TROLLEY CAR IN FATAL CRASH

FRIGHTFUL ACCIDENT OCCURS ON DENVER TRAMWAY LINE

TWO KILLED; TEN HURT

WOMAN CRUSHED TO DEATH WHILE WALKING ALONG STREET

BUILDING STOPPED RUNAWAY

PLOUGHED WAY THROUGH AUTOMOBILE AND DELIVERY WAGON, WRECKING BOTH

Denver, Colo., Oct. 29.—A man and woman were killed, two people seriously and eight painfully injured this morning when a Seventeenth street trolley car which had become unmanageable on a steep hill, left the rails at the turn into Court Place, crashed through an automobile and delivery wagon and overturned against a building across the sidewalk. Mrs. Minnie Melville, the woman who was killed, was walking along the sidewalk and was caught by the car which turned over on her. Arthur Packer, the chauffeur of an automobile, who was sitting in his seat when the car struck him, was probably fatally hurt. William H. Schrader, who was internally injured, died later at a local hospital.

ARGUING DEMURRER TO HASKELL INDICTMENTS

Ardmore, Okla., Oct. 29.—Arguments were begun before Judge Marshall here today in the demurrer filed by Governor Haskell and his codefendants in the Muskogee town lot cases. It is expected the arguments will consume several days.

SCORE LOSE LIVES IN MINE EXPLOSION

London, Oct. 29.—A score of miners were killed by an explosion in the Rhymney Iron company's colliery in Wales today. Manager Bowen and two companions who attempted to rescue ill-fated miners, were overcome by after damp and also perished.

SUSPICIOUS CHINKS HELD IN JAIL INCOMMUNICADO

A Chinaman passing by the name of Charles Johnson, who speaks the English language well enough to be understood, has been in Las Vegas from French, N. M., for the past week, pawing the very earth in his endeavor to gain admittance to the county jail and have converse with two fellow countrymen.

Their names are Fong Sam and Fong Wing. They were arrested at Dawson, N. M., several days ago, charged with being in the county illegally, and brought to this city. They were arraigned before U. S. Commissioner W. B. Bunker, entered a plea of not guilty to the charge, and were remanded to jail to await the arrival of a Chinese inspector from El Paso, since which time no further action has been taken in the case.

JOHN L. SULLIVAN OFFERS TO REFEREE CHAMPIONSHIP BATTLE

New York, Oct. 29.—Unless an unexpected hitch occurs, articles will be signed by Jeffries and Johnson this afternoon, for a championship heavy-weight battle. Jeffries says he expects little trouble in coming to terms but he wants to wait till next April before fighting so as to give him time for some theatrical engagements. CONFER SCOTTISH RITE DEGREES AT EL PASO

El Paso, Texas, Oct. 29.—Under the direction of the Rio Grande council Knights of Kadosh, the conferring of the Scottish Rite degrees from the 19th to the 32nd is progressing rapidly. The Knights of Kadosh took charge of the reunion which is in progress at the Masonic temple, Wednesday evening, conferring the 19th, 20th and 21st degrees. The work has been continued from day to day and the degrees up to and including the 30th, Knight Kadosh, will be conferred.

This degree is divided into four apartments and at the close of the degree work a smoker will be given in honor of the candidates. Today the 31st and 32nd degrees were given the former this morning and the highest degree, the Master of the Royal Secret, this afternoon. A banquet at the St. Regis hotel this evening will close the reunion.

PROSPERITY REIGNS IN EAST, SAYS DR. LORD

Dr. F. R. Lord, who returned from a month's visit to New York state on the flyer yesterday morning, reports a gradual but general picking up of business throughout the east. He spent most of his vacation with his mother and brother in Schenectady, N. Y., in which city great electric works employing 10,000 people are located. The number of employes has been considerably less than this since the financial depression of last year set in, but the force is now being increased almost daily, and the works are again taking on their usual activity. This is only one of the many evidences of renewed prosperity that came under Dr. Lord's observation on his eastern trip. While absent, he also attended state dental meetings in Albany, N. Y.

