Give Dry Farming A Boost!

Colorado Springs, June 7, 1911.
To Farmers, Business Men and All Others Interested in the Promotion of Agriculture in the Dry-Lands:

Do you want to do a great service to your immediate community, to yourself individually and the cause of bringing the dry-lands under cultivation? We take it that you do, and we are thus addressing you in the hope that you will immediately take steps to assist in providing an exhibit at the Exposition of the International Dry-Farming Congress that is to be held at Colorado Springs, October 16 to 22, 1911.

The committee has every reason to believe that this will surpass any agricultural display ever held in the western country. We want the products of your farms, orchards and gardens that have been raised under dry-farming conditions shown there. Don't be too ambitious in the matter and think that you must go to a great expense. Get together and show the world what your section is capable of producing under right conditions and the right kind of farming. You owe it to yourself and your community to do this.

But if you are going to undertake an exhibit, now is the time to begin. A successful exhibit is the result of studied design and careful collecting. If not too late, special plats of land and carefully attend them; lay aside in cool, dark places grains and fruits that ripen, or otherwise treat the product in the best way to preserve them. If you doubt on matters of this kind, write to the secretary of the Congress.

You will be surprised how fast your collection grows. Start yours and don't be afraid to try it out at state and county fairs before coming with it to the Exposition.

Business men, and especially county commissioners, you have a big strike in this thing? You can encourage growers of your region to get together and undertake the collection of exhibits. Back up their efforts

with special prizes; see to it that your country gets a good position assigned it on the Exposition grounds, and then let it be known that you expect the farmers to help fill it. Why not get up local prize contests for the boys and girls who are willing to grow some exhibition things or make some butter or raise some chickens and eggs on the dry-land home place?

If you are interested in this matter, write to the Secretary for information regarding classes and prizes. Premium list will be issued at an early date. The congress is trying to show that western lands need only intelligent cultivation to make the region produce its share of the world's agricultural wealth. Success comes through resisting the things that oppose one. The lands that thirst for water have been the arena of the world's greatest history in the past. By striving we can make western dry-land farms the cradle of agriculture for the Northern hemisphere.

MURDERERS AT LARGE

A mother was literally murdered by gossip the other day. Rumors of the escapades of a son were added to until it was reported he was in jail. The lad never came near the prison bars. But forked tongues prodded the mother's heart until she believed the rumor. It was more than she could carry. She died of a broken heart. The son was then hunted up to attend the funeral. Her murderers escaped the policeman. They are still at large. That is too bad. They are dangerous criminals.

Character killers ought to be imprisoned. They scorch hearts with fire. They bespatter any soul with ghoulish delight.

Decent people know, mark and avoid the gossip and slanderer. Only other carrion hunters flock with them.

One who brings a tale will carry one about you. Gossip makes heart fellowship impossible.

Gossip shrivels instead of develops. It dries up the heart as pessimism does the brain, or a drought does the corn field. Humans must love if they grow, as flowers must have sunshine.

Gossip poisons love. It makes its servants ugly with hate. It burns out all the vitality of red manhood and womanhood, and makes room for evil spirits to dwell. The idle gossip, the slayer of character by sly insinuation, by leering exaggeration, is abhorred by all decent people.

"It is not virtuous women who are ready to repeat suspicion of their sisters," says Mme. de Krudener.

A terrible arraignment, but is it not true, at least to a measurable extent?

Tale bearers are as bad as tale makers. Even children recognize this, and with the young there is hardly a more contemptuous epithet than "tell tale."

The gossip is a coward. Respect is due the one who comes out in open with criticism or denunciation, even though it may be unwarranted. But for the backbiter, the teller-of-tales in out-of-the-way corners, right minded people can feel only contempt and abhorrence.—Christian F. Reisner.

Second Homestead And Desert Land Entries.

Department of the Interior General Land Office, Washington, D. C., May 17, 1911.

Registers and Receivers, United States Land Offices:

Sirs: The following instructions are issued for your guidance in the allowance of second homestead and desert-land entries under the act of Congress approved February 3, 1911 (Public, No. 340), a copy of which is hereto attached.

