THE ANNUAL MEETING FEW OF THE NEW LAWS

Of the Cattle and Horse Protective Association of Central New Mexico.

IN MAGDALENA ON WEDNESDAY

Officers Elected and Resolution Passed Favoring Government Control of Grazing Lands.

The regular annual meeting of the Cattle and Horse Protective Association of Central New Mexico was held in Magdalena Wednesday. The meetings of the association are always anticipated with interest by stockmen and by others who are in sympathy with their efforts to improve conditions in this part of the territory. There was a good attendance Wednesday, the proceedings aroused a lively interest on part of those present, and action taken on some subjects can hardly fail to result in benefit to the members of the association and to the general public. After the transaction of routine business officers for next year were elected as follows: Chairman, Jas. W. Medley; Secretary, W. P. Sanders; Treasurer, Wm. Gardiner. These officers are also members of the executive committee, the other two members of the committee elected being E. H. Sweet of Socorro and C. Chavez of San Marcial. Addresses were delivered by J. H. Hatton, acting supervisor of the Magdalena and San Mateo forest reserves, Will C. Barnes, secretary of the Cattle Sanitary Board of New Mexico, E. A. Clemens, Capt. C. H. Kirkpatrick of Mogollon, and others. The introduction of a resolution favoring government control of grazing lands called forth an interesting discussion but the resolution was passed. There were in attendance a good many who are not stockmen, but they were much interested in the proceedings and will in one way or another share in the benefits.

The resolution in favor of government control of public grazing lands was as follows: "Resolved, That this association favors some sort of government control of the public grazing lands under the direction of the secretary of agriculture and under such rules and regulations as may be found just and necessary for the protection both of the grazing lands and the stock raisers, the arrangements conforming as nearly as possible to conditions.

Passed by the Thirty-seventh Legislative Assembly and Signed by the Governor.

THESE OF GENERAL INTEREST

the One Hundred and Twenty-two Bills That Were Enacted into Law

Of the one hundred and twenty-three bills that were enacted into law by the thirty-seventh legislative assembly, the following are among those of most general interest:

Council Bill No. 48, "An act to prohibit gambling in the Territory of New Mexico."

Council Bill No. 105, "An act to construct an addition to the present Capitol building."

House Joint Resolution No. 6, "Conveying the Old Palace at Santa Fe to the United States Government."

House Bill No. 183, "An act relating to the settlement of accounts of public officers." (To become law by limitation.)

House Substitute for Council Bill No. 12, "An act to encourage the erection of beet sugar factories and for other purposes."

House Substitute for House Bill No. 116, "An act providing for registration of births and deaths, and for other purposes."

Council Bill No. 1, "An act to amend Chapter 116 of the Laws of the Thirty-sixth Legislative Assembly of the territory of New Mexico," relative to the drawing of jurors.

Conference Committee Bill No. 249, "An act providing funds and making appropriations for the Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth fiscal years, and for other purposes." Reported by Conference Committee.

Council Bill No. 128, "An act providing funds and making appropriations for the Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth fiscal years, and for other purposes." Reported by Conference Committee.

Council Bill No. 128, "An act providing funds and making appropriations for the traveling expenses of the district judges and clerks of the district courts of the Territory of New Mexico."

Council Bill No. 115, "An act to refund to territorial institutions moneys used for expenses in selection and location of public lands and providing for the payment of further expenses in the selection and location of public lands."

