Melton Torres president and Anastacio Torres editor of El Defensor del Pueblo, a democratic paper published at Socorro, who were recently arrested on a charge alleging that they had libeled Judge Parker, had a preliminary hearing before Judge Greene and were bound over in the sum of \$1,000 each to await the action of the next grand jury.

The Socorro Chieftan (Republican) says: "Bernalillo county authorities are trying to invalidate the law making sheep taxable in the county in which they graze rather than in the county in which the owner resides. It is argued that if the effort is successful it will add \$100,000 to Bernalillo county's tax roll. The Chieftain begs leave to suggest that that argument contains, according to any respectable standard of equity or of decency, the best possible reason why the law referred to should be operative. Probably not less than two hundred thousand sheep belonging to non-resident owners have grazed in Socorro county for several years past and have added several thousand dollars for each of those years to the burden of taxation borne by the tax-payers of the county. These sheep have occupied the ranges to the exclusion of sheep of resident owners and have caused several cattlemen of the county to abandon their ranges and seek more favorable conditions beyond the boundaries of New Mexico. The law in its present form was introduced by Hon. W. E. Martin, was passed by a unanimous vote, is perfectly just to all concerned, and should be sustained."

Many of the big sheep owners in New Mexico have for years evaded taxation to the expense of honest tax-payers. Sheep, like cattle, should be taxed wherever found.

The territorial fair colors will this year be green, cream and cardinal. Col. Sellers, the secretary, has given one order for 10,000 yards of bunting of those colors and proposes to have the city decorated proper.

Mrs. E. G. Morath, formerly Mrs. Maude Anderson, presented her husband with an eight pound son on the 9th inst., at their home at Fort Collins Colo. The many friends of the happy parents extend congratulations.

The Messers. Malettes and Henry, who spent a week here looking over the Wicks mine, returned to Chicago last Sunday. They were well pleased with the proposition and will, under a new organization, resume work on an extensive scale.

The bronco busting of the territorial fair at Albuquerque in September, promises to be fast and furious. Arrangements have been made by Messrs. Greer and Sellers to bring up three car loads of out-law horses from the lower country to be used for the purpose.

County Clerk Webster is busy these days making description and maps of all water rights in Sierra county. He is doing this in compliance with a law passed by the last legislature. When the work is completed the matter will be sent to the territorial engineer. The work will cost the county in the neighborhood of \$300.

The new gasoline hoist at the Black Peak mines was put in operation at the Black Peak mines Wednesday and the main shaft is being unwatered. As soon as the water has been removed two shifts will be put on and the shaft will be put down several hundred feet, at least that is the intention of the company at this time. A contract has been let to sink an air shaft 100 feet.

The last legislature passed a law prohibiting the sale of liquor in villages of less than 100 population and under its operation new licences cannot be issued in such

localities. From a prohibition point of view the law may have some good features, but its effect upon the schools in the rural districts is decidedly disastrous. It is a well known fact that the revenue providing for the maintenance of such schools comes mainly from liquor licences granted to retail liquor dealers in such localities, and to cut out the licences will leave many school districts without means to keep up their schools. In Sierra county nine out of seventeen licences will be cut out and the school districts most seriously affected are Chloride, Fairview, Engle, Shandon, Andrews and Bonito. These districts will be hard hit with two or three others in doubt as to population. Had the late legislature paid more attention to educational matters instead of extravagantly creating new offices and additional salaries the members of that body would have received the hearty thanks and appreciation of all of the people of New Mexico. At this period education stands first and the toiling bread-winner and tax-payer will, if necessary, pay, without grumbling, an excessive tax for school purposes, and to cut off the principal source of revenue without making any provision whatever for the loss is an unpardonable act on the part of the legislature and we hope the next legislature will remedy the now inadequate financial resources of the common schools in the territory.

A big flood came down South Percha last evening. The new dyke protected the town from being badly flooded. At Kingston Casas West's barn and another building were washed away. A. J. Hager's saw-mill near Kingsten was washed out and 10,000 feet of lumber carried away.

There will be a ball at Kingston Saturday night, July 29, given by the boys of the neighborhood. Good Mexican music. Every one welcome.

