LATE NEWS.

MEETING OF THE NEW CABINET
LONDON, Aug. 19.—The second meeting of the new cabinet was held today. After discussing the future course of the government the meeting broke up. The ministers will not meet till the end of October, unless something should occur.

THE CHAMPION PACER.
CHICAGO, Aug. 19.—The world's pacing record went to smash today. Hall Pointer, the game son of Tom Hall, made the fastest mile ever gone in harness. Time 2:05. The sulky had low wheels, ball-bearings and pneumatic tires. Weight 62½ pounds.

WOULD NOT TAKE THE STRIKERS' PLACES.
ELMIRA, N. Y., Aug. 19.—Sixty-five new men were brought to Sayre this morning and put to work. After working several hours they quit, saying that they would not take the strikers' places. Only one train was moved out of Sayre this morning.

REFUSED TO TAKE HIS TRAIN OUT.
DETROIT, Aug. 19.—The great strike of the switchmen now in progress in Buffalo came very nearly precipitating a crisis early this morning. An attempt was made by the Michigan Central officials to ship a number of switchmen on the Niagara Falls and Buffalo express, which left here at 12:45 p. m. They were to take the places of the strikers, but the conductor refused to take the train out with the men on board, so they were taken to a hotel for the rest of the day. Any further attempt would have no doubt resulted in a strike here. The men will go across the river to Windsor and take the Grand Trunk train for their destination.

The committee appointed to make arrangements for the entertainment of visitors next Thursday are hard at work and will make good reports tomorrow night.

If you don't feel like joining the Union League club, but are at all favorable toward its objects it is worth your while to attend some of its meetings. Its membership is increasing fast and it will have a big influence in shaping San Miguel county affairs this fall.

The dance at the Springs next Thursday night in honor of the territorial Republican convention will be the event of the season. Manager Frost with his usual liberality told the committee who saw him that he was glad to place the hotel at their disposal for the occasion. As there will be a big crowd here it will take all the accommodations of the spacious Montezuma to accommodate them.

COMING TO THE CONVENTION.

A letter received today by Hon. L. C. Fort from Hon. A. L. Morrison and R. E. Twitchell says that there will be five special coaches over here from Santa Fe on Thursday next, bringing from 300 to 400 of the good citizens of our neighboring city, who desire to visit Las Vegas and witness the proceedings of the territorial Republican convention which will be held on that day. Large delegations are expected from other portions of the territory and they should be given a hearty welcome by our citizens. We are informed that the Republican convention will convene and be held at the opera house and arrangements are being made to give our visitors a grand ball in the evening at the Montezuma Hotel at the Hot Springs on which occasion special trains will be run by the company. Among our visitors there will be many ladies of the best families of the territory who visit Las Vegas for the first time, and it behooves the citizens of our town to maintain the high reputation Las Vegas bears among its neighboring towns for hospitality, to make preparation and assist in providing for the entertainment of such a large number of guests.

In the old world the glass age seems to have come in. The rajah of Indore, who likes showy things, has had made a furniture set all of glass—glass bedsteads and chairs, huge glass sideboards and other articles of domestic use.

"BALDY."

Excursions to Baldy cañon and the climb to the top of this famous old peak, are not infrequent, and in fact are becoming the popular feature of all outing parties. Leaving the Springs the road up the cañon is taken. This cañon is walled on its southern side for some distance by grey cliffs that rise up to the table land some 800 feet—and on the northern side by lower spurs, with numerous side cañons. The road for a mile or two is almost level and affords a considerable diversity of view, with plenty of sunshine and open air.

From Hobart's mill the road becomes narrower and steeper, necessitating some actual climbing. For several miles the condition of the road is appalling, but the fascination of delight more than counterbalances the reality of danger, yet it is with a sigh of relief that Trout Springs are reached. Then for a distance of about 12 miles, the road bends and turns among the rocks, through valleys and over hills, mountains, dells, grass, pines, sunshine and clouds, flowers and water, attracting attention and causing exclamations of delight and surprise.

The entrance to Baldy cañon is reached and the road from here on to the point of actual climbing is a gradual ascent and can be traveled by carriage.

Gradually the valley narrows and we find ourselves at the spring. Here we abandon our conveyances and "foot it" for the top. The ascent is steep and perilous. High bluffs hem us in, mountain walls of a dizzy height, presenting irregular and jagged masses of rock rise around us, to the height of several thousand feet. It is about four miles to the top and yet one can not reach that point without winding about so that the distance is much greater. On we go, over rocks, up and down, round and round, and at last we reach the top. We pause and are filled with awe at the realization that we have reached the summit of Baldy, a monarch among the surrounding peaks, in royal dignity looking down on the lesser peaks near by. More than 10,000 feet above the sea level we find ourselves upon a velvety lawn, bedecked with fragrant and beautiful flowers and trees luxuriant and dense, whose piney odors fill the air. A cool spring bubbles forth from the rocks, affording refreshment to the weary tourist. From this spring, which is near the head of the trail, we proceed to the edge of the cliffs,

guided by huge crosses which stand against the trees along the trail. We are surprised to see several huts up here, and from their structure we judge it has been many years since they were built—in the time when wild animals were numerous upon the mountains.

An immense cross stands upon the edge of the precipice, and here we stand in silent admiration. The view is sublimely grand. Our vision is unobstructed and it is with unbounded joy that we survey "creation round." Thousands of feet below us, nestled among the hills, lie little villages surrounded by fertile fields. Mountains rise in the distance, phantom like, lovely and grand in appearance, and the lights and shadows are beyond description. A very magnificent panorama lies before us, and in wonder we gaze, loath to leave, spell bound by the grandeur and sublimity of it all.