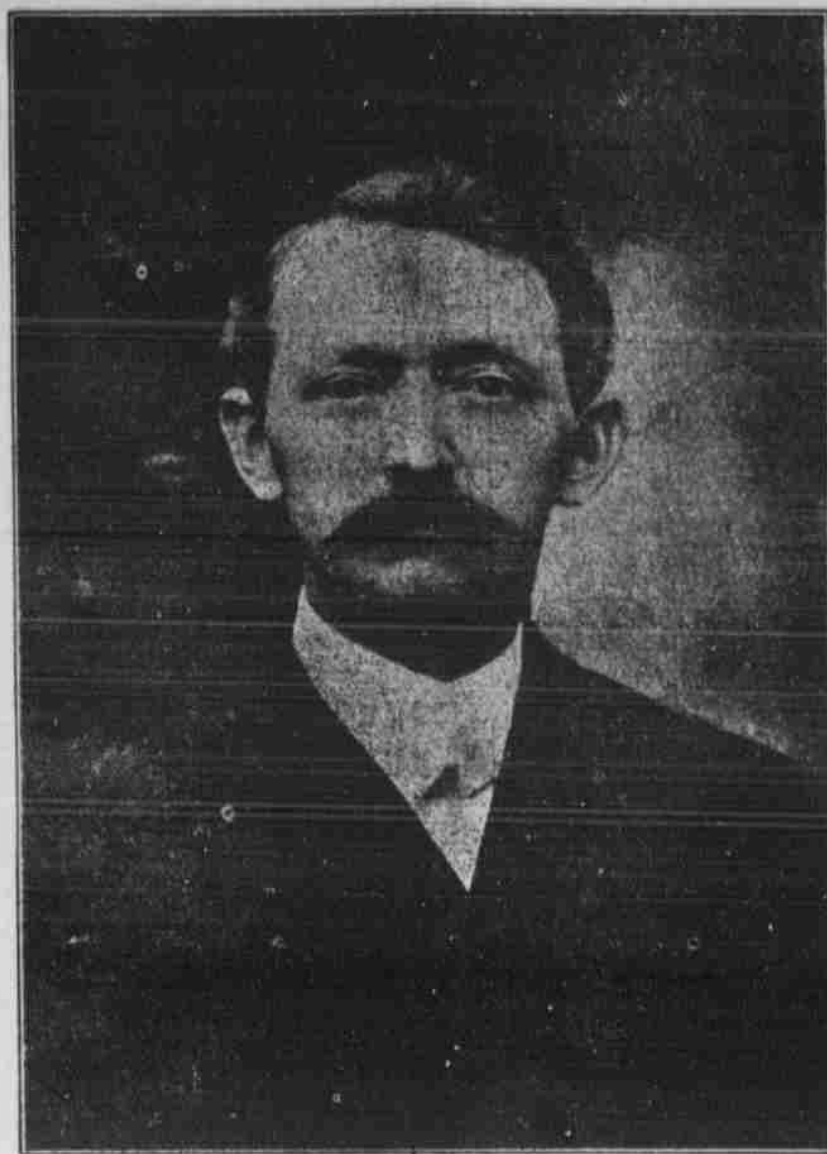
Council Bill No. 113, entitled "An act to facilitate the collection of poll and road taxes, by requiring the employer of the persons liable therefore to pay such taxes and deduct the amount thereof from the wages of such employees."

Council Bill No. 51, "An act to provide for the filling of vacancies in county offices in the Territory of New Mexico," and providing that hereafter when any vacancy occurs in any county office in the Territory, other than a vacancy in the office of county commissioner, it shall be the duty of the board of County Commissioners to fill such vacancies.

CHANCES FOR STUDENTS

Two Hundred Dollars a Year Allowed by the Territory to Defray Expenses.

The appropriation bill passed by the late legislative assembly contained one provision that is sure to result in direct benefit to many of the young people of the territory. The provision is to the effect that each member of the thirty-seventh assembly, also each board of county commissioners, may appoint one student to any territorial institution for a period of four years. The student, or his parent, has the privilege of selecting the institution, and the person or board making the appointment determines the rules under which the appointment is made. The legislative assembly appropriated \$12,500 to pay the expenses of such students, \$200 per school year being allowed to each. The boards of county commissioners are authorized to fill any vacancies that may occur in their respective counties.

The wedding ceremony was performed at the home of the bride's parents, and Mr. and Mrs. Bradley left at once for a honeymoon trip to Los Angeles and other points of interest on the Pacific coast.

JULIAN J. TRUJILLO DEAD

A Man of Marked Ability Suddenly Goes to His Reward.

Julian J. Trujillo is dead. Death claimed its own at eleven o'clock Tuesday night at Ranchos de La Joya where the deceased was teaching school. The news caused great surprise and profound sorrow among the many relatives and friends of Mr. Trujillo in Socorro and vicinity. Death resulted from a severe cold which developed into a fever and other complications. The remains were laid to rest in the Catholic cemetery at La Joya in the presence of a large concourse of sorrowing relatives, friends, and acquaintances.