SANTA ROSA MURDER MYSTERY MAY BE SOLVED

Santa Rosa, N. M., Oct. 29.—The murderer of the late Sallie Hatton, whose death at the hands of some unknown fiend plunged this section into excitement several weeks ago, may yet fall into the clutches of justice. Sergeant W. E. Dudley of the mounted police, who has been working quietly and persistently in the case, is again in Santa Rosa following the trail, and it is said he has secured a partial confession from a friend of the man who did the horrible deed. While the authorities will not give any information it is believed that an arrest will be made in a day or two which will lead to the unraveling of the mystery.

WELL KNOWN EDUCATOR AN INSURANCE AGENT

Albuquerque, N. M., Oct. 29.—It is announced at the New Mexico headquarters of the Pacific Mutual Life insurance company, that Dr. W. G. Tight, former president of the University of New Mexico, and an educator of wide reputation, has become associated with the Pacific Mutual Life insurance company and will have charge of its business in the Pecos valley. Dr. Tight took the position after careful consideration and to do so turned down several offers to take charge of universities in the southwest.

GREEK NAVAL OFFICERS REVOLT

SEIZE ARSENAL ON ISLAND OF SALAMIS AND DEFEY GOVERNMENT

SITUATION VERY GRAVE

NOT KNOWN WHETHER FLEET WILL JOIN MUTINEERS OR NOT

LEADER WANTS CABINET JOB

LIEUTENANT TIBALDES DEMANDS APPOINTMENT AS MINISTER OF MARINE

Athens, Greece, Oct. 29.—An actual revolt has broken out in the Greek navy. A band of naval officers has seized the arsenal on the island of Salamis and are now entrenched. They met with no opposition.

Lieutenant Tibaldes, who heads the revolt, is commander of a fleet of torpedo boats and submarines. He demands that he be appointed minister of marine and threatens if this is not done he will overthrow the government and make himself dictator. If he succeeds in winning over the fleet it is believed he will be able to do this.

The Greek naval fleet is anchored at Keratsini and it has not yet been declared whether it will side with the mutineers or not. The minister of marine is heavily guarded and great excitement prevails in this city.

Lieut. Tibaldes is now said to have won over the officers and men of the torpedo boats and will use them to destroy the rest of the fleet. He holds the arsenal and all the ammunition and the fleet is helpless before him. A regiment of infantry and a battery of artillery have been sent to Salamis.

MURDERER SPIRITED AWAY TO PREVENT A LYNCHING

Kansas City, Oct. 29.—Discovering that the farmers of Wyandotte county, in which the murders were committed, were becoming ugly, Sheriff Becker last night transferred James McMahon, the confessed triple murderer, to the city jail in Kansas City, Mo. The farmers then dispersed.

EVIDENCE IN SENSATIONAL DIVORCE ABOUT FINISHED

New York, Oct. 29.—The testimony in the Astor divorce suit has practically been concluded and the papers will be submitted to Justice Mills of the supreme court by Referee Young shortly. The papers will be sealed and their contents kept from the public.

INSANE MAN ATTEMPTS TO CREMATE HIMSELF

New York, Oct. 29.—Believing that he was possessed of the devil, Daniel E. Hurley built a bonfire in the middle of Fiftieth street today and jumped into the flames, fighting his rescuers. When he was dragged from the fire he was so badly burned that he may die.

KIDS MUST NOT COMMIT ACTS OF VANDALISM ON HALLOWE'EN

Now that the weird hours of Halloween are approaching the police are confronted with their yearly problem, how can the proposition be most successfully handled.

For one thing, the department has no idea of permitting the past deprecations which have been committed. To bring about the change they have decided upon several new methods, a few of which will be made public and the others will be kept secret.

For one thing, the parents of young fellows of a certain age who are out after nine o'clock will be held accountable for their actions. Those over this age, upon apprehension, will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. In case a person under age commits an act of vandalism he will be accompanied by his home by the officer and the parents will be arrested and prosecuted in place of the offender. This one fact is expected to eliminate a large per cent of the past deprecations.

TAFT SPENDS TODAY AT NATCHEZ

RECEIVES WARM WELCOME

GIVEN AN AUTO RIDE AND MAKES BRIEF ADDRESS ON RIVER BLUFF

Natchez, Miss., Oct. 29.—President Taft, on the Oleander, arrived here at 9:40 o'clock this morning. The president was three hours late, because of crowding in the Vicksburg ship canal last night and boiler trouble on the Oleander. He was given an auto ride to the Court of Honor on a bluff overlooking the river, where he made a short address, joking the congressmen about the poker games which have taken place on the congressional boat during the trip.

