More than 1,200 coal miners were killed by an explosion Saturday in the mines at Courriere, France.

Countess Boni de Castellane amended her proceedings in the French court, now asking for an absolute divorce.

The Algeciras conference is in mother deadlock, though it was thought the first of the week that an agreement would be reached.

The betrothal of King Alfonso of Spain to Princess Edna of Battenberg has been formally announced. The marriage will occur June 2.

An Anarchist is reported to have confessed that he was recently present at a conference at which a plot was concocted to kill the King of Italy during the Milan exhibition on April 18.

A counter plot for the massacre of Jews and revolutionists has been discovered in the royal palace of St. Petersburg. It had its origin in a court cabal and was designed to sweep away recent reforms.

On one of the islands of the Samoan group an active volcano is sending molten lava into the sea in a stream three quarters of a mile wide and twenty feet deep. Three villages have been completely destroyed.

ARBOR DAY SET FOR MARCH 30.

To the School Directors and Teachers of the Public Schools of Socorro County: Gentlemen:

I wish to hereby call your attention, and to earnestly request you to punctually observe the following proclamation by the Governor of our Territory regarding Arbor Day. This has become a settled and most laudable institution connected with our school system and it behooves all school officers to regard and observe the same punctiliously.

J. A. TORRES. School Superintendent, Socorro County, New Mexico.

To the people of the Territory of New Mexico:

In accordance with the established custom and by virtue of the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, enacted for that purpose, I hereby designate Friday, March 30, 1906, as "Arbor Day," and recommend that on that day the people in all parts of the territory, turn aside from the ordinary duties of life and devote their time to the planting of forest trees for the benefit and adornment of public and private grounds, places and ways, and in such other efforts, observances and exercises as shall be in harmony with the day so established. The day above designated shall be a holiday in all public schools of the territory, and the county superintendents of the various counties are hereby admonished to give notice of this proclamation to the teachers under their direction and to use particular care and attention to promote by all proper means at their command the observance of the day by the school children in all sections of the territory. "To an Optic representative Mr. Pierce expressed himself as greatly pleased with the condition of the institution and the excellent financial showing which the report of Superintendent Bursum revealed. The statement prepared up to the first of amounts to be on hand in the various funds:

"In addition to the above amounts on hand," said Mr. Pierce, 'there is now due from maintenance fund appropriated for the present fiscal year about \$19,000, making a total credit to the penitentiary of nearly \$34,000. This is undoubtedly the finest showing which the penitentiary has ever been able to make at any period in its history, and is a cause of great satisfaction to Superintendent Bursum and the members of the board. CONVICTS' RARNINGS.

"The public would doubtless be interested," continued Mr. Pierce, "in the statement of the earnings of the convicts during the seven years which the institution has continued under its present management. Mr. Bursum was appointed to the superintendency in May, 1899. From that month to the present day there has been a constant increase in the earnings of the convicts month by month. From May, 1899, to January 1, 1900, the earnings totaled \$4,455,43; 1900, \$8,-554.32; 1901, \$14,808,05; 1902, \$18, 968,61; 1903, 14,643,92; 1904, \$17, 396,60; 1905, \$26,039.83; 1905 to March 12, \$7, 249.35. Total, \$112, 116,11,

THE ROSWELL REGISTER-TRI-BUNE is one of the most creditable weekly papers published in New Mexico. It is attractive in appearance, it is well edited, and it is of the soundest of political principles.

Ir, then, New Mexico is to continue under a territorial form of government, she can at least congratulate herself that even as a territory she is making a vastly better showing in way of prosper ity and progress than some, if not any, of the new-made states.

Socorro is soon to have a city election, but that fact seems to arouse almost no public interest whatever. This can hardly be interpreted otherwise than as pretty conclusive evidence that the citizens of Socorro are well satisfied with the present administration of their public affairs.

UNCLE SAM OWNS 500,000,000 acres of arid land, and the United States Geological Survey estimates that with a reasonable expenditure in a consistent scheme of irrigation this land will be worth at least four dollars an acre on the average. About 250,000 acres of this total area of arid land are in New Mexico. A million dollars added to land values in New Mexico would be well worth while.
