Is gold found at Hillshore in quartz weins or in placers? In both, but prinsipally in fissure veins. Between two and three hundred claims have been lointed on these veins which show pay ore at the surface and the work done on these varies from mere assessment holes to the principal mines that have been developed to a depth of 500 feet,

What is the nature of the ore? Copper and Iron sulphide and some comparatively free milling quartz. With depth the ore becomes smelting and concentrating material. The percentage of copper in the ore shipped to the emelters is from one to twelve unitsin concentrates sometimes as high as twenty units. Silica in crude ore from forty to eighty-five, Smelter certificates show the ore to carry from two to fourteen ounces of gold, from three to sixty onness sliver. The bulk of the ore and concentrates shipped, however, will average about \$70 per ton.

Has there been any large production? The Opportunity group has produced \$3,000 tons of ore and over half a mil-Lon dollars. The Bonanza mine 7,000 tons and \$200,000. The Richmond 5,000 tons and over \$200,000. These are the jargest producers so far.

Are the milling facilities good? Practically they are not-the saving has been from fifty to seventy five pet cent, at the best. A modern custom saill is badly needed and a fortune awaits the parties who will build one. Will the owners let go easy, or do they want the earth? They are reasonable people, but they are not giving away their mines, or giving bonds on tongtime rainbows. That min, sas become the largest producing and the best paying in the district and the owners would now ask a very large sum. The greatly impro 'ed price of copper and lower smelting rates have of late been very beneacial to these mines. With a good mill the progress would be

What are ore pelghts? From the mine to the El Paso smelter from \$6 to \$7 per ten; from mine to mill 75 cents to \$1.50 per ton.

What is the geological formation? An eruptive country rock, by the experts classed as Andesite; the ore veins are found accompanying dikes of fine grained felsite and birdseye porphyry which cut through the country northeast and southwest. Most of the veins are fairly easy working, on drift contracts prices have been from \$3 to \$6 per foot. Incline shafts on vein are cheaply driven, but vertical shafts in country rock have generally been found very expensive.

Is there much snow in winter? Not enough to swear by; the climate, winter and summer, is, from a miner's point of view, perfect. No snowslides and no pneumonia for the miner to dread.

is there much placer mining? There to an extensive piacer field which is open to locators and there are slways some men at work who make from \$1 to \$5 per day. An occasional nueget brings up the average, Of course some snen are luckler than others, here as elsewhere. Most of the gold is found within a few feet of the surface. The miners scoop up the pay streak dirt and run it through dry washing machines. The nearest water is distant five miles and about 400 feet below the gold level. Several companies have been formed to work these placers on a high scale, but the lumense cost of bringing in sufficient water has made the project appear of doubtful profit. A new company has recently been orgaptized to exploit this field with a machine of the Bucyrus type-this is wobably the very best method and

The Advocate is constantly receiving : At Lake Valley from only three claims years and with very great profit-over \$6,000,000. At Hermosa and at Chloride there was also some very profit able sliver mining. No great fortunes have been made yet in the gold districts, but from the Placers and the Trippe, Richmond and Snake mines very respectable sums have been made by lesseen. Is the decrease in silver output due

to the decline in allver, or to the exhaustion of the ore bodies? The very rich ore bodies, so far as known, have been practically exhausted, and the search for more is greatly discontinued. The decline in silver operates against the medium grades and the want of proper reduction works prevents the profitable working of the inexhaustible bodies of low grade ores. The experiments made in concentration have not been thorough enough; neither Wilfleys, vanners or Jigs are by themselves sufficient. In a modern mill the ore goes through a series of processes and each process will save from forty to sixty per cent of the value in the pulp that comes to it, so that the fallings finally flow off with a triffing loss. In this field there is a fine opening and a certain profit for the investment of capital.

