## LATE NEWS.

### KNOWS ALL ABOUT IT.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Chairman Carter, of the Republican National committee, sent a telegram to President Harrison this afternoon, saying: "The returns show we have been defeated by a pronounced majority. Our defeat can only be attributed to the reaction against the progressive policy of the Republican party."

### IN DIFFERENT STATES.

It looks as though Weaver has carried Kansas by about 2,000. Llewellyn, fusion candidate for governor, will have a majority over Smith (Rep.) of about 1,500. There is no doubt that the Weaver electors have carried Colorado.

### THE NEWS IN LONDON.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The returns of the election were received here this forenoon too late for the papers to comment on the result. The Pall Mall Gazette publishes a brief note this afternoon saying that both the merchants and the unemployed workmen of England have reason to rejoice at the Democratic victory, as with the possibility of re-opening of the American markets to the goods of Birmingham, Bradford and Manchester, capitalists will get a chance to procure some return on the money invested and the workmen will have an opportunity to get a decent price for their labor without the necessity of striking.

The St. James Gazette says that satisfaction is felt in England at Mr. Cleveland going back to the white house. The Blaine-Harrison regime, it adds, has been far from agreeable to British interests and a majority of the American people believe that it has been equally prejudicial to themselves.

### NEBRASKA.

OMAHA, Neb. Nov. 10.—The Omaha Bee, (Rep.) claims that the Republicans have possibly elected five of the six congressmen in Nebraska and they surely have elected four. It will take the official count to decide the first district. Complete returns have been received by the Bee from 34 counties on President which shows a plurality for Harrison of 3423. Incomplete returns from 10 other counties increase that plurality to nearly 1,000. Complete returns on Governor from 33 counties shows Cronz 39,180, Morton 21,327, Van Wyck 30,543. With incomplete returns from 11 other counties. Indications are that Cronz was elected by about 10,000 over Van Wyck.

### IN IOWA.

DES MOINES, Nov. 10.—The latest and best figures place the total Republican vote in Iowa at 228,000, Democratic 208,000, populist 18,000, Prohibition 8,000. This includes estimates for several counties. These figures cannot be far from correct. Of the 11 congressmen 10 are Republicans, though one district, the 11th, is still claimed by the Democrats, but merely as a possibility.

### DISCUSSING THE CABINET.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The result of the election being positively settled, politicians are turning their attention to the possible make-up of President Cleveland's next cabinet. Many are greatly interested now that the New York state legislature is

known to be Democratic on joint ballot as to the probable successor of United States Senator Hancock. The cabinet slate generally figured out by politicians was as follows: Secretary of state, Thomas F. Bayard of Delaware; secretary of the treasury, John L. Mitchell or ex-Postmaster-General William F. Vilas of Wisconsin; secretary of navy, William C. Whitney, of New York; secretary of war, Franklin, of New Hampshire; secretary of the interior, Isaac P. Gray, of Indiana; attorney general, Wm. L. Wilson, of West Virginia, or Culbertson, of Texas; postmaster general, Den M. Dickinson.

### THE RESULT IN NEBRASKA.

OMAHA, Nov. 10.—Sixty counties out of ninety give Harrison 66,261, Cleveland 20,119, Weaver 59,691. The legislature stands on joint ballot, republicans 64, democrats 15, independents 45, doubtful 9. The democrats and independents will probably control the election of the United States senator.

### SAT DOWNS ON MCKINLEY.

ALLIANCE, Ohio, Nov. 10.—Probably one of the biggest surprises of Tuesday's ballot was the election of Dr. George P. Kirt, Democrat, in this (McKinley's) district. Complete returns will elect Kirt over the Republican candidate by a majority of 1,000.

### MONEY IN CIRCULATION.

Bradstreet's of last week says: A net increase in the circulation of money of over \$10,000,000 is shown in the monthly statement issued by the treasury department this week. The principal increases have been of nearly \$9,500,000 in United States notes, over \$7,500,000 in silver treasury notes, and over \$2,100,000 in standard silver dollars, and the principal decreases have been of over \$6,700,000 in currency certificates and nearly \$2,300,000 in silver certificates. The total circulation of the country on the 1st inst. was \$1,500,139,735, an increase of over \$41,600,000 as compared with the corresponding date a year ago. The circulation per capita is estimated at \$24.34, which represents a slight increase for the month.

### THE COW.

The cow is a calf if our city butchers are to be believed, until there is no more room on her horns for rings. When she is too old to give two quarts of milk per diem and then kick it all over the dewey lipped milk maid, the farmer drives her on a railroad track, wrecks a freight train with her and then sues the company for the price of a Jersey. Of course the company kicks worse than the cow ever did, but the honest agriculturist gets a jury of fellow farmers and the soulless monopoly has to come to law—Ex.