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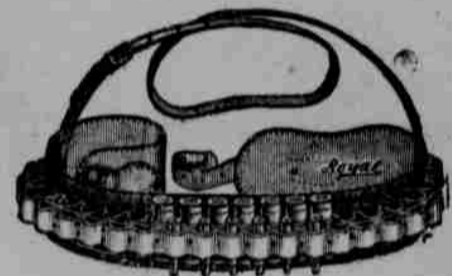
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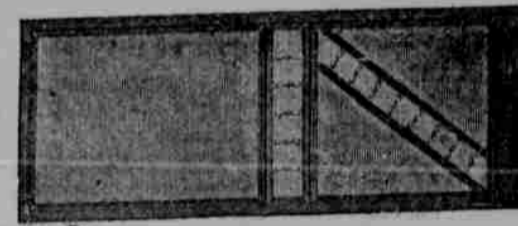
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TOSSES MONEY IN STREET.

Baltimore Amazed by the Lavish Actions of a New Yorker—Would Build Navy.

Baltimore, Md.—Henri Belmont de la Rue, a well-known New Yorker, who a few days ago took an office at 216 North Liberty street, created great excitement by throwing money in the street from his office window to a large gathering of newboys and others, who had been attracted to the scene. In all he threw away about \$50 in bills of small denomination and silver, and only desisted when forced to do so by a policeman and kindly disposed citizens, who realized that the philanthropist was suffering from some mental disorder.

The action of De la Rue was accompanied by speechmaking, during the course of which he informed the public that he was a multi-millionaire, and that it was his usual custom to distribute at least \$11,000 a day in this manner. Besides the real money the man gave to several persons drafts for sums ranging all the way from \$10 to \$100,000, and exhibited a willingness to increase the amount had anyone desired it.

When De la Rue reached Baltimore he said he wanted to establish a "commercial navy," which should guard the merchant interests of the world on the high seas. He wanted to rent a warehouse to feed 3,000 members of his navy, and for several days he has been busy sending big orders right and left for supplies of wines, liquors, cigars and miscellaneous luxuries, some of which are said to have been delivered on checks.

FINDS BONES OF CANNIBALS

Oregon Archaeologist Discovers Remains of a Prehistoric Race on Farm Near Albany.

Albany, Ore.—While excavating on a farm five miles southwest of Albany, near the bank of the Calapooia river, J. G. Crawford, of this city, discovered the remains of several bodies of prehistoric men, and also a small altar, undoubtedly used as a place for sacrifices. The remains of five bodies were found, the skeletons showing that all the bodies had been mutilated.

Crawford, who had made a number of excavations in different mounds in this part of the state during the last few years and who has acquired considerable reputation as an archaeologist, thinks the people undoubtedly were cannibals. Most of the bodies found were badly mutilated. In one skull the whole face had been broken out from the top of the head to the jaw, while in two others a jaw and other small parts of the face were missing.

The altar, though small, was a perfect one. It was built on a rock foundation, in oval form and was constructed of clay, which had been burned until it was as red as brick, though not so hard. The altar proper was 24 inches long and 18 inches wide. Crawford says there is no doubt it had been used for sacrificial purposes and from what he has been able to learn about the habits of this race from his investigations he thinks it was the custom of the people to offer the hearts of the dead on these little altars as a burned sacrifice to some deity.

UNITED AFTER FIFTY YEARS

Aged Couple Meet and Are Married After Each Had Been Bereft of a Partner.

Hartford, Conn.—Over fifty years ago Angela R. Kilbourn and John F. Johnson went to school together in Rutland, Vt., and soon after graduating they became engaged. Before the day set for the wedding there was a misunderstanding between the couple and they parted.

Miss Kilbourn, after a few years, married Dr. Daniels. Johnson also married and went to Cormorant, Minn., with his bride. Five years ago Mr. Johnson's wife died, and two years ago Mrs. Daniels was left a widow.

She took up her residence in Hartford, and a few months ago Mr. Johnson corresponded with her. He came to Hartford and visited her. The old misunderstanding was explained. They procured a marriage license and were married, immediately taking a train for Cormorant, Minn., where they will reside.

Lets Dead Rabbits as Venison.

A live rabbit is a rabbit, but a dead one is venison. This is the latest freak decision by the national treasury department, and is in line with one of a year ago, when frogs' legs were declared to be turkey. Upon appeal the legs were declared by the board of appraisers to be a "nonessential unmanufactured article." Duty has been paid on some dead imported rabbits in New York as venison, but another appeal may put them in the same class as frogs' legs.

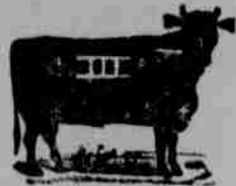