Is the mineral field thoroughly ex plored, or is there still a chance for intelligent prospectors? There are hundreds of square miles in the mineral belt yet anexplored. It is not likely that the first wave of prospectors found all the treasures that nature has stored in the hills. The great deposits of silver chlorides and sulphides found in the Bridal Chamber at Lake Valley and in several Kingston mines have their counterparts waiting for the lucky man, but the bills, like the Scriptures, must be intelligently searched before they give up their treasures. The prospector can work all the year: if anything, perhaps better in winter time. Many of the mines, also, are open to leasing and the chances of thus striking rich deposits are worth consideration. Long time and very liber al leases are the rule.

What about the recent discoveries re ported of rich gold and silver tellurium ores? They are found so far on one claim on Trujillo creek, about six miles south of Kingston, Between \$20,000 and \$30,000 has already been realized on sale of ore. All this has been in small bunches of ore close to the surface. Quite a number of miners and prospectors are going into this new field. The ore is found in both fissure and contact veins and there is a large field still only partially prospected. Some very large veins of lead-silver ore-forty to fifty feet wide and averaging over five per cent, lead ore are being investigated. A Kansas City company is now at work and building a mill for one of these groups. Lead ore is also found in richer condition, solid galena boulders of great size are quite common and indicate the possibility of great deposits in the contact veins. Not far from these ore deposits there are large and extensive veins of coal of fine quality. These mines and deposits have been known to exist for some years, but it is only lately that any real attention has been paid them. It looks now as if the Caballos will become the foremost mining section of the county. The new owners of the Armendariz grant, which includes a portion of the coal and mineral lands. are going in for a liberal system of lease or sale of their property, and they will extensively advertise their inducements. All of this district is within a few miles of the A., T. & S. F. main line railroad, with a freight charge of about \$2 per ton to the El Paso smelter. No better market for ore than El Paso can be got at present, as the smelter there meets all rates offered from more distant points. and the great saving in time is much to the advantage of the miner. Other promising fields with extensive deposits of lead ore suitable for concentration are found in the Carpenter district, six miles southwest of Kingston, and on the Machlo, a few miles south of Lake Valley.

In there any good land still open to settlement? Fully 25,000 acres of first and second bottom lands on the Rio Grande and its tributary streams. All of the lands are susceptible of irrigation by reasonable money investment or by community ditches and canals. What crops are raised? All kinds of fruit, grain and vegetables; everything that will grow in southern Kansas and Oklahoma will grow here. The southern latitude is mitigated by the altitude, which is 4,200 feet on the Rio Grande to between 5,000 and 6,000 feet above sea level on the mountain streams. The supply of water from the river is ample and in the valleys enough can be obtained with a little engineering.

What market is there for farm produce? There is a good local market in the mining camps for very much more than has yet been produced. As regular prices we can quote: Alfaifa, \$20 per ton; corn, \$1 to \$1.50 per 100 pounds; potatoes, \$2 to \$3 per 106

pounds; apples, \$5 per barrel. Are the cattle ranges fully occupied? West of the Rio Grande the range is pretty well stocked, but east of the river there is an extensive range, well grassed, that needs only the digging of wells and necessary pumping apparatus. Water beneath the surface there is plenty, as proved by the railroad wells.

Is the country suitable for raising fine sheep and goats? There are quite a number of people already who claim to be profitably engaged in this busi-

The index of books at the British museum is at last complete, after 20 years of hard work, says the St. James' Gazette. When the printing of the great catalogue began in 1881, the nanuscript catalogue then used contained 3,000,000 references to about haif as many books-cross titles acthe figures. Since then something like half a million new books have been received at the museum, their average yearly number being now 40,000. The preparation of the printed catalogue bas, of course, been enormously expensive. It was hoped at the start to reduce the cost by issuing it to subscribers, and for a yearly subscrip-Mon of £3 10s. a subscriber received all the parts published in the year. As the number of volumes issued ansually, however, rose from 16 to 30, while the subscription remained the same, the price of each volume fell from the low sum of 4s. 8d. to 2s. 4d., and the revenue from this source has not been great. Only about 250 copies of each issue are printed, and only about 80 are circulated—half of them given away! In all there are over 500 volumes of the catalogue, containing the titles of 2,000,000 books. The sub ject index will be the great task of the British museum in the new century. It is to be sommenced at once, but will not be ready for 15 years at least.
