TELEGRAPHIC.

Chicago, September 20.—The closing day of the Jockey Club's fall trotting meeting was marked by a fine exhibition of speed and endurance and will remain prominent in the memory of all present. The performance of Maud S. in the face of numerous disadvantages, is set down as the most remarkable in the history of the turf. The Chicago track has now shown the best trotting mile—that of Maud S. in 2:10 3/4. The best pacing mile—that of Sleepy Tom in 2:12 1/2; and the best wagon record—that of Hopeful in 2:16 1/2. The horsemen and horses left to-night for Kansas City.

It was nearly six o'clock and growing dark when Maud S. was brought on the track. The sky was cloudy and a strong south wind was blowing. At the first send-off Maud S. soon left her feet. Her driver, Bain, turned her back for a fresh start. She then trotted to the starting point square and level, and as her driver nodded for the word quickly lengthened out her stride and got to the quarter in 34 seconds. It was then believed impossible for her to do better than 2:16 or 2:18, but when she got down to the second quarter at a 2:03 gait, the fastest record, there was a breathless interest and expectancy. It was feared, however, that the strong head wind, when she turned would slacken her speed materially, and render it still impossible to win. She kept straight forward, however, without a break or a skip, and marked the three-quarter pole in 1:36. Bain urged her gently with voice and whip and she responded gamely, and the multitude was breathless as she went the final quarter and thundered down the homestretch in 2:10 3/4. The time by quarters was: First, 34 seconds; second, 30 1/8; third, 31 1/4; fourth, 34 3/4. Loud cheers greeted the mare and her driver and manager as they went to her stable.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 20.—Yesterday's work by the Liberal League consisted in listening to some very elaborate and intolerant speeches and in the expulsion of R. E. Spenser who was chairman of the committee on future work and who, when Robt. Ingersoll resigned, led the minority in opposition to the extreme free lovers and spiritual branch and in favor of more reputable planks in the platform. His crowning offense was offering the following satirical resolution: Res., that the national liberal league, auxiliary leagues and kindred organizations are recommended to consider the propriety and wisdom of allowing the National Congress of Liberal Leagues to denounce all people and powers that be, that said Congress shall be empowered to go at once to work to remedy all evils and cure of the world according to their own very liberal and peculiar ideas. Spenser, was promptly denounced; he thereupon stirred up a hornets nest, still more interesting, by offering the following resolution: RESOLVED, That the Fourth Congress of the National League, recommends to the consideration of all auxiliary leagues and kindred organizations, the propriety and wisdom of turning over the management and control of this organization to the religious sect of Spiritualists, and to practical Erelovers.

The excitement grew very demonstrative and he was forthwith expelled by an almost unanimous vote. In private conversation he afterwards said that he was fully cognizant of the infamous things practiced by those who seemed to be in the majority in the league, and that he was glad to get out of it. The remaining hours of the session were spent in denouncing the expelled member. The whole session so far, has been noisy, garrulous, blasphemous and erratic, as may be inferred from the following section of a speech by one of their members, and listened to with gravity by some of the auditors: Look at my hair—look at my hair—look at my legs—look at my feet—am I a member of the league? Oh! I am a leaguer—a—ah, oh, ah, hoorah, hoorah! Am I a leaguer? Polly, golly, holly, jolly, Oh, what's yer—ah, oh—yer name? Feller—oh, yes, feller, am I a member of the league?

Paris, France, September 20.—The Statue of Thiers was unveiled yesterday at St. Germain in the presence of a large crowd. Jules Simon

delivered the address. Oliver Paine, a radical journalist protested vehemently amidst a scene of great excitement against the erection of the statue. He was arrested in order to protect him from violence by the crowd. Paris, September 20.—De Freycinet falls because in his Mountavan speech he declared the Government would pursue their policy without blustering, which was a reply to Gambetta's Cherburg speech and to the blustering policy therein contained. He falls because he publicly ventured to throw off Gambetta.

Paris, Sept. 20.—A Dulcigno foreign man-of-war has been taking soundings off the coast. This is supposed to be a preparation for a demonstration.

Constantinople, Sept. 20.—The Porte is using its utmost endeavor to avoid a naval demonstration as it fears a general insurrection should it take place.

The Meeting.

Sunday the business men of Las Vegas assembled at Baca Hall for the purpose of taking steps towards securing water works and organizing a fire company. A good attendance was had and all seemed imbued with the necessity of accomplishing something in that direction. Mr. L. P. Browne was chosen chairman of the meeting and R. A. Kistler, secretary. W. P. Shupp, was called on, and stated the object of the meeting. Messrs. Hill, McClung, Wheelock, J. Rosenwald and others, made remarks concerning the business in hand and discussed the most economical and effective method of protecting the city against the repetition of such a dire calamity as has just fallen it. A motion by Maj. Morrison was carried that, a committee of seven be appointed to take the matter under consideration, and correspond with eastern manufacturers as to the price of engines, etc., and also to determine what course had better be pursued.

This committee to report their action to the president of this meeting, who shall then call a meeting of the people by a call in the papers. The following named gentlemen were appointed as said committee: Chas. Blanchard, Mr. Wheelock, W. H. Shupp, Mr. Hill, Trinidad Romero, O. L. Houghton and Jose A. Baca. The meeting then adjourned to await the action of the committee.