Mr. Trujillo was born in Socorro in 1844. He was educated for the priesthood but never took orders. At various times he occupied a variety of public positions, everyone of which he filled with credit to himself and satisfaction to those whom he served. It is doubtful whether any man in New Mexico ever taught public school in as many districts as Mr. Trujillo did. He was a man of unquestioned ability and kindly disposition. His sorrowing family have, therefore, the keen sympathy of an extremely large circle of friends and acquaintances. May he rest in peace.

Abeytia did an excellent piece of work this week in the capture of Jose Luzano, wanted for appropriating unto himself a span of horses and a carriage belonging to Luis Chavez of Escondida. Very soon after the proper documents were placed in Sheriff Abeytia's hands he located his man at Vado de Juan Pais in Guadalupe county, sent Deputy Henry Dreytus for him, and Luzano is now in the Socorro county jail awaiting his preliminary hearing.

The board transacted some business of importance and agreed to meet again between the first and tenth of May for the election of a faculty for the ensuing year and for the transaction of other important business that will demand their attention at that time.

E. E. Freeman, convicted of murder in the second degree a year ago in the district court for Luna county, and sentenced to the penitentiary for a term of three years, has been granted an unconditional pardon by Governor Hagerman. He will go to Victoria, British Columbia.

Captain Kirkpatrick had been in attendance at the meeting of the Cattle and Horse Protective association at Magdalena, where he had been one of the speakers and had taken an active part in the proceedings otherwise. If the condition of the republican party in New Mexico is not soon mended it will not be many moons until the democrats are sitting by the fleshpots.

SOCORRO has been afflicted with some windy March weather for the past week, but as usual reports indicate that the Gem City's affliction has been vastly less severe than that of her neighbors.

SOCORRO county is the banner county of New Mexico for mineral products and from present indications it is reasonable to expect that she will retain that proud position for many years to come.

WILLIAM F. BROGAN has just been chosen managing editor of the Albuquerque Citizen. Judging from the character of the work that Editor Brogan has been doing on the staff of the Santa Fe New Mexican for a year or more, he is sure to make a success in his new and influential field.

THE Santa Fe New Mexican sums up the results of the labors of the late legislative assembly in the following apt paragraph: "One hundred and twenty-three bills became laws at the recent session of the Assembly. With the exception of half a dozen these are all in the right direction and their provisions will prove beneficial. The half dozen that are more or less objectionable are not very vicious and will have no bad effect, except that they will take some money out of the treasury. These things were to be expected. They happen in the best regulated bodies, great or small, in republics and in monarchies."

THE Cattle and Horse Protective Association has accomplished a great deal of good for its members, individually and collectively, during the few years of its existence. The results of the efforts of this organization afford a striking illustration of how much may be accomplished by united effort when individual effort is sure to fail. Fortunately, too, the good accomplished by this association is not confined to its own membership. The welfare of Socorro county is so largely dependent upon the welfare of its stockmen that anything that contributes to their prosperity can not fail to increase the bank accounts of their neighbors. The Cattle and Horse Protective Association merits the encouragement and support of all good citizens of Socorro county.

BECAUSE of the liberality of the thirty-seventh legislative assembly and for other reasons there is good ground to believe that the New Mexico School of Mines will now enjoy a period of prosperity even greater than that of the last two or three years. The assembly's liberality consisted in an increase of a thousand dollars a year in the annual appropriation and the donation of a fifteen thousand dollars for the erection of a students' dormitory. The dormitory will fill a longfelt want. It will make it possible for students to attend the institution at a cost far below the lowest cost possible under present conditions, and those familiar with the history of the School of Mines do not hesitate to say that this fact alone will

double the number of students in attendance. There are other features of the present condition which will contribute to a very substantial increase in the School's revenue next year and in succeeding years, and thus enhance the usefulness of one of New Mexico's foremost educational institutions.

Arbor Day Proclamation.

