### Origin of St. Valentine's Day.

St. Valentine is emphatically the patron saint of lovers, and as such has received the oblation of centuries. He was a priest of Rome, and was martyred by first being beaten cruelly with a club and then beheaded, during the reign of Claudius II., in the city of Rome, about the year 270.

The curious observances which are hallowed by the memory of St. Valentine began early in the third century when he became identified with this great festival and elected its patron saint because of his power in mitigating quarrels of young people and making their love affairs run smoothly.

After he had met his tragic fate, the young people mourned him and met secretly each year to pay homage to his memory. On these occasions they present each other with little love tokens which they called St. Valentines, and from this custom February 14 has reached its present popularity and general observance, thus making the anniversary of a tragic death a day when love demands a special offering, and fancy is free to play in comedy and caricature. It is love's triumphant holiday, when Cupid, the little god of love, reigns supreme, and is busy sowing his mischievous darts, while St. Valentine holds the winning cards.

### How To Preserve Sweet Potatoes Through Winter.

(Texico Trumpet).

Curry county is one of the greatest sweet potato countries in the world. It is easy to raise potatoes here, but our farmers have had trouble in keeping them through the winter in this high and dry altitude, the potatoes drying out—evaporating until there is nothing left of them but a husk. A farmer near Texico eats sweet potatoes the year around, and this is the way (aided by his wife, of course) he does it.

When the potatoes are gathered in the fall they set aside a tub full, or such a quantity as the family will eat before they evaporate. The rest they put in water on the stove and bring nearly to a boil, or until the peeling will slip off. After taking the peeling off, the potatoes are sliced and lain in the sun to cure, the same as in drying fruit. They get almost as hard as boards and are then ready to sack up and store away, awaiting the owners' pleasure in eating them, and will keep until the next crop comes on.

These dried potatoes retain all their sweetness and flavor, and will readily cook up. Cut this out and paste it up where you can see it when the next crop of potatoes is ready for digging.

### Advantage of Being Born Poor.

The old adage that a man is not a man until he has known what it is to strive for a livelihood is indorsed by the great king of commerce, Sir Thomas Lipton. Sir Thomas is very decided in his views. It is a good thing, he says, for a young man to be poor. For this reason, if his father is in a prosperous way of business, the son more often than not enters that business. The way is paved for him. He never realizes the value of money. He may turn out a good business man, but the chances are that he being well off he will have no incentive to seize opportunities as they come his way. Suppose, however, a young man is born poor and has to work for every penny he owns. Doesn't he realize the value of money, and is he not always on the qui vive to make the best of his chances?

Then, again, the young man born poor keeps green about him the memory of what he was once. He can feel the true nature of things; he can grasp the idea of the man who is struggling to come to the front. He has been a poor man himself—he knows better what the strength of encouragement is and what good a kindly word does for the working classes; he was one of them. Realizing their struggles himself he works for them, gauges their support, and cooperation—he helps himself ahead at the same time.

The young man born rich is very apt to be particular about his hours of labor—not so the young man who has been learned to work early and late.

The young fellow wants to get along in the world, and is on the wrong track. Employers don't like the man who is always watching the clock.

Again, the poor young man after business hours, is more apt to try to improve himself than is the rich young man. The rich young man feels that he has no need of improving himself in the way of education; the right kind of a poor young man feels that he must. And that is just the spirit that is going to make him succeed. To study is one of the guarantees of success. A young man in those twentieth century days should have at least one or two foreign languages, and they help a great deal.

The poor young man is more apt to have a civil tongue in his head than the rich one. Necessity makes it so. Always be civil. Are not the poor man's shillings as good as the rich man's pounds?
