A VALUABLE INVENTION.

Disasters Caused by Burnt or Washed-
out Bridges Averted.
Yesterday we had the pleasure of inspect-
ing one of the most complete and effective
electric devices, that will give absolute
safety to railroad travelers from one of the
greatest dangers to which all roads are sub-
ject, namely, trains running into burned or
washed out bridges. It is the invention of
Mr. John R. De Mier, of this city. He had
had several filed on it five months prior to
the Chisworth horror in Illinois, two years
ago, where over eighty lives were lost by a
train running into a burnt bridge. He had
it fully covered by patents, having no
trouble whatever in securing the same, as it
was entirely original.

The signal consists of a hollow iron stand,
inside of which is a magnet and a clock
gearing, one wheel of which has notches
cut to correspond with the number of
the bridge, inside the hollow
stand is a red flag and at the bottom of the
stand is a gas pipe, inside of which is a
rod and spiral spring, and on the end of the
rod is a torpedo. These stands are
to be placed five feet from the track on the
right hand side approaching the bridge. The
clock gearing of the torpedo comes to
within six inches of the rail. The bridge
will be fitted up with thermometers and a
water float. Wires will be connected with
the thermometers and the float. The float will
be placed at whatever height it would be con-
sidered dangerous to the bridge. The wires
will extend to the signal stands, and the
main line wire will be attached to one of the
clock gears of the boxes. The thermom-
eters will be placed every ten feet apart and
are made to close the electric circuit at
a few degrees above zero heat.

The system works on an open circuit.
In case of fire the thermometers close the cir-
cuit, causing the red flag which is fastened
to a staff inside the stand to shoot out of the
top and unfurl, or spread out like a fan, be-
ing held in that position by two springs, so
that it will not be effected by wind or weather.
The flag is five feet wide and three feet
high. At the same time the torpedo is
placed on the rail and the clock gearing set
in motion, repeating the number of the
bridge three times over the main line wire,
where the circuit is automatically closed and
the main line wire ready for the transaction
of usual business, and the sending out of
warning to trains to look out for trouble
at that certain bridge.

In case of danger from water the float
rises and causes an electric contact, closing
the circuit and operating the signals the
same as in case of fire. It seems that with
all its ingenuity it gives, the displaying of a
flag, the placing of a torpedo on the rail,
and the telegraphing of the number of the
bridge, it should be an absolute safeguard.
The De Mier Electric Signal Co., of Albu-
querque, control the patents, as well as
the train signal patents. The company is
backed heavily by New Mexico and Eastern
capitalists. Geo. J. A. Williamson, who
was recently elected president of the Atlan-
tic & Pacific railroad, is also president of
this company. We think from the sim-
plicity and reliability of the signal, and its
great importance as a life and property
saver, the demand for it will be enormous.
We most heartily congratulate Mr. De Mier
on this invention.

Killed While Resisting Arrest.
Last Wednesday Adam Taylor came
down from Tule, a distance of 25 miles north
of here, and reported that about one o'clock
this morning some band in business shape
had entered the north house of the Detroit
& Rio Grande Cattle Company, and after
striking Mrs. Frank Walker on the head
with an ax, had carried her into the corral
adjacent, but had been frightened away
before accomplishing his foul purpose. The
facts were as follows:
The house is situated on a flat some dis-
tance from the railroad track. Fifty feet
north of the track it was seen that the
perpetrator on the head had set down on
the track and pushed off his shoes; after this
he went to the front of the house and looked
into the windows. From here he made his
way into the corral back of the house and
pushed up the ax through the window, tak-
ing it with him. As the door was open he
had easy access into the building. Mrs.
Frank Walker, wife of the foreman of the
track, was sleeping alone in the corral
room, her husband being absent. With
swift steps he approached the bed of the
sleeping woman, all unconscious of her
danger, and struck her a villainous blow
with the pole of the deadly instrument.
The blow rendered her for a moment in-
sensible, as the wretch intended it should,
and leaving the ax on the bed he carried
her back into the corral. But the stroke
had not been heavy enough and she gained
her senses so as to be able to scream for help.
Johnny Merrick, one of the hands, was
sleeping in another room, and he hastened
to the scene but the scoundrel had fled.
The lady was immediately cared for, her
injury being all the more dangerous on ac-
count of her condition, and as soon as day-
light came with the employees of the pump-
ing works three miles above, the search
began. Suspicion immediately fastened up-
on a negro man named Petty, who had
been discharged a few days before. He had
gone to Las Cruces and gambled away the
money paid him, but had returned as he
had been seen near the pump the evening
before the deed was committed.
The telegraph tracks showed that the