The following Arbor day proclamation has been issued by Governor Hagerman:

To the People of the Territory of New Mexico:

In accordance with the laws of the territory providing that the governor shall designate each year a day to be observed as Arbor day, I, H. J. Hagerman, governor of the territory of New Mexico, do hereby proclaim Friday, March the 29th, A. D. 1907, as Arbor day, and recommend that the same be a holiday in all the schools of the territory; that the teachers and pupils observe this day by planting trees and shrubs for the benefit and adornment of public and private grounds, and endeavor in every way possible to carry out the objects for which the day is so established.

The county school superintendents of the various counties are hereby asked to give notice of this proclamation to the teachers in their respective counties, and to encourage a proper observance of the day.

Since the question of tree culture is of vast importance in this territory, I recommend that the people in general give some time and attention to the purposes for which the day is set aside.

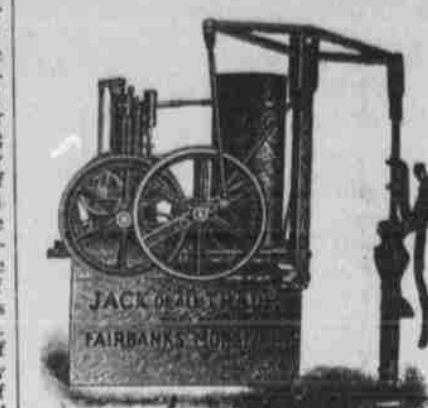

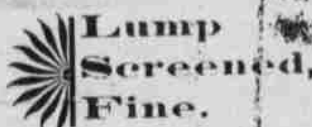

DRESSED SEALSKIN.

The Way This Beautiful Fur Is Brought to Perfection.

If a lady's sealskin jacket be compared with the coarse, hard or dry salted sealskin as imported, or, still better, with the coat of the living fur seals, one is struck with the vast difference between them.

Passing our fingers among the hairs of the cat or dog, we may notice fine short hairs at the roots of the longer, coarser general covering the animal. This is so called under fur. But in the greater number of these animals the short hairs are so few and often so fine as to be, comparatively speaking, lost sight of among what to our eyes constitutes the coat.

The operation which the skin undergoes to bring out, so to say, the fur, may be briefly described as follows:

The skin, after being washed to rid it of grease and so forth, is laid flat on the stretch, flesh side up. A flat knife is then passed across the flesh substance thinning it to a very considerable extent. In doing this, the blade severs the roots of the long strong hairs, which penetrate the skin deeper than do the soft, delicate ones under the fur. The rough hairs are then got rid of while the fur retains its hold.

A variety of subsidiary manipulations, in which the pelt is softened and preserved, are next gone through, and then the fur undergoes a process of dyeing which produces that deep uniform tint so well known and admired.

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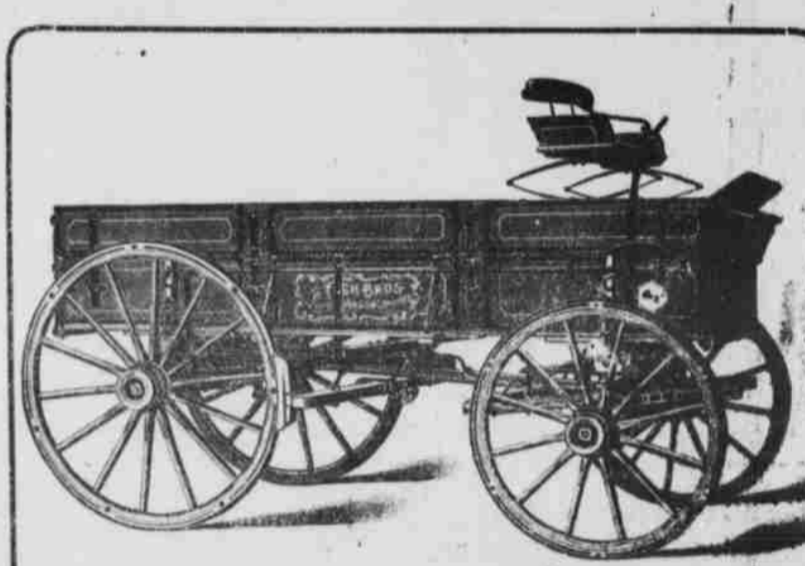
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