There has been intense rivalry among the river boats for the second place in line to the Oleander and many exciting brushes, reminiscent of old days on the river, have taken place.

The president left for Baton Rouge this afternoon, expecting to reach there at 10 o'clock tonight.

TAFT COCKTAIL LATEST DRINK

New Orleans, Oct. 29.—In honor of President Taft, a new drink, known as the "Taft Cocktail," has been invented and all New Orleans is drinking it. It has always been the custom to celebrate the arrival of prominent visitors in New Orleans by the invention and christening of a new drink. Thus were invented the Sazerac cocktail, the Sarah Bernhardt and the Ramos Flizz.

PRAIRIE FIRE RAGING IN SOUTH DAKOTA

Dallas, S. D., Oct. 29.—A terrific prairie fire, three miles wide, is raging in Tripp county. The towns of Lamro and McNeely were saved with difficulty. The entire population is fighting the flames, which have already done much damage to crops and homes.

McFARLAND AND CYCLONE THOMPSON TO MIX IT

Chicago, Oct. 29.—A bout between Packer McFarland and Cyclone Johnny Thompson has been arranged to take place here next Sunday before the West Side Athletic club of New Orleans.

CATCHER KLING KNOWS NOTHING ABOUT TRADE

Kansas City, Oct. 29.—John Kling, the Chicago catcher, denies all knowledge of a deal which is said to have been made to trade him to New York for Pitcher George Wiltse and \$7,500.

CONVICTS PUT TO WORK ON THE SCENIC HIGHWAY

This afternoon a gang of twenty-six convicts from the territorial penitentiary, arrived overland from Watrous, where they have been employed for some time past on the northern end of the scenic highway, and went into camp at the hot springs.

The prisoners are in charge of J. D. Meriwether, who acts as general overseer, and several guards. They will be put to work immediately repairing this end of the scenic highway up Galinas canyon, which is sorely in need of fixing.

It is expected that the work will require a month's time. The bringing of the convicts to San Miguel county will be received with much satisfaction by the people of this city, who take a special pride in the Las Vegas end of the scenic highway, which is by far the prettiest mountain drive in the southwest.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS PLAN BIG INITIATION

At a regular meeting last night of Knights of Columbus Council No. 804, at O. R. C. hall, it was decided to hold a meeting the last week in November for the exemplification of the three degrees. Already there are about twenty candidates for initiation at that time and between now and then it is expected to double this number, making about forty candidates for instruction into the mysteries of this secret society. Last night's meeting was largely attended and following the routine business, those present enjoyed an impromptu luncheon and good time generally. The local K. C. council is growing at a rapid rate.

HELD TO GRAND JURY FOR BREAKING CAR SEAL

In Justice Murray's court yesterday afternoon, Joaquin Labrado and Gerónimo Ascarate were bound over to the grand jury on the charge of having broken the seal of a box car at Watrous and riding to this city, where they were nabbed by an officer.

Under the statutes of New Mexico this is burglary, a penitentiary offense, and the law is such that, though the seal was broken in Mora county, the guilty parties may be prosecuted here, where their capture was effected.

PACIFIC COAST SHAKEN BY EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS

San Francisco, Oct. 29.—Slight earthquake shocks were felt throughout northern California and southern Oregon at 1:30 o'clock this morning. These lasted twenty-five seconds and did only nominal damage.

CELEBRATION AT STOCKTON CONTINUES UNABATED

Stockton, Calif., Oct. 29.—Parades representing the advance in transportation methods was a feature of the gold rush celebration here today. The parade was followed by bronco busting contests.

GOTHAM MAYORALTY CAMPAIGN GROWING FAST AND FURIOUS

New York, Oct. 29.—With New York's municipal election only three working days distant, there was a general summing up of issues last night by the eight hundred speakers who presented the causes of Gaynor, Bannard and Hearst to audiences in every corner of Greater New York.

Gaynor speaking four times to audiences in Brooklyn, Manhattan and the Bronx returned to his plea for greater personal liberty for the abolition of police "czarship" and tyranny in the enforcement of minor laws. Bannard, republican candidate, told several mass meetings that he stood "first, last and all the time for business administration in a Tammany-Free city."