The descent is much more trying, owing to the steepness of the trail, but one forgets that in the enjoyment of the fact that he has been on the top of Baldy. In short, a trip to Old Baldy and a climb to the summit in all its phases is the wonder of the one who sees and the despair of him who wishes to tell others of what he saw. Like many another thing, to be appreciated it must be seen.

UNION LEAGUE CONSTITUTION.

The following is the constitution of the recently organized Union League of this city:

ARTICLE I. Name and Object.

Sec. 1.—The name of this organization shall be the "Union League Club of San Miguel County."

Sec. 2.—The object and purpose of this club shall be to strengthen and promote, by all legitimate agencies, the enforcement of law and order, and to secure the nomination and election of good and qualified men to office; thereby exerting the most potent influence in behalf of good government.

ARTICLE II. Membership.

Any person who is twenty-one years of age, who is a legal voter of San Miguel county and in hearty sympathy with the object and purpose of this club, shall be eligible to membership therein.

ARTICLE III. Officers.

The officers of this club shall be a president, two vice-presidents, a secretary, assistant secretary, treasurer, an executive committee of five, of which the president and secretary shall be members "ex-officio," and a finance committee of five members. All officers shall be members of the club and shall be elected (except the executive and finance committees, which shall be appointed by the president) by the members present, at such meeting and at such time as may be prescribed in the by-laws.

ARTICLE IV. Meetings, Quorums, Etc., Etc.

Sec. 1.—The regular meetings of this club shall be held at East Las Vegas, N. M., on Friday evening of each week, at such place as may be designated by the executive committee.

Sec. 2.—Five members shall constitute a quorum at any regular or duly called special meeting of the club.

ARTICLE V. By-Laws, Resolutions, Amendments, Etc.

Sec. 1.—All by-laws and resolutions of this club shall require a majority vote of the members present at any regular meeting for their adoption.

Sec. 2. Amendments to this constitution shall only be made upon previous notice of two weeks, in writing, and shall require one-third of all the enrolled members present at a regular meeting, the two-thirds affirmation to be not less than two-thirds of the members of the club to amend; provided, that no amendment shall at any time be made that will conflict with the general purposes of this organization, as hereinbefore declared.

ROSWELL N. M.

A special train on the New York Central ran on Saturday last from Rochester to Syracuse, 81 miles in 72 minutes, lowering all former records two minutes between those points. The train consisted of a day coach and the private car of Vice-President Webb.

"Freightmen," said a traffic manager yesterday, "are inclined to be despondent that the earning this month are not running ahead of those of August 1891. This should not be expected, as August, 1891, was the phenomenal month of the year as regards earnings."

The earnings of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul road for the second week of August were \$586,698, against \$491,897 for the corresponding week last year, an increase of \$94,801. The earnings of the Milwaukee & Northern during the same week and were \$32,836, an increase of \$1,806.

The Chicago Herald says: It is known that his discharge of Traffic Manager Leeds, of the Missouri Pacific, at the dictation of the Western Traffic association in no way damaged Mr. Gould's cordial relations with his ex-official. Mr. Leeds went to San Francisco, organized a freight bureau and now has the Southern Pacific on its knees begging that he will call off the competition of the clipper ships, which is knocking transcontinental rates into a cocked hat. Mr. Leeds intensified and centralized the opposition to the monopoly of the Southern Pacific on California business until it culminated in the information of four companies to build a line from San Francisco to Ogden. He is the acknowledged guiding spirit and advisor of the whole movement.

POLITICAL POINTS.

Many Las Vegas Democrats are joining the new Union League club in that city. They will help to knock the iniquitous White Cap organizations this fall.—New Mexican.

Romulo Martinez may receive the Democrat nomination for sheriff of Santa Fe county; if he does he will be defeated by many votes.

It is reported that the olive branch held out by Chairman Wily B. Childers to Leader Felix Martinez, of the San Miguel county People's party, has not yet been accepted and that the aforesaid Mr. Martinez does not think that olive branches are a good thing to gorge on. Besides he does not seem to care a red, whether Mr. Childers feels well or otherwise.—New Mexican.



Clear, strong coffee or tea, sweetened to taste and frozen to a soft mush, is a delicious frozen beverage.

Beef-tea, toast-water, oat-meal-water, milk and other liquid nourishments taken by invalids, may often be made more acceptable if frozen pretty hard and given in small quantities.

For plain vegetable soup, boil a soup bone the day before the soup is wanted, as the fat rises to the top when cool and can be taken off.

SUPREME COURT.

In the supreme court this forenoon Justice Freeman handed down a dissenting opinion, concurred in Chief Justice O'Brien, in the railroad damage suit of Squires vs. the A. & P. road.

In the case of the territory exrel Chas. H. Gildersleeve vs. J. L. Peres, sheriff, involving the interest of the Scott Moore estate in the Espirito Santo grant, Justice McFie rendered the opinion affirming the judgment of the lower court.

In the case of the territory vs. Sylvester Chavez, of Bernalillo, Justice McFie also rendered the opinion of the court whereby Chavez and his brother will go to the penitentiary for one year for cattle stealing.

The case came up on a writ of error on the point that the steer had the brand of "L. & H. Huning," while it was really the property of "L. Huning," and the court neglected to instruct the jury as to the prima facie evidence of ownership which the brand indicated.

The publisher of the Citizen has held a caucus with his boys and girls, and has come to the conclusion that he will be a "Hughes Republican" this year.

Yesterday, thirty days after closing business by reason of the twenty years expiration of its charter, the Second National bank directory held a special meeting and declared a dividend of 40 per cent.
