typical cowboy of the early days is a thing of the past; the bad man with a young armory strapped to his anatomy is forgotten, and the tenderfoot who has no more brains than to imitate such extinct characters generally winds up before the police judge with a nice little tine attached to his dismissal. 