TOM JOHNSON HAS CLOSE CALL

ENRAGED FOREIGNER COMES NEAR SHOOTING CLEVELAND'S MAYOR

CAUSES BIG SENSATION

FIRST RUMORED THAT ATTEMPT WAS MADE TO ASSASSINATE HIM

FIRED THROUGH WINDOW

MUNICIPAL OFFICIAL AND COMPANION WERE ENTERING CAFE AT TIME

Cleveland, Oct. 29.—A big sensation was caused here at noon today, when a rumor gained circulation that an attempt had been made to assassinate Mayor Tom L. Johnson in the downtown district.

The report was based on the fact that an Austrian, named Olanek, shot through the window of a cafe from the sidewalk, where he had been ejected after having been refused a drink inside.

It happened that Mayor Johnson and a friend entered the cafe at the same moment, but the shot went wild, and the mayor was in no danger.

Olanek was promptly arrested and hustled to jail in a patrol wagon.

ASHES OF DEAD WOMAN IN FINAL RESTING PLACE

Richmond, Va., Oct. 29.—The ashes of Mrs. Margaret Howell Jefferson Davis Hayes were placed at rest today in the Davis family plot at Hollywood cemetery.

DISASTROUS FOREST FIRE IN ARIZONA

El Paso, Texas, Oct. 29.—A big forest fire is raging in the Huachuca National forest in Arizona and troops from Fort Huachuca have been ordered out to fight the flames. Much valuable timber has already been destroyed.

It is believed the fire was started by sheep herders to get revenge for having their flocks driven from the ranges by the government.

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## NEW MEXICO NEWS

Good Roads Engineer C. H. Neal at Santa Fe is at work drawing an irrigation map of the territory.

B. H. Gifford, owner of the Leopold and Pinos Altos stage line, died this week at Silver City of tuberculosis.

Suit for divorce was filed yesterday in the district court for Torrance county, by Joseph C. Terry vs. Nanny Terry, on the ground of abandonment.

Governor Curry has appointed the following notaries: Sidney M. Parker, Alamogordo, Otero county; Arthur W. Cameron of Cameron, Quay county.

Edward C. Slocum, a prominent citizen of Artesia, pleaded guilty in the United States district court at Roswell, to the charge of sending obscene matter through the mails. He was fined \$250 and costs.

A coroner's jury at Boaz, Chaves county, returned the verdict that U. S. Commissioner Robert L. Banks came to his death by a blow with some blunt instrument in the hands of Tobias Stewart and Roy Woolfster of Roswell.

Good Roads Engineer C. H. Neal has returned to Santa Fe from the Estancia valley, where he went to hire men to work on the Santa Fe-Albuquerque scenic highway, giving employment to men in the valley who had suffered by reason of the drought and short crops.

The Philadelphia Copper Mines company yesterday filed papers with Territorial Secretary Nathan Jaffa at Santa Fe, changing its by-laws so as to permit of the election of ten directors. The company's headquarters are at Hanover, Grant county, and the New Mexico agent is B. F. Baker.

At a meeting of Albuquerque lodge 481, B. F. O. E., committees were appointed to prepare a program and arrange other details for a memorial service in memory of the deceased members, the service to take place in Elks' opera house, Sunday, December 1. It is planned to make the coming service very solemn and impressive.

Charles Napp, lessee of the famous Craig orchards at Lone Mountain, near Silver City, N. M., has sent two carloads of apples and a carload of cider, to be exhibited at the fair in El Paso, Texas, and is confident that he will capture some of the laurels hitherto worn by the apple growers of the Mesilla and Pecos valley of New Mexico.

The will of the late James J. Hagerman, millionaire, and father of ex-Governor H. J. Hagerman of New Mexico, was filed for probate this week in Roswell. His large estate, including a big ranch in the Pecos valley, is left to his widow, Anna A. Hagerman. His sons, Governor Hagerman and Percy Hagerman of Colorado, are made executors without bond.

The mayor will swear in thirty special policemen at Santa Fe, who will protect property on Halloween night and will promptly arrest any person caught defacing or destroying property or any children on the streets after 9 o'clock in the evening. No exceptions will be made for any one as the mayor is determined to prevent all mischief and damage to property this year.

