

Attorney Ganeral Harmon agrees with President Cleveland on the financial question, as Mr. Cleveland probably knew before he made him a member of his Cabinet. Speaking on the subject Judge Harmon said: "In the present situntion it seems to me mere folly to talk about the free coinage of silver. The only way we float the silver we now have is by attaching an applied greenback to every silver dollar-or, in other words, by the government promising to redeem it with a gold dollar, if necessary, to keep the two equal. Of course there is a very narrow limit to the government's ability to do that, besides I know of no reason why it should do it. If there were free and unlimited coinage of silver the government could not keep the two metals on a parity very long, and the result would be, by the law of money, that has been settled from the time that man had money, the gold would all disappear and there would be only a silver basis " Needless to say the silver men do not agree with either the Attorney General's argument or conclusions.
