GOULD AGAIN.

The following is the additional news from El Paso about Gould's purchase:

EL PASO, April 29.—Jay Gould will change the name of the White Oaks road, which he bought yesterday. Under the new charter, the road will be known as the El Paso Northern. The directors will be: Jay Gould, George Gould, C. R. Morehead, Joseph Magoffin and B.H. Davis. The El Paso road will be built direct through to White Oaks without delay.

Eastern visitors in the city made some heavy purchases of El Paso real estate today.

It is believed El Paso will be receiving cheap coal from White Oaks by next December.

The New Mexican whoops it up as follows, evidently believing Gould knows of no place in New Mexico but Santa Fe, and heads it, "A Great Triangle Project." It had better "try" again, and get Las Vegas in the next time:

The die is cast and Jay Gould enters the railroad field in New Mexico. A most important bit of news in the history of railroad development in the southwest is at hand from El Paso today. Yesterday Mr. Gould paid \$50,000 for the El Paso White Oaks railway franchise and he will begin building north and east through New Mexico immediately. The transfer of the corporation was made to Mr. Gould last evening, by Receiver Charles Davis, and the sale was at once confirmed by order of the district court. This road is completed ten miles out of El Paso, and from the end of the track to White Oaks is 150 miles.

"I do not want any delay, but want to get to work on the road just as soon as I possibly can," Mr. Gould is quoted as saying in the El Paso Times of yesterday.

The route to be followed from White Oaks north is the feature that most interests Santa Feans. From White Oaks the new Gould road will more than likely build due north through the Manzano valley via San Pedro, Cerrillos and Santa Fe, to meet the Missouri Pacific route which Frank King is surveying. Also from White Oaks the line will probably go into the Pecos valley, connecting with the Hagerman road there and giving Eddy and Roswell a direct main line northeast to meet the Missouri Pacific, thus forming a triangle that will make the Gould lines a formidable competitor for southwestern business.

Of course these are but speculations for the present, but they are sufficiently based on facts to make them very interesting to most of our readers. A few weeks at most will probably show what it all means.

A. A. Wise, Geo. W. Ward and J. A. Carruth, who were appointed appraisers to condemn a fractional lot belonging to Isador Stern, facing on Bridge street and between the acequia and J. A. C. Miner's residence, after due survey of it this morning, appraised the damage at \$100. The street which now runs on the upper side of the acequia will shortly be changed to the lower side, making Ulibarri street, a straight thoroughfare north past the residences of Messrs. McSchooler, Patty and Hedgecock and the acequia changed and run higher up and the Mora road run into the street about in front of the Home.

TERRITORIAL.

About \$2,500 changed hands on the result of a horse race at Gallup a few days ago between a horse owned at Fort Wingate and one belonging at Gallup.

E. J. Pendergast, one of the pioneers of this section, died at his home on the Sugarite, the 20th inst., after a long illness. Deceased was in his sixty-second year.—Springer Banner.

A gold nugget picked up by a Mexican in one of the old placers of southern Arizona weighed 14 pounds, and by the time it has been transmitted from Phenix it will have attained a weight of 140.—El Paso Bullion.

The Grant County Mining & Milling Co., which has been operating several mines under lease, as well as the Bremen mill, has suspended operation, owing to the unprofitable working of its low grade ores at the present price of silver.

Mrs. Annie S. Abreu, wife of Mr. Chas. F. Abreu, school superintendent of Colfax county, died the 27th at her residence in Rayado. The deceased was about twenty years old. She leaves her young husband and two children, one of them being only ten days old.

Jose Regis Anzura is the name of an Ileta pueblo Indian wanted for a year or more for the murder of a fellow villager named Abeita. Last fall the governor offered a reward of \$100 for his capture. Today word comes up from Ileta that Jose Ignacio Abeita, a nephew of the murdered man, has run down the murderer and effected his capture at Winslow, A. T. Anzura will be brought back to Bernalillo county for trial, and young Abeita will apply for the payment of the reward.

Some nights ago Miller's drug store at Cerrillos took fire under rather mysterious circumstances. The damage amounted to about \$100. Within a day or two Miller has attempted to make an assignment after having transferred, it is alleged, most of his property to his wife. Today attachments amounting to some \$600 were filed by eastern parties against Miller's stock by Attorney Geo. W. Knaebel, and L. G. Jones, of Cerrillos, through his attorney, Chas. Spiess, has distrained the stock of drugs for the payment of rent on the building occupied by Miller. Mr. Jones is in town today and he says Cerrillos is entirely too healthy a place for Miller to attempt to make a living out of the drug business in.

The list comprises 636 offices, and according to the postmaster general's statement it would require an appropriation of \$1,900,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1893, to introduce the service as contemplated by the senate. The bill authorizes the establishment of the free delivery service in cities with 5,000 population or at post offices which produced a gross revenue of \$5,000 during the preceding fiscal year. The only offices it affects in New Mexico are East Las Vegas and Santa Fe.

