CHICAGO, Illinois, April 6 .- The extraordinary interest felt in the mu nicipal election to-day was evidenced by the long line of voters who were already at the polling booths all over the city when the polls opened, at 6 o'clock this morning.

There are in the city a total of 1,100 voting places, the number having been considerably increased since the November election. Ordinarily, Chicago is republican, by a normal majority of 40,000, although in November it gave McKinley nearly 60,000. With four candidates for mayor in the field, however, the outcome of the contest for mayor, which is the chief feature of the election, is decidedly problematical. A total vote of a quarter of a million is looked for, and the republican callmate gives Bears 110,000; Harrison 80,000; Hesing 50,000, and Harian 10,000. The democratic figures simply reverse the vote claimed by the republicans for Bears and Harrison.

Ex-Postmaster Hesing has been iosing strength during the past few days, while John M. Harian, who has been making a "center rush" campaign, it admitted to have made great gams. The contest is purely between Sears and Harrison, the outcome depending entirely on the support Jdrawn by Harlan from the republican ranks and by Mr. Hasing from the democratic forces. PARTISAN CITY ELECTIONS. Mr. William G. Low, of Brooklyn, N. Y., brother of President Seth Low, of Columbia vollege, of Brooklyn, and an active member of the executive committee of the national municipal league, in direussing non-partisanship in municipal affairs, says, among other things, that, possibly the greatest stumbling block in the way of improvement of our American municipal conditions is the habit citizens have of voting according to their party affiliations on national questions. So strong is this habit, that even carnest reformers have questioned as to whether it is practicable to overcome it. But overcome it should be, if we are to have in telligent and effective voting upon municipal issues. So long as citizens vote according to the badge of the national party'allegiance which they wear, so far do they surrender their free judgment and their intelligent consideration of, and accurate action upon, municipal questions. Moreover, another thing happens and that is that in subordinating themselves in municipal affairs to the direction of a national party and those who are in charge of its machinery, they subordinate and too often sacrifice the municipal interests to the interests, not so much of the nation as of the national party and those who profit by the party's success, either actually or in expectation. They suffer themselves and their city and its interests to be treated as pawns in a larger game played upon a national board. It will not do to say that national fellow-partisanship can be trusted

The British Labor Department.

LONDON, England, April 5.—The report of the labor department of the government board of trade for the month ending March 15th states that conditions continue to improve, the more fully employed and the percentage of unemployed members of trade-unions in the most important groups of trades showing a decided decline. The returns of 115 of the principal tradeopions, having an aggregate membership of 500,000, show that a fraction of less then 3 per cent, of their members were unemployed during the month ending on the date given. 
