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THOSE AMENDMENTS

The Republican Members of the House Much Displeas'd With Tariff Tinkering.

SPEAKER REED'S ROASTED

An Unfaithful Spouse is the Cause of the Murder of an Innocent Man.

A NEW GOVERNOR SOON

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 6.—The republican members of the house express themselves as being greatly displeas'd with the senate amendments to the tariff bill.

Senator Jones, of Arkansas, asked Senator Allison in the course of the debate in the senate, to-day, when the comparative statement to accompany the tariff bill would be ready.

The house agreed, to-day, to meet Mondays and Thursdays only. The motion was bitterly opposed by the democrats, but was adopted by a vote of 101 to 81.

Representative Dalzell exploded a bomb shell in the democratic camp, by reporting the resolution declaring that hereafter the house meet on Mondays and Thursdays, only.

McMillin called the speaker an obstructionist, and poured a volley of vitriolic words on the speaker's head. The republicans said nothing, but passed the resolution and the house adjourned, till Monday.

LONDON, England, May 6.—The news of to-day's situation at Pharsalia is hopelessly conflicting. Both sides claim the victory of yesterday, which was described as the greatest since the beginning of the war.

ATHENS, Greece, May 6.—The Greek army, who engaged with the Turkish forces, about Pharsalia, yesterday, have retreated, and taken a position at Demokio, ten miles southwest of that place.

The retreat of the Greek army from Pharsalia, is explained by the statement that the staff of the crown prince held a council with him, last evening, and decided the move in view of the fact that the Turks were receiving reinforcements, enabling them to greatly outnumber the Greeks.

DEADWOOD, S. D., May 6.—R. W. Casey, one of the best known miners in the west, blew his brains out, to-day. He was the first man to locate a claim in Deadwood, and spent seventeen separate fortunes, aggregating \$2,000,000.

DETROIT, Mich., May 6.—The annual meeting of stockholders of the Michigan Central railway company was held here this morning, and the reports for the past year were decidedly satisfactory.

To Fight the Beer Tariff.

CHICAGO, Illinois, May 6.—The Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Louis brewers will combine to fight the increased tax on beer, proposed in the tariff bill.

ATLANTA, Ga., May 6.—It is reported that the Fifth Infantry stationed at Ft. McPherson, has been ordered to Van Couver barracks, in Washington.

Sugar Advances.

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 6.—The sugar trust has begun to screw up prices again. Nos. four and ten grades of domestic refined sugars have advanced 1-16.

Longstreet for Commissioner.

A REMARKABLE FAMILY.

The announcement from Washington, yesterday, that Hon. Stephen Johnson Field, associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, will shortly resign and be succeeded by Judge Nathan Goff, of West Virginia, revives interest in one of the most remarkable families the country has yet produced.

Four brothers, sons of Rev. David Dudley Field, all attained not merely eminence but international fame in their chosen callings and each in his way has left an impress upon the history of his country and the progress of human civilization. David Dudley Field, the eldest of the four sons, was a lawyer of such eminence that he might be classed with Chief Justice Marshall. His most marvelous work was in the line of the codification of civil and criminal procedure, with the object of radically simplifying it, and it has received wide adoption, not only in most of the states of the union, but in the British colonies, besides forming the basis of reforms in the judicature of Great Britain itself.

In his way, Stephen J. Field has been almost as eminent on the bench. Appointed to the supreme court from California in 1863 by President Lincoln, he has already served within a few months of the longest term of service on record.

Cyrus W. Field, the millionaire merchant and manufacturer, achieved a place in history through the building of the Atlantic cable under difficulties which appalled the stoutest-hearted of his supporters.

The oratorical contest to take place at the Missouri university, this evening, mention of which is made in a Columbia press telegram on the first page, will call to mind many reminiscences of the college days of several citizens of New Mexico.

L. F. Natager, president of the Fourth national bank of Wichita, Kansas, who is investing some spare cash in the fleecy fellows, set sail for Arizona points, last evening, he having found prices too stiff for his pocketbook and judgment in this vicinity.

