Postmaster General Wanamaker has laid before the house committee on post offices and post roads, at the request of Chairman Henderson, a list of towns which under the law recently passed by the senate will be entitled to free delivery service in event of the bill becoming a law. The list comprises 636 offices, and according to the postmaster general's statement it would require an appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1893, to ir troduce the service as contemplated by the senate. The bill authorizes the establishment of the free delivery service in cities with 5,000 population or at post offices which produced a gross revenue of \$5,000 during the preceding fiscal year. The only offices it affects in New Mexico are East Las Vegas and Santa Fe.