Sunday a GAZETTE reporter sought out and talked with most of the business men who lost from Saturday's conflagration. They all seemed to be in good cheer and consider that the present calamity will be a future benefit. They consider now, that all adobe buildings will be built on that block, that the ground is now worth as much as before the wooden buildings were destroyed.

Some cannot tell what their losses will amount to yet, but estimate their losses as follows:

- Ward & Tamme \$4,500, above insurance. Levy, Cohn & Co., about \$9,500 total loss, which is about \$3,000 above insurance. N. L. Rosenthal, estimated at \$9,000. R. C. Richmond, above insurance, \$1,500. Bertholf, Center street theatre, \$4,000, no insurance. Rupe & Castle, between \$9,000 and \$10,000. Hilly Bros. about \$600. E. W. Sebben, \$100. Hopper Bros. above insurance \$1,500. J. A. Mackley, \$4,000, total loss. John Finn, barber, \$100. Herbert, druggist, \$1,500. Malboeuf, saddler, \$1,600, over insurance. Marcus & Clemm lost \$2,500. Marble, where the fire began, total loss of several thousands. Marcellino & Coffa loss \$500. Isidor Steru's loss \$1,400, insured for \$1,100.

A Consistent Temperance Man.

A railway accident happened in Prince Edward Island a few days ago. One of the most severely injured among the passengers hurt was Mr. Thomas Stewart, an old gentleman of eighty-two years, of whom it is said, that, "though a comparatively poor man, he never misses an opportunity of doing all the good he can." It is further said of Mr. Stewart that he was when injured, on an errand of mercy, making a voluntary effort to get some poor debtor out of Georgetown jail. The incident described below in the words of a local report of the accident (Charlotte-town Examiner) exemplifies a sturdy heroic consistency of character too rare in our day. "Mr. Stewart is strictly an abstainer. When the relief train arrived at the scene of the accident, he was laid on the side of road, suffering great pain and apparently nearly dead. **Mineral on Land Grants.**

Having published an opinion in the GAZETTE of a few weeks since, an opinion adverse to land grants, we now publish the following, taken from the News and Press, as representing the other side of the question:

NEWS AND PRESS—1 notice in last week's issue of your paper an article from the Scientific Press which stated that the Supreme Court of the United States had decided in the case of the United States vs Castellero, that grants of land from the Mexican government for agricultural and grazing purposes, did not convey the mineral contained within the grants. This statement, it unexplained, might be calculated to mislead persons unacquainted with the circumstances of the case above mentioned.

Andrés Castellero under a grant from Mexico, claimed a mine of quicksilver in California, and applied to the courts to confirm his title. The courts decided that the grant was not good, because the same was not regularly made by the proper Mexican authorities, and therefore refused to confirm his title. This decision was not in relation to mineral claimed within the limits of an agricultural grant, as Castellero claimed under a "mine grant."

The question of the title to mines of precious metals found within the limits of Mexican grants which have been confirmed and patented by the United States government, was long a subject of litigation in the courts in California, and was finally settled in the decision of the cases of Moore vs. Smaw and Fremont vs. Fowler, which decision is reported in the 17th California Report, p. 199. These were suits brought by the owners of two Mexican grants against persons claiming title to mines on the grants by virtue of locations under the United States laws. The cases were considered and decided together.

The decision, delivered by Chief Justice Field, now associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, is an elaborate discussion of this question, and as it is very long I will give only the principal points of the decision.

After a lengthy review of the facts in the case and the arguments of counsel, the court says:

"The defendants claim that the minerals remained the property of the United States notwithstanding their patents to Fernandez and Fremont. This position is not based upon any language of the patents, for it is admitted that their terms of grant would operate in case of an individual, to pass all the interest which the grantor could possess in the land. It is based upon the supposition that as the act of March 3d, 1851, provides for the recognition and confirmation of the rights acquired by the grants from Mexico, the patents were only intended as evidence on the part of the United States of such recognition and confirmation. By those grants, as we have seen, no interest in the minerals of gold and silver passed to the grantees, and if the patents amount only to an acknowledgement of the rights derived from the former government, that interest still remains in the United States. This view of the patents is not justified by any provisions of the act. The object of the act is to ascertain and settle private land claims in California. This object is declared in the first section. It is not merely to ascertain but to settle the claims, that is to establish them—to perfect them by placing them, as far as the government is concerned, beyond controversy."

Under this act these claims were examined, confirmed, surveyed and patents issued which patents were without words of limitation or reservation, with the exception that they should not affect the interests of persons who had acquired rights in the premises previous to the cession of the territory to the United States by Mexico. The decision then continues:

"The question arises as to what passed by the patents to Fernandez and to Fremont, and to this question there can be but one answer: All the interest of the United States, whatever it may have been, in everything connected with the soil, in everything forming any portion of its bed or fixed to its surface, in everything which is embraced within the signification of

stone, includes not only the surface of the earth but everything under or over it. And therefore he continues, 'if a man grants all his lands, he grants thereby all his mines of metal and other fossils, his woods, his waters, and his houses as well as his fields and meadows.' Such is the view universally entertained by the legal profession as to the effect of a patent from the general government. \*\*\* The construction given by the United States to their patents ever since the organization of the government, has been to the same effect. They have uniformly regarded the patent as transferring all interests which they could possess in the soil and everything connected therewith."

I ask you to give this a place in your paper in order that your readers may have a chance to see both sides of the question.—Correspondent of the News and Press.