REPORT OF THE TERRITORIAL GRAND JURY.

To the Honorable James O'Brien, chief justice of the territory of New Mexico and judge of the Fourth Judicial District Court thereof for the county of San Miguel in said territory in session at the April term, A. D., 1892:

The grand jury for the April term 1892, of the District Court of the county of San Miguel, having closed its labors, desire to report to your honor such fact and in connection therewith, desire to state, that they have diligently and carefully, during their sitting, as such grand jury, examined into all violations of law brought to their attention of which they could take cognizance and have returned indictments only in such cases where they believe, from the evidence adduced before them, a trial by jury would be warranted in finding a conviction of the accused parties. That they have examined into many accusations brought to their attention, but which the evidence before the grand jury, in their judgment, did not warrant their returning a bill of indictment and in such cases no indictment was found or returned.

That in their examinations and deliberations they have endeavored, to the best of their ability, to examine all causes free from any prejudice or influence and have in no case returned any indictment through malice; neither have they refused to return an indictment, in any cause, through favoritism or partiality, for the accused; but in all matters brought to their attention, they have endeavored to do their duty, fairly and impartially.

We desire further to report, to your honor, that by a committee of the grand jury duly appointed, as such, we have made such examination of the affairs of the county, the books of the various officers of the county and the manner and mode in which the various county officers performed the duties of their respective offices and maintain and keep their offices and we find that the various offices of the county are kept in a neat and business-like manner and the various officers of the county, polite in their conduct and deportment with the public having business with them and that the books, papers and property of the county are kept in a good and systematic order and from the limited examination made by us, of the accounts, receipts and disbursements of the county collector and as well, the county treasurer, we feel satisfied that the revenues and moneys of the county are being properly accounted for and promptly paid over at the end of each month, as required by law by the county collector to the treasurer of the county, and that the treasurer of the county keeps his accounts of the public moneys in an intelligent manner, so that, at any time, it is readily ascertainable, the exact condition of the finances of the county.

We also examined as required, the public buildings of the county and we find that the same are kept in a

proper manner and we desire to commend the action of the honorable Board of County Commissioners in their efforts for the preservation of the county buildings and property and especially in establishing a system of fire protection in the courthouse which is now being done under the direction and supervision of the Board of County Commissioners, believing as we do, that it will greatly lessen the risk of injury and destruction by fire of not only the county courthouse but the many valuable records, documents and papers therein contained.

From an examination of the disbursements and expenses of the past year, compared with former years in administering the affairs of the county, we find that the county affairs, under the present Board of County Commissioners, are being much more economically administered than heretofore, in as equally, if not more satisfactorily manner.

We carefully examined the County jail and the condition of its management and we found it to be kept in a cleanly and sanitary condition and from conversations and interviews had with those confined therein we found none to complain of their treatment or the food furnished them by the sheriff and jailor in charge. We, however, would recommend and call to the attention of the Board of County Commissioners that some slight repairs are needed in said jail; especially the main front door needs repairing and proper and suitable grating or bars should be placed across the transom in said door to better admit the free circulation of air through said jail and at the same time prevent the escape of prisoners confined therein when given the liberty of the corridor of such jail.

That owing to the limited accommodation of said jail for a limited number of prisoners and considering the large number of prisoners that it is necessary at times to incarcerate therein and especially as at the present time, there being a number confined therein charged with the highest crimes known to the law, we deem it but our duty to call the attention of the sheriff to the necessity of having proper cautions and suitable persons employed as guards about said jail, who will use every precaution and care to prevent escape of such persons.

In the performance of our duties as grand jurors, we have been materially aided and assisted by all the court officers and as well, county officials, each and all of whom were ready and willing at all times, when called upon, to render us such assistance and aid and give us such information as they possessed, when we desired the same, for which we desire herewith to return our sincere thanks to one and all and as well, to your honor, for the courteous treatment we have received and now, having finished our labors, as such grand jury, we most respectfully

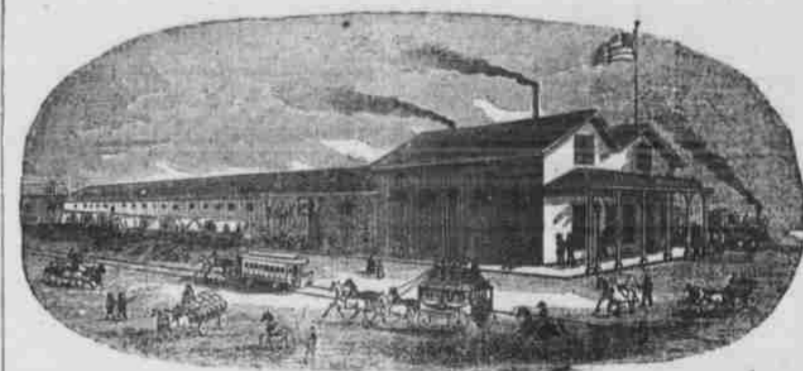
