The Republican Members of the House Much Displeased With Tariff Tinkering,

SPEAKER REED'S ROASTED

A NEW GOVERNOR SOON

Washingron, D. C., May 6.— The republican members of the house express themselves as being greatly displeased with the senate amendments to the tariff bill.

Senator Jones, of Arkansas, asked Senator Allison in the course of the debate in the senate, to-day, when the comparative statement to accompany the tariff bill would be ready. Allison replied that the treasury experts were hard at work, and he thought it would be ready by Saturday moraing.

The house agreed, to-day, to meet Mondays and Thursdays only. The motion was bitterly opposed by the democrats, but was adopted by a vote of 101 to 81.

Representative Dalzell exploded a bomb shell in the democratic camp, by reporting the resolution declaring that hereafter the house meet on Mondays and Thursdays, only. Leader Bailey, of the democrats, was on his feet in an instant, is unching into an able plea against the passage of the resolution. Sr. Louis, Mo., May 6 .- The Mound City is gaily decorated, to-day, in honor of the epening of the twenty-seventh festival of the North American gymnastic union. This organization gymnastic union. This organization, formerly known as the Turnerbund, has a membership extending to every state and almost every county in the union, and its international fests, which are held quadrantially, are the great event of every four years in German turner circles, Delegates have been arriving from middle month. German turner circles, Delegates have been arriving from outside points for soveral days, and at the head-quarters of the reception committee it is estimated, this morning, that fully 7,000 members of the rations gymnastic unions of the country are on the ground. No prizes of money or medals are awarded to the winners of the various events, but they are crowned with laurel wreaths and recognized with diplomas, which are highly prized by the victors as rewards of greater value. POWERS INTERFERE

They Will Assert Themselves and Their Intervention Will Stop the War.

THE FATALITIES OF A DAY

The Work of Recovering Bodies From the Awful Ruins in Paris Goes on.

LONDON, England, May 0 .- The news of to-day's situation at Pharsalia is hopelessly conflicting. Both sides claim the victory of yesterday, which was described as the greatest since the beginning of the war. A dispatch from Athens, to day, confirms the re-treat of the Greek army. This is the decisive stroke and ends the struggle. ATHENS, Greece, May 6.—The Greek army, who engaged with the Turkish forces, about Pharsalla, yesterday, have retreated, and taken a position at Demoko, ten miles southwest of that place.

that place.

The retreat of the Greek army from Pharsaila, is explained by the statement that the staff of the crown prince held a council with him, last evening, and decided the move in view of the fact that the Turks were receiving re-inforcements, enabling them to greatly outquimber the Greeks. The success

forcements, enabling them to greatly outnumber the Greeks. The success of the Greek forces in the battle which would have inevitably been fought, to-day, was impossible, and therefore they decided to retire to Domoko.

The government authorities report that the powers have intervened to put an end to the war. They say Greece will accept an armstice, if proposed by the European governments.

The ministers of Great Britain, France, Russia and Italy have been instructed to propose a mediation, and similar instructions to the German and Austrian structions to the German and Austrian ministers are expected every moment,







You say in effect that, 'it umored that on Monday last, the con dissioners of Colfax county, with a ful poard present, decided to continue th hearing of the county-seat-removal mater nutil Tuesday morning, but that in the ffernoon, two of the county commusioners got their heads together and concluded to call an election for June 14th, without taking the precaution to rescind the morn-

"The facts are, sir, that on Monday norning, the board of county commission ers did conclude to defer the county cat-removal matter cutil Tuesday morn ing, but even at the morning session, there was no counsel present representing the

interests of the town of Springer.' "In the afternoon, with the three cor issioners present, one of the commission ers, who in the forenoon voted to defer the consideration of the matter, moved to re meider the action of the board at the norning session, and this motion was carried and the board then proceeded to consider the question of county-seat-remova After a full hoaring of all the facts wit the three commissioners present, the board by a two-thirds majority, decided that all of the preliminary steps necessary secure a special election upon the qu of such removal had been taken, and did order an election to be held upon the 14th of June, for the purpose of determining whether the county seat should be re moved from Springer to Raton or not."

"It may be of interest to add that while the law requires a petition to be presented to the board, signed by qualified electors equal in number to at least half of the vote east at the last general election, that the petition presented to the board of county ioners on last Monday at Springer contained at least 250 names more than that required by law, thus showing even orlor to the election that more than half of the voters of Colfax county favor the removal of the county-seat. Truly, the end is not far distant."
