



FOREIGN NOTES.

Destructive Storm Among New Foundland Fisheries.

The Lost Dutch Arctic Explorers Found.

Further Details of the Fearful Loss Life at Java.

Storms on the Northeast Coast.

By Western Associated Press. HALIFAX, August 31 .- Late intelligence is to the effect that on Wednesday a storm on the coast of Nova Scotia caused extensive damage to shipping. Ten schooners were driven ashore, some completely wrecked and others badly damaged. The fury of the gale was terrific. A new Catholic church on Cape Breton was carried away and s large wooden building moved from its foundation.

NEW YORK, August 31.-A St. John, J. S. DUNCAN Newfoundland, special says that the fleet of United States fishing vessels, which arrived last night, report a vio-lent storm on the great banks last Sun-pay. The gale rose from the eastward at 8 a. m., when a hundred dories were away from the vessels overhauling their trauls Captain Hillier reports that scores of dories were turned upside down and wrecked. Wreckage was strewn every where in his track and carried westward. A French bunker lost four dories and all their crews. It is computed from all sources of information that one hundred dories and eights men are lost in the storm. Most of the dories were swept away by the waves from the schooner decks and the re mainder capsized in the sea.

Reseus of the Dutch Arctic Exp.or

By Western Associated Press. London, August 31.—A dispatch from Vardol, Norway, states the steamer Obi has arrived there, having on board members of the Dutch expedition to the arctic regions, who sailed in the steamer Vsrna. The Varna foundered July 4 in latitude 71:20 north, longitude 63 east. The members of the expedition were rescued near the island of Wargatz.

The Obi reports that the arctic steamer Dejinbhna was icebound near Wargatz throughout the winter All on board were well and the captain is confident of reaching open water. The crew of the Varna left the Dejinbhna August 1 and were rescued by the Obi August 25.

An Irish Trial. By Western Associated Press.

DUBLIN, August 31 .- The evidence rick Connelly and his sister Catherine. charged with a murder conspiracy indicates that the conspiracy was formed to accomplish private ends and not agrarian purposes, as was supposed. The witness Dinan swore that Connelly forged the name of John Carroll, by which property was to be left to Con-nelly. Dinan, who was to murder Carroll, was to receive £50 from sum expected to be realized from the latter's property.

The Java Eruption. By Western Associated Pres ..

BATAVIA, August 31 -The captain of a steamer which was in the straits of Sunda during the recent volcanic eruption reports that ashes fell on the deck of his vessel to the depth of eighteen inches. He passed masses of floating pumice stone. It is estimated that 1,000 persons lost their lives at Tyren-The total number of killed by the eruptions and tidal waves was 3,000.

Assassination. By Western Associated Press.

Sr. Louis, August 31.-Mark Marsden, a bad character of Jefferson county, while riding along the road near Antonia yesterday, accompanied by Allen Hensley, was fired at from an ambush and instantly killed and Hensley mortally wounded. James and Thomas Moss and John Marsden have been arrested on suspicion.

Nevere Measures Against Riots. By Western Associated Press.

PESTH, August 31 .- Tewesa. president of the Hungarian council, in order to put a stop to the outrages upon the Jews, has decided upon severe measures, which are to be put into operation wherever anti-Jewish riots occur. The measures provide that any one who shall be condemned to death by martial law shall be executed within three hours after the sentence is imposed.

COTTAGE CITY, Mass., August 31 .-The National Womer's Christian temperance union began a four days' convention at the Methodist tabernacle yesterday afternoon. Addresses were made by Mrs. Caroline Z. 
