WASHINGTON, D. C., April 6.—In the opening proceedings of the senate, to-day, Mr. Allison, chairman of the committee on appropriations, reported the amendments to the sundry civil bill, giving notice that he would call them up some time next week.

At 2 p. m., Mr. Morgan was shut off by the regular order, the bankruptcy bill, and his resolution went back to the calendar.

THE STARVING POOR.

Capitalists, Irrigation Congress and Salvation Army Planning for Their Relief.

DENVER, Colo., April 6.—E. R. Moses, chairman, and Judge J. S. Emory, national lecturer of the national irrigation congress and Commander Booth-Tucker, of the Salvation Army, arrived here this morning and are now in conference.

Wanted to Hear Bryan.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 6.—The old senate chamber of congress, where the supreme court now holds its sessions, was packed, to-day, long before the court was called to order.

Called on the President.

William J. Bryan called on President McKinley, this morning. This was the first time the two men had met since they were in congress together.

River Situation Unchanged.

St. Louis, Missouri, April 6.—Contrary to the predictions of the weather bureau, the Mississippi river remained stationary during last night, but began to rise slowly this morning.

St. Louis, Mo., April 6.—A special telegram to Scripps-McKee Press Association says: The river is falling at Helena, Ark., and at Greenville, Mississippi.

Two Suspects Arrested.

OMAHA, Nebraska, April 6.—The Union Pacific railway has caused the arrest of a second man, Thomas Hobbs, charged with the Utah train robbery.

New Nominations.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 6.—The president, to-day, sent to the senate the following nominations: Theodore Roosevelt, of New York, to be assistant secretary of the navy; Captain Crowlins, to be United States navy chief of the bureau of navigation.

SHILOH BATTLEFIELD.

A Reunion of the Survivors of That Bloody Engagement.

PITTSBURGH, Tenn., April 6.—A reunion of the survivors of the battle of Shiloh—those that wore the gray as well as those that wore garbed in blue—opened to-day on that famous battlefield. This is the thirty-fifth anniversary of the commencement of the battle, and the reunion is under the auspices of the Shiloh battlefield association, composed of ex-soldiers, union and confederate, and which was organized several years ago.

A MUNICIPAL FRANCHISE.

An Application by the Authorities of Liverpool for a Railroad Permit.

LONDON, England, April 6.—The parliamentary committee on municipal franchises met, to-day, for the purpose of hearing evidence in support of the application of the lord mayor and town council of Liverpool, for permission to purchase the entire street railroad system of that city, and which, if the necessary permission is granted, will hereafter be operated in conjunction with the water works and gas works as a part of the municipal system.

FEDERAL GRAND JURY.

It Convenes in Chicago To-day, With Special Matters in View.

CHICAGO, Illinois, April 6.—The federal grand jury for the spring term was sworn in, to-day. It is composed of substantial city business men and farmers from adjacent counties, and is an exceptionally strong body.

Sunday School Conventions.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 6.—The annual convention of the California State Sunday school association, which opened in the First Baptist church, to-day, is the greatest gathering of the kind ever assembled in this state.

No Commission Outing.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 6.—Secretary Long disposed of the rumor that a commission is going to Hawaii on the "Philadelphia," declaring that no such thing is contemplated.

The Last Race.

NICE, France, April 6.—The "Allan" and "Britannia" sailed the last race of the season, to-day, over the course from Nice to Monaco and back for the prize of seven years.

Stated for Office.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 6.—Senator Thos. C. Platt, of New York, had a talk with President McKinley, to-day. The senator confirmed the report that Lester Stearns, of Dunkirk, N. Y., has been selected for third assistant postmaster-general.

The Senate Fe Election.

SANTA FE, N. M., April 6, 1897.—The city election is proceeding, with no difficulties. The result is in doubt, though Charles Haspelmath, democrat, is slightly in the lead.

Anti-Cartoon Bill Passed.

ALBANY, New York, April 6.—The senate to-day passed the anti-cartoon bill, which prohibits newspapers from publishing portraits of any person, without their consent.

Steamer Wrecked.

LONDON, England, April 6.—The British steamer "Grantor-Burnside" has been wrecked off Bueca Vista, Portugal. Three of the ship's company were drowned.

Declines to Accept.

VIENNA, Austria, April 6.—Count Bezesin, the Austrian premier, has refused a letter from the emperor, in which his majesty declines to accept the cabinet's resignation.

THE MURDERED MAN.

Sheriff Romero Makes a Trip Down to the Scene of the Bloody Deed.

Sheriff Hilario Romero went down to Libera, on Saturday night, to investigate the killing of Albert Langstaff, who was found dead near Santa, a little east, about one mile. The sheriff made a very thorough investigation and found that there were the tracks of two men, leading down the railroad, and a little off from the track. These two men had been sitting on the ground, the prints being plainly visible. At this point, a struggle had occurred and there was blood. Then the two men had gone back a few yards to the railroad track and down the track to a bridge crossing an arroyo. Here they went to an arroyo and a severe struggle occurred and there was much blood. The men returned to the track and near a tie was much blood. There are the indications found by the sheriff. Wounds were inflicted on the right arm, the leaders were cut off near the wrist and some cuts on the left hand; a large and deep cut on the head with some sharp instrument, probably a razor, no blunt bruises; three cuts on the back of the neck near the head; one cut near the left ear and a cut across the throat. This cut was only slight, not sufficient to cause death. The artery was not cut across. His clothes were very bloody and dirty, indicating that after he was cut he had fallen on the ground. On the top of the head, in the line of the cut, is a small hole piercing the skull, indicating a shot from a pistol. No clue to the murderers could be found.

W. H. Langstaff, a brother of the murdered man, went down the road, last evening, with his little daughter. He resides at Cripple Creek, Colo., and deals in miners' supplies at Altam, that state, whether the body may likely be shipped for final interment, unless it be found to be a decomposed condition. The brother stated to an OPTIC reporter on the train, last evening, that the dead man had been absent from home about five years, latterly being employed in the Hill Canon mining district, out from Albuquerque. He had money in his possession and this fact is undoubtedly at the bottom of the murder.

The lady operator at Santa station heard a human being groaning on the fatal night and inquiring, almost inaudibly, "Won't you help a dying man?" She of course became greatly alarmed and awakened her sleeping husband, who instituted a search, but found nobody. Subsequently, the dead man was discovered a mile and a half away. As he could not have traveled that distance, mortally wounded as he was, it is thought probable that another lifeless body will be found in that immediate locality.

A Sheriff's Accidental Shooting.

It seems that the shooting of Luciano B. Gallegos, sheriff of Union county, was purely accidental and unavoidable. It occurred in this manner: On Friday evening last, it having been rumored that a mob intended lynching the four men accused of killing two Chinamen in Clayton, the sheriff had placed extra guards around the jail, and on taking a ride to one of them, as he passed from one room to another, his foot tripped on a blanket, throwing him, and in the fall the rifle exploded, the bullet striking him in the right kidney, ranging upward and lodging just below the heart, death following in a few minutes.

TO-DAY'S CITY ELECTION.

The city election, to-day, has been a tame affair in the extreme, considering the amount of bad blood engendered by the parties at the primaries and conventions.