## NEW TIME TABLE.

From sources deemed to be reliable it is learned that the hitch in placing new vestibuled trains, with dining car attachments, on the A. T. & S. F. is only temporary and that, while the new service will not get into effect on Sunday next, as announced, 30 days hence will see the new service in full force.

When the Santa Fe first inaugurated its dining car service, several years ago, Harvey, who had an iron-clad contract with the company whereby he was to furnish all meals, got an injunction against the company and the cars had to be taken off of trains running through his territory. A new contract has been entered into whereby Harvey takes charge of the dining car service, as well as the eating houses, and it will become effective next month, when there will be an entire change of time over the entire system. One of the stipulations of the new contract is that the dining car service is to excel or at least equal any dining car service in the country.

As a result of the change, the Santa Fe will shorten up the time of through trains considerably. Two full vestibuled limited through trains will be put on in each direction between Chicago, Kansas City and Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego, making close connections both ways with limited trains from Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo and La Junta. The schedule has not been fully arranged yet, but the new trains will save seven and one-half hours between Chicago and the coast.

For this new service and for the other fast trains twelve new cars have just been built at the Pullman shops, being the very latest and most elegant designs, both in exterior and interior finish, and the upholstery is exquisitely rich and beautiful. Nearly all the Pullman sleepers are new also, and those that are not have been rebuilt and refitted. These two trains will scarcely have an equal in splendor and comfort on any American railway.

In Valencia county 18 precincts heard from give 913 majority for Catron.

In Bernalillo county only 4 precincts remain to be heard from, La Jara, Gonzalitas, San Ignacio and San Antonio. The first two are known to have given Joseph 8 and 10 respectively, and the last two are estimated to give Joseph 49 majority each. This figuring would give Joseph a majority of 5. The majority will be very small either way. The whole Democratic-Independent ticket is elected by big majorities.

The New Mexican claims Mr. Catron's election by about 200, but its figures foot up 2000 Catron to 1950 Joseph with the probabilities in Joseph's favor, and no returns in from Eddy and Chaves counties.

It is estimated that 20,000 stump speakers were simultaneously engaged, on a single evening recently, in enlightening the voters of the country on their duties. The campaign orators are a great power in the land but they owe most of their fame and most of their success to the newspaper.

Hon. Tranquillino Luna, of Valencia county, who has been so very ill of late, is reported much improved and is now considered fully out of danger.

Illinois was not one of the original Republican states, having given its electoral vote to Buchanan in 1856. It ought to have stuck to the Republicans this year, though.

Tammany carried out the contract to carry New York for Cleveland. Now Cleveland will have to fulfill his contract to give all the federal offices in New York to Tammany.

It is reported that the contract for the construction for the full extension of the interoceanic railway at Acapulco will be awarded soon. This road passes one of the richest mining and agricultural sections of the Republic.

According to the records of the mint, 19,570 silver dollars were coined in the year 1894. Of this number but eight are known, and they are valued at from \$500 to \$2,000 each. What became of the remaining 19,562 is one of the greatest numismatic mysteries.

In 1896 the Republicans will sweep everything. The free silver and wild-cat currency programme of the Western and Southern ends of the Democracy will be antagonized by the Eastern end and by Cleveland and the party will be split for the time being. Thus 1896 will be a great year for the Republicans.

The Republicans swept the city yesterday. Every man on the local ticket was elected by a good round majority. The weather, the sentiment of the people and success were all the same side, which made a combination impossible for the Democrats to beat. The biggest vote ever polled in the history of St. Louis was poured into the ballot boxes, and more enthusiasm was displayed than upon any previous election.—Globe-Democrat.

THE EL PASO SHORT LINE.

Now that the presidential campaign is over, there is one great enterprise to which the people of Denver should turn their immediate attention. The construction of an independent line of railway by which Denver, Colorado Springs, Pueblo and Trinidad will be connected on a direct route with Las Vegas, the White Oaks region and El Paso cannot be too urgently urged on the public mind. The topic is not a new one in these columns and to say anything new on the subject is almost impossible. There are, however, two or three important considerations which it may be well to review.

The proposed line will open to our merchants and manufacturers a trade territory larger in extent than is now reached by our business men. The territory includes all of Eastern New Mexico, which is unsurpassed in natural resources, especially agriculture and mining. At El Paso there are railway connections reaching into Western Texas, into Arizona and into Old Mexico. This is virtually a new empire for our trade and one that would not have to be conquered—it would come to our city right joyfully.

