This poisonous human parasite, either as a citizen or an official, paralyzes every healthy, material interest and industry with which he comes in contact, and it is a matter of wonderment with all why the administration or the Almighty permits him to afflict this or any other community.

We freely give space to the following card from Mr. Knaebel, concerning the land deal in which he was sought to be defrauded out of his portion of the profits in the transaction. We were certainly informed that Max Frost had a "working" interest with Gov. Sheldon, but would not even deign him an injustice (there is enough against him that is true) in refusing to correct the impression; while, as for Dr. Longwell, knowing him to be very avaricious we can still see how Sheldon might have imposed upon his confidence and informed him that the arrangement was perfectly satisfactory to Mr. Knaebel. At any rate, since Mr. Knaebel returned to Santa Fe he has probably become more familiar with the facts, and the following is published in justice to all:

SANTA FE, Dec. 6, 1884. EDITOR GAZETTE: While deeming it improper to discuss in the newspapers the merits of my equity suit now pending against Governor Sheldon, I feel it my duty to inform you that in your recent article on the subject, you are in error in your reflections against Col. Max Frost, and in the statement that I aver that he and Dr. Longwell were parties to the alleged fraud. So far as I am informed Gov. Sheldon is alone responsible for the attempt to exclude me from the benefits of a business transaction which originated with me and in which I considered him in good faith as my partner. On yesterday morning's train, proceeding eastward, was ex-United States Surveyor General Atkinson. It is possible he has been called to Washington for a settlement, as he has been reported behind as an official to the amount of several thousand dollars. He will not fly so high at the national capital as this time last year, when on reappointment, flourishing recommendations from the gang at Santa Fe, backed by Frost's laudatory editorials in the Review and Chairman of the Territorial Republican Committee Breden's personal efforts. More of the crew will travel the same road, but not a few will switch off at Penitentiaryville. Though somewhat "independent" in our mode of worship—we believe that is the fashionable thing in Las Vegas now—we still have an abiding faith in the wisdom and power of an all wise being, and confidently look for matters to "even up" right rapidly in New Mexico. The Lord certainly made a good beginning in "downing" Blaine and Elkins.

GRANT county's board of commissioners have at last taken definite action looking to the collection of taxes from the Southern Pacific railroad. Judge Bristol, about a year ago, it will be remembered, rendered a decision that under the six years exemption act of the legislature of 1878, railroads constructed within the Territory after the passage of said act could not be held liable for taxes during the time fixed for said exemption. This decision was affirmed by the supreme court of the Territory and there the matter has rested until recently. Grant's commissioners have determined to appeal to the supreme court of the United States and have placed the management of the case in the hands of Mr. S. M. Ashenfelter. The progress of the suit will be watched with no little interest, as its final determination will materially interest all roads now operating in New Mexico. Mr. Ashenfelter is to be congratulated upon the compliment paid him by his selection as attorney in so important a suit.

THE live stock feature of the New Orleans exposition will be on a scale of grandeur and liberality that characterizes other departments of this world's fair. Forty-two thousand dollars have been set apart as premiums for live stock, divided as follows: Horses, \$12,000; breeding and dairy cattle, \$12,000; fat stock (cattle, sheep and hogs), \$10,000; sheep 5,000; hogs, \$5,500; poultry and pet stock \$5,000, and dogs \$4,500. This liberality in premiums ought to and will make the live stock department a very attractive feature of the show.

THE Las Vegas GAZETTE last Tuesday expanded to seven columns, and was the first morning journal that gave the president's message in full. There is nothing slow about Webb. The large morning edition was sent out by Wells, Fargo & Co.'s express too.—Santa Fe Leader. Correct. We bagged the scoop on the message this year. The Journal came in a good second, however.

There was a slight preponderance in favor of a city government among those who were positive on the subject, while several expressed themselves as indifferent. We suggest, as on a former occasion, that the matter be submitted to a vote or its agitation cease. Incorporation has its advantages, probably greater than the drawbacks, and inasmuch as the city has once had a taste her people can vote intelligently on the question. Some contend, and very sensibly, that under Judge Bell's decision we are still a city, and the election of officers only necessary to resume municipal standing.
