at Engle on Thursday, Sept. 24th. He will speak at Cuchillo at noon of that day and then go to Monticello where he will deliver an address to the people of that place in the evening. From Monticello he will go to Las Palomas where he will talk to the people of that place at noon, Sept. 25th. From Las Palomas he will come to Hillsboro and deliver an address here in the evening, Sept. 25th. From Hillsboro Mr. Larrazolo will go to Silver City where he will deliver an address on the following day.

At the last meeting of the board of county commissioners the chairman of the board was authorized to employ Mr. C. H. Laidlaw general manager and conductor of Sierra county's exhibit at the Irrigation congress at a salary of \$5.00 per day. Now, we understand that U. S. Attorney Hervey declares the proceedings of the board as absolutely at fault and that he will not permit the use of the county's money in such an enterprise and the board will so be notified by District Attorney H. A. Wolford. Just how this matter will be settled remains to be seen.

The Territorial Board of Equalization met in Santa Fe last Monday, and we find the following among the proceedings: "The Consolidated Gold Mining company case, appeal from Sierra county, was then taken up, J. F. Bonham appearing for the appellant. The case was heard, no one appearing for the county board and on consideration thereof the board being fully advised in the premises, sustained the appeal and revoked and set aside the raise made by the county board in this case. It was ordered that the appeal in this case be sustained, and the raise made by the county board of Sierra county be vacated and set aside and that the return of the appellant stand as originally made."

The territorial supreme court has knocked out the slot machine. A Santa Fe dispatch of the fourth says: "The supreme court today handed down a decision holding that slot machines constitute games of chance and are therefore under the ban according to the anti-gambling law passed by the last legislature. The case came up as a test case from the sixth district and the ruling of the territorial tribunal reverses the decision of the lower court which held the slot machine was not a gambling device in the meaning of the law, and sustains the contention of the territory which prosecuted the cases in question that the slot machines are within the reach of the territorial law."
