# Can GVSU Students use ArchivesSpace to:

- Identify relevant primary source materials?
- Determine how to access the materials?
- Locate related digital collections?



# Recruit participants

### Challenge

Special Collections & University Archives gets little foot traffic

Many undergrads have little experience finding and using archives

No budget for incentives to participate

#### Solution

Library User Experience (UX) student employees

More experienced with library searching and finding resources

Incorporated the test into their library training







### Likes


- Prominent citation button
- Ability to refine searches
- Relevant collections contain many possible sources of information

### **Disikes**

- Confusing to navigate
- Access to materials unclear
- Keyword searches don't always get results