The opening of this territory to traffic with this city would realize Denver's commercial and manufacturing destiny. It would give to the city a business prominence not enjoyed by any inland city in America save Chicago and St. Louis, and Denver's growing rivalry with both would be rapid. There would be an immediate increase in the demand for every article of merchandise and of manufacture that would create an astonishing era of growth, and quicken business in every department.

\$9,000,000 in cash for the work of construction on the sole condition that the cities along the road—Denver, Colorado Springs, Pueblo, Trinidad, Las Vegas, White Oaks and El Paso—subscribe \$1,000,000. This is an exceedingly liberal proposition. Denver's share on account of her wealth, importance, and the superior advantages to be derived, has been derived, has been placed at \$300,000. It is an insignificant sum in comparison to the very great benefits which will accrue to our city, and should at once be pledged.

In proportion to the prospects opened to Denver by this proposed road, Colorado Springs, Pueblo and Trinidad will also share in the same. From every point of view the El Paso short line commends itself to the business public, and it is hoped that the required subscription will soon be forthcoming and the work of construction actually begun.—Denver News.

HUNTINGTON BUYS A MEXICAN MOUNTAIN.

A dispatch has been received from Durango, Mexico, stating that one of the largest mining deals ever known in Mexico has just been consummated. The deal was the purchase of the wonderful Iron Mountain near Durango, and the extensive steel and iron works in that city by C. P. Huntington. What price was paid for these valuable properties is not known.

A CHEAP EXPERIMENT.

Before the fish commissioners decided to stock the streams of the state with that much despised but powerful fish, the German carp, they were greatly concerned as to whether the species would live in certain waters, says the San Francisco Examiner.

They debated the question through several meetings, grew red in the face over it, and, to save heat and a possible disruption of the board, determined to submit the question to Prof. Hochstadter, the eminent pisciculturist, for decision.

Numerous samples of the water were obtained and turned over to professor, who is a very brief space submitted a report and a bill for \$100. The bill was paid and the devastating carp turned loose to disorder the rivers.

It was not until the other day, however, when Judge Henshaw and Prof. Hochstadter were straining their imaginations over fishing experiences while crossing on the Piedmont, that the truth about the great scientist's experiments with that water came out. He chuckled so much over telling about his bill for \$100 that Henshaw asked:

"But how did you ascertain that carp would live in the water submitted to you?"

"Why, I bought a carp for 10 cents and put it into the water. It lived."

A LIVE PIG AS BAIT.

"To catch a boa is a very difficult and dangerous task," says a man who makes it his business to capture wild animals and reptiles for menagerie purposes. "Briefly, it is accomplished by means of a labyrinthian tangle, embracing 80 square feet of ground. The labyrinth is made by joining together, end on end, pieces of matting. The web is eight feet high, usually, and placed so that the opposite walls will be two feet apart. All sorts of cries-cross and diverging combinations are made with the matting—it is supported here and there by stakes, making when it is set, a geometrical puzzle that might well challenge the ingenuity of man.

"The trap is baited with a live pig, which is placed in a pen in the center of the labyrinth. By and by along comes the boa constrictor. It is easy enough to get in. He scents the prey; he is very hungry; the pig is devoured, and here the boa comes to grief. For hours he tries to release himself from the tortuous passages which rise about him, but finally he grows tired and stretches himself out for a nap. Then is our time. We open the labyrinth and catch him."

A flour and grist mill has been contracted for at Maxwell City, to be built and running by April 15th next. The lack of mills to grind our wheat and corn has been the greatest drawback the country has had.

6. Taking ink stains from a carpet with javelle water.
7. Rubbing a fruit stain with yellow soap, putting on wet starch and hanging in the sun several days.
8. Dipping an iron rusted spot in tartaric acid and hanging in the sun.
9. Rubbing finger marks with javelle water.
10. A sunbath instead of fire heat.
11. Keeping flowers by immersing the stems in hot water.
12. Hanging brass candlesticks before a mirror so that it can reflect the light.

TRAINING THE MEMORY.

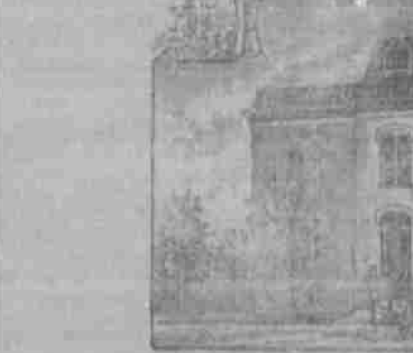