Supervisor Stewart of the Pecos forest has finished examining a big class of candidates who took the civil service examination of the forest service at Santa Fe this week. All examination papers will be sent at once to headquarters at Washington and later the result will be announced. Mr. Stewart states that it was the very best class of men who have ever taken the examination.

J. C. Dunn of Alamogordo has arrived in El Paso to take charge of the Otero county exhibit at the El Paso fair. The Otero county exhibit took second prize for community exhibits at the Albuquerque fair and Mr. Dunn believes it will do as good or better at El Paso. Mr. Dunn took with him to El Paso supplies of fruit, vegetables, etc., to freshen up the exhibit and make it to all intents and pur-

Col. F. S. Chadbourne of San Francisco is visiting at the home of his son, Superintendent M. O. Chadbourne of the Albuquerque Traction company in the Duke city. Col. Chadbourne is a former state harbor commissioner who built the great ferry depot in San Francisco; he is a retired officer on the staff of the governor of California and has been engaged in the furniture business on a large scale in San Francisco, Portland, Ore., Seattle, Los Angeles and San Diego. Col. Chadbourne is one of the best known men on the Pacific coast.

The Mesilla valley produce exchange has received returns from the car of Spanish onions shipped to Chicago, and after all expense of handling, such as crates, freight, brokerage commission, etc., the grower gets 1-1/4 cents per pound. The estimated cost of production, according to data from the records at the agricultural college, varies from \$75 to \$100 per acre and the yield from 40,000 pounds to 60,000 pounds. Taking the minimum of 40,000 pounds yield and the maximum cost of production of \$100 per acre, would show a profit, even at one cent per pound, of \$300 to the grower.

The Los Angeles Times has the following concerning L. R. Thompson, until recently of Albuquerque. The "See Lundeen for Homes company" reports that W. A. White has exchanged his home at El Monte, containing forty acres, highly improved, to L. R. Thompson, for the southwest corner of Maple and Thirty-fifth street, containing a frontage of 110 feet, improved with two apartment buildings, one containing thirty-four rooms and the other sixteen, at a price of \$32,000, together with a nine-room house at No. 535 South Chicago, valued at \$5,000. Mr. White paid a difference of \$7,000.

From five to six years in the penitentiary was the sentence Judge Abbott gave Charles Buckman, 24 years old, when Buckman appeared before the court in Albuquerque to answer to the charge of a statutory crime. It is possible Buckman will not serve out the full time, as clemency will probably be asked in his case. Buckman induced Marguerite Chaves, 13 years old, to run away from home with him and they walked to the mountains east of the city, the trip consuming most of the night. The

girl cried most of the way out, so when they reached the mountains they turned about and came back to town.

A carload of eight-inch pipe for which Glass & Fischer, contractors in charge of the new sewer system construction, have been waiting for several weeks, has arrived in Albuquerque, and the delay in getting started on the new sewer is about over.

At the home of the bride's parents in Albuquerque, a very pretty and informal wedding took place yesterday, in which Miss Kathryn Hanly, formerly of Bozeman, Mont., now of Albuquerque, and Ralph G. McComb, a young gentleman of Montana, were united in marriage. The wedding occurred at 4 p. m., Rev. Warren officiating.

Charles Whiteman, commanding officer of the signal corps at Roswell, has notified all members who wish to join to sign up the muster roll in order that they may attend the interstate encampment in Texas next summer. Commanding Officer Whiteman states in a public communication that all who desire to attend the interstate encampment must be eligible six months in advance.

Upon the spirit shown by those attending a meeting of all those interested in the Highland electric railway to be held in Albuquerque tonight, in all probability depends the fate of that project. At the last meeting, held three weeks ago, in the city library building, it was decided not to call another meeting until at least \$15,000 had been raised.

Then it was planned to call the stockholders together, incorporate and proceed with the construction of the road.

It has been known to two or three only that some three weeks ago a prospector found a rich gold vein of tractive quartz within ten miles of San Marcial. The assays average about \$11 per ton from the surface specimens. A decision of the United States supreme court on a point at issue in another case where the right of location is effected will decide shortly the opening up and operating of this vein. It is thought rich enough to ship from the beginning.

