NEW BANKRUPTCY LAW. The bankruptcy bill reported in the Senate provides that when a person without fraud shall become involved in debt beyond \$500 which he cannot pay, he may apply, by petition in equity, to the United States District Court, setting forth the cause of insolvency and scheduling his liabilities and assets, and asking the value of the estate for the benefit of his creditors.

The People of New Mexico and their Territory.

The Hon. L. Bradford Prince finds much to admire in his new neighborhood.

The Spaniards of the Territory and their qualities as citizens.

To the Editor of the New York Times.

It was only three or four days ago that I saw the Times of Feb. 6 containing an anonymous communication dated at Trinidad under the rather incognito title, "Grossers as Citizens."

Your correspondent next speaks of the political character of the people, and I only refer to this to the two existing papers in the Territory, and to the people, but in New Mexico they have no such men as "Democrats."

"It is a patent, notorious fact, blazoning itself forward with startling boldness, that in no other part of Christendom are the women of an entire community so degraded without a sense of the heathenism of their race."

"I have re-read it several times in order to select the portions which are most untrue for contradictions, but the result has only been to show that the whole is such a string of misrepresentations that it is difficult to particularize any portion as worse than another."

"Without statistical authority at hand, I think it not far wrong to say that about two-thirds of the population of the Territory is of the mongrel breed known as Mexican—a mixture of the blood of Apache, negro, Navajo, white horse-thief, Pueblo Indian, and old-time frontiersman with the original Mexican stock."

"It is a pity that he did not have the proper 'statistical authority at hand,' for that might have enlightened him considerably. The United States census, which is probably the best statistical authority," would have shown the population in 1880 to be as follows:

"The increase since then has mostly come from discharged soldiers. While some of the Pueblo villages to the north near Spanish towns, yet no marriage or similar connections take place between the races; they are separate in such respects as if a Chinese wall ran between them."

"You may sift and rake this Mexican population, and you will scarcely find man, woman or child who does not hate with a passionate hatred everything that is known to him or her as American."

"I should not be at all surprised if the Spanish speaking portion of our citizens did 'hate with a passionate hatred' the kind of 'American' represented by the writer of that article, and I should not think much of their self-respect if they did not. But that there is any such feeling toward Americans as a people is simply untrue."

"More than two years ago, in writing to a metropolitan newspaper, I said: 'The native population are polite, generous, and hospitable almost to a fault, with no dislike or distrust of new comers of the proper class, but inclined to welcome good citizens from wheresoever they come.'

"Since then not far from 20,000 new inhabitants have come into the Territory—certainly a sufficient number—and I can emphatically reiterate every word then written. Of course, I do not mean that the Mexicans admire the desperadoes, rascals, bullies and 'rustlers,' who are apt to be found on the borders of civilization, or the ill-mannered and vulgar, who would abuse them because their mother tongue was Spanish instead of English."

Your correspondent grossly exaggerates. When he says: "Whole counties have not been searched before a man could be found able to give the name of the President of the United States," he simply states what is untrue. I state this unqualifiedly from personal knowledge. The six counties through which I am constantly traveling include these most remote from educational centers and new influences, yet everywhere houses were draped with mourning at the death of General Garfield and the day of his funeral fully observed. I doubt whether in any town of its size in the land that day was as fully and solemnly observed as in Santa Fe. There are to-day nearly 50 newspapers in the Territory, and of these eight or ten are daily. Part are printed in English, part in Spanish, and part in both languages. This surely is not an evidence of dense ignorance. Where is the population of similar numbers anywhere in the east that supports so many newspapers?

Your correspondent next speaks of the political character of the people, and I only refer to this to the two existing papers in the Territory, and to the people, but in New Mexico they have no such men as "Democrats."

"Since then not far from 20,000 new inhabitants have come into the Territory—certainly a sufficient number—and I can emphatically reiterate every word then written. Of course, I do not mean that the Mexicans admire the desperadoes, rascals, bullies and 'rustlers,' who are apt to be found on the borders of civilization, or the ill-mannered and vulgar, who would abuse them because their mother tongue was Spanish instead of English."

"I simply mean that a worthy man is as sure of a welcome and recognition here as anywhere in the country, and that no such prejudices exist as your correspondent suggests. It may be added here that the native people of New Mexico had an opportunity once to show their loyalty to American institutions by something more substantial than words, and that their patriotic response in the time of the rebellion was made by furnishing over 6,000 men to the union army, a larger number in proportion to the population than could be boasted of by many of the most loyal states."

