### OF HOME INTEREST

The New Mexico legislature meets next Monday.

Andreas Romero, a prominent citizen of Peralta, spent the early part of the week in Socorro.

After a snow and a cold snap for a little more than a week, the weather has come off warm and pleasant—just like spring.

The new board county commissioners were sworn in last Monday and after holding a brief session adjourned until January 25.

Langford Johnson, of Mogollon is here attending court, as prosecuting witness against Riley charged with the murder of his little son.

James Shelton, of Cooney, was a welcome visitor to this office last Thursday. He is a fine appearing young gentleman and is the son of George Shelton, one of the prominent and well known citizens of Cooney.

The Justice of the Peace election, last Monday, was a lively and exciting though peaceable one in Socorro. There were three candidates, Judge H. R. Harris, the present justice and police judge; ex-Probate Judge Camillo Baca and John A. O'Neill. Mr. Baca was elected by a large majority.

"Ex-Court Clerk" Jackey McCutchen doesn't seem to be picking on Editor Anderson, of the Rincon Weekly, as much as he used to do. What's the matter, Jackey? Did Anderson manage to get through your thick hide? Perhaps it is just as well you let up, Jackey, for Anderson is likely to peel you alive the next time.

The case of Maximalino Griego charged with murder of a man at San Antonio, some ten years ago has been on trial all this week. This morning (Saturday) the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty and Griego stands acquitted of the charge. The Riley case comes up next and it is likely it will take most of next week to try it.

The people all over the territory are earnest in their demands that the extortionate fees allowed by law to county officials shall be cut down. If this is not done by the present legislature, its members will return to their constituents next spring only to find themselves dead so far as their future political career is concerned.

Last Monday we was in the "The Maze" store at Albuquerque, and priced their goods—or some of them—for we could not price all. Their stock is simply immense and their prices are about two-thirds of those charged here in Socorro. Parties wishing goods should write them for price lists and save money by buying from them, for a dollar saved is two dollars made these hard times.

Bribery will not be so rampant in the legislature this winter as it was said to be two years ago. The people all over the territory are terribly alive to the wrongs perpetrated on them by an infamous gang of selfish politicians, and it is safe to predict that both bribe givers and bribe takers will find themselves behind the jail walls if such a thing is attempted in the present legislature.

Delaware's Finances.

The state many years ago chartered several farmers' banks, all of which are now prosperous, and in these the state has considerable capital invested. The par value of the state's holdings in bank stock is just short of \$300,000, and the market value is a trifle over \$475,000. The state expenses, not including school appropriations, fall a little short of \$200,000 per year.—New York Sun.

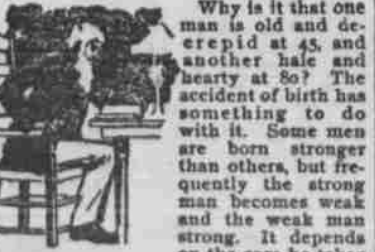

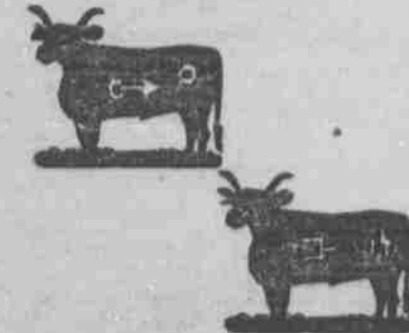