Fire Wednesday night, totally destroyed the two-story, four-room brick school house in Socorro, causing a loss of \$4,000, covered by insurance. It was a few minutes after 10 o'clock when the flames were discovered, and the building was a total loss in spite of all efforts to save it. Luckily the night was a still one, or the whole north end of town would probably have been destroyed. The origin of the fire is a mystery. The building was being used regularly, but there was no fire in any of the rooms Wednesday. As yet the problem of a school building in which the burned out pupils may be housed has not been solved.

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**LESSENING DANGERS OF TRAVEL.**

The railways of the country are now ordering many steel passenger coaches, as well as steel freight cars, and it is stated that one of the principal reasons for so doing is their greater safety in cases of accident and the lessening of the dangers from fire after accidents occur.

This recalls the fact that within the past few weeks the well known steamship *Lucania*, of the Cunard line, took fire at her dock in Liverpool, and notwithstanding the exceedingly good fire precaution always existing upon the steamers of that line, and despite the assistance of the fire boats in the harbor and of the fire department of the city, those in command were compelled to sink the vessel at the dock in order to extinguish the flames.

This is one of the best guarded from fire of all the vessels afloat and in the best protected port of England. It was ascertained that the fierceness of the fire was owing to the rapid burning of the wooden trimmings of the steamship and to the inflammable nature of the furniture and fittings of the cabins and salons.

Suppose that the fire had occurred in midocean with a full crew and ample list of passengers to be taken care of, what a tale of disaster and loss of life would probably have reached all the continents!

It is high time that the steamship companies look for fireproof vessels and thus eliminate one more of the dangers of the ocean.

With the now low price of aluminum and the ease with which it can be adapted to various forms and shapes its resistance to atmospheric influences peculiar to the ocean and its well known lightness as compared

with other metals it would seem possible to use it in a great measure and to great advantage in place of wood in steamship construction.

The grills and fret works used as ornamentation to such great extent in nearly every class of floating craft should either be made of metal or else would be readily dispensed with by the passengers whose safety is endangered by such light trumpery kindling stuff, ready to shoot into flames with the touch of a match or the lingering spark of a cigar.

Safety is the prime requisite of all travel, and both railway companies and steamship owners will receive full recompense in patronage for the expense they undergo and the care they take in safeguarding the lives of their passengers.

Collision at sea is largely guarded against now by the wireless and the submarine warning devices, and the next great step should be in the direction of fireproof vessels.

Numberless conventions, congresses and meetings have been held to promote the great conservation movement throughout the United States. Now comes the National Conservation association, organized with the especial sanction of President Taft and his cabinet, with headquarters in New York. It is the purpose of this association to enroll hundreds of thousands of members. Every citizen of the United States is eligible, and everyone who joins will have a better chance to help in promoting the splendid cause of conservation.

The fact that the association is headed by Dr. Charles W. Elliot, formerly president of Harvard university, gives assurance of dignity and sincerity of purpose of a plan for effective organization among the progressive citizens of this country and the most forceful possible presentation of the measures and methods best calculated to conserve the natural resources.

This great movement is not for the present alone. It represents foresight and an intelligent anticipation of future conditions and needs. It touches the problems of the national fuel supply, of water power, of water transportation, of forestry and the timber supply, of reclamation of swamp and arid lands, of good roads, of more intensive farming—in short, the whole great field of national possession and duty which President Roosevelt invited the nation to contemplate as it never had been contemplated before. Are you ready to enlist?

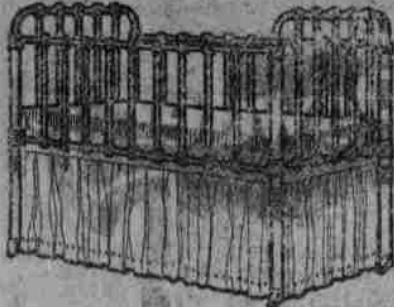

This resolution was a substitute for one offered by a member of the audience in which he sought to have the meeting declare a lack of faith upon the part of the entire people of Montana in all matters about which Dr. Cook has made claims.  
While the action of the meeting was unfavorable to Dr. Cook, the explorer took it coolly and calmly and after the meeting evidenced no indications of having taken the matter to heart. He sat for a long time chatting pleasantly with interested listeners regarding his trip to the pole.