This act allows a second home-

stead or desert-land entry, as the case may be, to any person otherwise qualified who, prior to February 3, 1911, has made entry under the homestead or desert-land laws, but who, subsequently to such entry, from any cause, shall have lost, forfeited, or abandoned the same, but the provisions of the act do not apply to any person whose former entry was cancelled for fraud or who relinquished his former entry for a valuable consideration in excess of the filing fees paid by him on his original entry. This act allows a second entry of either kind if the former entry was made prior to February 3, 1911, although it may have been lost, forfeited, or abandoned subsequent to that date.

A person applying to make second homestead or desert-land entry under this act must file in the local land office an application to enter a specific tract of public lands, subject to entry under the laws in question, accompanied by his affidavit executed before an officer authorized to administer oaths under the public-land laws, stating the description of the former entry by section, township, and range numbers (or the number of the entry and land office where made), date of entry; when he lost, forfeited, or abandoned the same; that it must be corroborated by the affidavit of one or more persons having knowledge of the facts relative to the abandonment of the claim or the relinquishment of the former entry and the consideration received therefor, which corroborating affidavit may be executed before any officer authorized to administer oaths and having an official seal.

If an application is presented which has not been executed before a proper officer, or which is not corroborated, or which is otherwise formally defective, you will suspend or reject it, subject to the usual right of appeal. If the application is formally correct and the party makes a showing entitling him to the benefits of this act, you will allow the application, endorsing thereon, and on the notice of allowance, the fact that the same is allowed under the act of February 3, 1911.

If the application for second homestead or desert-land entry is formally correct, but the applicant does not make a showing entitling him to the benefits of the act of February 3, 1911, you will not reject the application, but will forward it to this office, with appropriate recommendation, as required by the circular of March 29, 1910. (38 L. D., 507.)

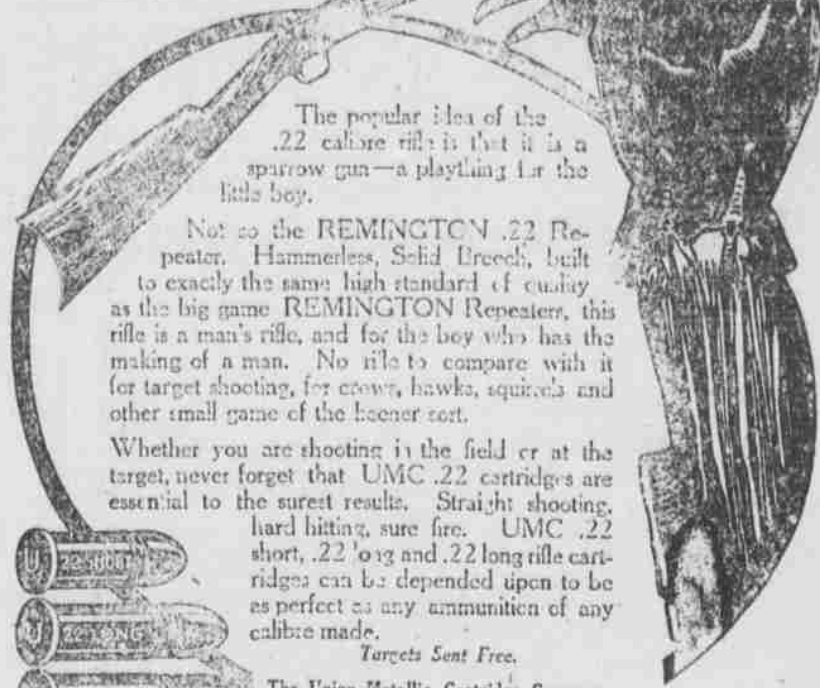

Dear Sir: I send you here with \$1.00 to pay for one dollars worth of Kenna Record to be sent to my address. We have been to Kenna and like Kenna and surrounding country real well, we have quite a number of friends that went from Silverton to Kenna.

Perhaps a few items of news from here would be interesting to some of them.

The health of our town and country is very good at this time.

We are needing rain at present.

Small grain crops are rather light on account of dry weather.
