NEAR Santa Rita, Socorro county, says the Bullion, a prospector named Williams died the other day from the effects of a bite inflicted by a skunk. The malady partakes of hydrophobia, the victim dying a most horrible death. This is the third instance we have heard of in the Territory within five years.