The fourteenth annual session of the New Mexico encampment, G. A. R., is booked to convene in this city on May 7th and 8th, but as yet the local newspapers have not been filled to overflowing with the program of exercises for the patriotic meeting so near at hand.

The territorial auditor has informed the local judicial authorities here that there are \$1,484.76 to the credit of the court fund of this, the fourth, district, this being the balance remaining from the fund on deposit in the Albuquerque national bank, when that institution went to the wall.

The last sad rites over the remains of the late Wm. R. Cullen were performed, this morning, when he was laid to rest, side by side with a sister that had gone before, in the Catholic burying ground. Peace to the ashes of him who, in life, had been his parents' joy, and whose death cast a gloom over those who had known him in former years.

George Buffon, of St. Louis, a traveling agent for a miners' candle that is in general use throughout the west, greeted F. A. Kauterhooker rather cordially at the depot, last evening, and it was subsequently ascertained by an argus-eyed reporter that the two gentlemen were both traveling companions out of Denver, something less than a quarter of a century ago.

Mr. Congressman George W. Cooper, whose home is at Columbus, Indiana, is a guest at the Plaza hotel to-day, the expected gentleman coming up from El Paso and Albuquerque, "to get out of the wet." Hard thing to do, that is, Mr. Cooper, in New Mexico this season. The ex-congressman is widely known throughout the land for his active and able efforts while in congress and he is also no doubt personally known to several Las Vegasans, who will run him to dinner and make him feel at home in this city where so many former congressmen have an abiding place.

ANOTHER VERSION.

A Citizen at Raton Has Something to Say About the County Seat Removal.

A citizen of Raton was approached on the street by an OPTIC reporter, to-day, who immediately proceeded to button-hole him for the news. The reply came: "I noticed in THE OPTIC of last evening, a paragraph, which, to say the least, is very interesting. You say in effect that, it is rumored that on Monday last, the commissioners of Colfax county, with a full board present, decided to continue the hearing of the county-seat-removal matter until Tuesday morning, but that in the afternoon, two of the county commissioners got their heads together and concluded to call an election for June 14th, without taking the precaution to rescind the morning action."

"The facts are, sir, that on Monday morning, the board of county commissioners did conclude to defer the county-seat-removal matter until Tuesday morning, but even at the morning session, there was no counsel present representing the interests of the town of Springer."

"In the afternoon, with the three commissioners present, one of the commissioners, who in the forenoon voted to defer the consideration of the matter, moved to reconsider the action of the board at the morning session, and this motion was carried and the board then proceeded to consider the question of county-seat-removal. After a full hearing of all the facts with the three commissioners present, the board by a two-thirds majority, decided that all of the preliminary steps necessary to secure a special election upon the question of such removal had been taken, and did order an election to be held upon the 14th of June, for the purpose of determining whether the county seat should be removed from Springer to Raton or not."

"I may be of interest to add that while the law requires a petition to be presented to the board, signed by qualified electors equal in number to at least half of the vote cast at the last general election, that the petition presented to the board of county commissioners on last Monday at Springer, contained at least 250 names more than that required by law, thus showing even prior to the election that more than half of the voters of Colfax county favor the removal of the county-seat. Truly, the end is not far distant."

With these remarks, the interview closed and the reporter hastened back to the office to write out his stenographic notes.

A Felice Executed. Anyone who has had the opinion that New Mexico is behind the times, even in such matters as capital punishment, would have been thoroughly convinced of their error, had they witnessed a successful electrocution, which took place at the Las Vegas electric light works, last evening.

The experiment, for such it was, was tried on a cat placed in a wooden cage, with wires running into it so that the "felice" could touch them and a power of 3,000 volts was turned on. The electricity did its deadly work so quickly that the animal was almost entirely consumed before the force could be turned off. Cage, animal and all, were afterwards thrown into the fire-box of the engine and cremated. The reporter's informant was an eye witness and he knows whose cat it was, too. So does somebody else.