"It is true that the educational condition of the Territory is not altogether as we could wish. Two centuries of practical isolation naturally had a bad effect in this respect, but this is being rapidly remedied. One-quarter of the entire regular taxation is devoted to public schools by law, and there are excellent national establishments of high grade at Santa Fe, Las Vegas, Taos, Bernalillo, Albuquerque, Socorro, Las Cruces, Mesilla, Silver City, and other points. On this subject, also,

It is in no hurry to be a State, but its progress will necessarily make it in a short time a great and important one."

Burnett & Lyon received a handsome supply of fixtures yesterday for the Plaza hotel. They put them up at once.

Mr. C. D. Davis, steward of the Plaza Hotel, was flying around yesterday in a lively manner preparing for the opening of the hotel last night.

A Pueblo Indian was yesterday walking about town with a large mountain lion skin slung over his shoulder. He was looking for a purchaser.

All members of the A. O. U. W. are requested to be present to-night at the lodge room at 7:30 o'clock. Business of importance to be transacted.

Eugene Clemm has closed out his entire stock of flour, hay and groceries. He will soon start to Europe on an extended visit to friends and relatives.

James A. Gillis, formerly connected with the St. James hotel, Kansas City, is the head clerk of the new Plaza hotel. He is a gentleman who understands the business perfectly and will give feet satisfaction.

Bell & Co., the plaza grocers, were busily arranging an immense stock of groceries in their new store in Reilly's block, on the east side. This firm proposes to carry a large stock of goods and to do a heavy business. This will be the largest stock of groceries in the city.

General Manager Wheeler and A. A. Robinson, of the A. T. & S. F. railroad came in on a special Sunday evening. They went at once to the Hot Springs and came in yesterday morning and went south. They express themselves as well pleased with the arrangements at the Hot Springs.

The work of grading north of the bridge dump was commenced yesterday. The material for the grade is being taken from the bed of the river. A space of fifty feet immediately north of the bridge has been reserved for station purposes. The grade at this point will be finished afterward.

Parr put in possession until the guests could obtain other places to lodge, when the doors were locked. It seems the former proprietors, Lockhart, Brown & Co., had leased the furniture to Brownlee & Shoemaker for the sum of \$4,700. A portion of which had been paid. From some cause the first lease was thought insufficient by the former proprietors, who made a new one and presented it to Brownlee & Shoemaker, who refused to sign it. This brought on the difficulty that terminated in closing the house until the case can be settled by the court now in session. This is peculiarly unfortunate for the St. Nicholas hotel, just at the present time. It has enjoyed a good reputation in the past and a splendid patronage.

Things generally are getting into good shape at the Springs, preparatory for the grand opening, the first of April, when there will be a big time. C. C. A New York gentleman who came to New Mexico a few months ago in very feeble health, had advanced far toward restoration; but he incautiously came overland from Santa Fe on Monday last and was suddenly prostrated with a severe attack of pneumonia, but is now rapidly convalescing, under the treatment of Dr. Page. Death of Judge Sumner. George Sumner, a prominent and respected citizen of Las Vegas, died in this city Sunday afternoon at six o'clock, after a long and painful illness. His death was not unexpected, although for a day or two previous, he rested easier and appeared to have some hope of recovery. Judge Sumner was a native of England, having been born in Oxfordshire, and at the time of his death was in his 58th year. He was a pioneer in the west, having come to Colorado in the early days of that Territory. He was a sturdy, self-reliant, honest and upright man, who fought

the battle of life manfully, kind to those whom misfortune had overtaken, true to his friends, generous to his enemies, and just to all. He was twice married, his first wife having been Miss Amelia Rendall of Pennsylvania, a sister of the present Mrs. Sumner and by whom he had eight children. Judge Sumner came to Las Vegas in 1879 and secured the hotel building on the south side of the plaza which he run as the Sumner House. He afterwards leased the new hotel built by Messrs. Lockhart & Co., on the east side and opened that as the Sumner House. Being a popular man of large acquaintance he naturally had a good patronage in business. He was a man who bore acquaintance well and inspired the most confidence and esteem where he was best known. By his death the people of Las Vegas have lost a worthy citizen and his family an affectionate, kind and provident husband and father. He fully realized the approach of death and made disposition of property in a business manner. Expressing no regrets for himself, but solicitude for his family and the loved ones who in life had leaned upon him, conscious that after a well spent life, characterized by integrity, justice and fair dealing to all, that he could lay down the burden of this world with perfect trust and contentment, feeling that he had done no man wrong and that he had commanded the respect and honor of his fellow man.

The funeral of Judge Sumner took place yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the Sumner house to the Odd Fellows' cemetery. It was largely attended, Rev. J. C. Eastman conducting the ceremonies. The following were the pall bearers: Colonel T. B. Mills, J. P. Theobald, S. E. Shoemaker, Dr. Milhigan, Dr. Bailey, and Professor John Robertson.
