#### Second Homestead And Desert Land Entries.

Department of the Interior General Land Office, Washington, D. C., May 17, 1911.

Registers and Receivers, United States Land Offices:

Sirs: The following instructions are issued for your guidance in the allowance of second homestead and desert-land entries under the act of Congress (Public, No. 340), a copy of Lewis Ou. all of Elkins, New Mexico. which is hereto attached.

This act allows a second home-\_une 13-July 25

stead or desert-land entry, as the case may be, to any person otherwise qualified who, prior to February 3, 1911, has made cury under the homestead or desert-land laws, but who, subsemently to such entry, from any ause, shall have lost, ferfeited or abandoned the same, but the provisions of the act do not apply to any person whose former entry was cancelled for fraud or who relinquished his former en try for a valuable consideration in excess of the filing fees paid by him on his original entry This act allows a second entry of either kind if the former entry was made prior to February 3 1911, although it may have been lost, forfeited, or abandoned subsequent to that date.

A person applying to make second homestead or desert-land entry under this act must file in the local land office an applicaion to enter a specific tract of public lands, subject to entry ander the laws in question, accompanied by his affidavit excuted before an officer authorized to administer oaths under the public-land laws, stating the description of the former entry by section, township, and range numbers (or the number of the entry and land office where nade), date of entry; when he lost, forfeited, or abandoned the same; that it must be corroborated by the affidavit of one or more persons having knowledge of the facts relative to the aband onment of the claim or the re linquishment of the former en ry and the consideration received therefor, which corroborating affidavit may be executed before any officer authorized to administer oaths and having an official seal.

If an application is presented which has not been executed before a proper officer, or which i not corroborated, or which i otherwise formally defective, you will suspend or reject it. subject to the usual right of uppeal. If the application is fornally correct and the party makes a showing entitling hin to the benefits of this act, you will allow the application, indorsing thereon, and on the notice of allowance, the fac that the same is allowed under the act of February 3, 1911.

If the application for second homestead or desert-land entry is formally correct, but the applicant does not make a showing entitling him to the benefits of the act of February 3, 1911, vot will not reject the application, but will forward it to this office, with appropriate recommendation, as required by the circular of March 29, 1910. (38 L D .
