Results

Problems with fracking

"We did animal rescue, we had miniature donkeys, and when we saw what happened, we never let our donkeys go anywhere near a water source except for what we provided for them. We wouldn't let them graze on the grass out there because you don't know what kind of chemicals they're spraying" (Interviewee, 2) This is showing problems that can occur to animals from being in a environment where fracking is going on.

Framing of Fracking

"Well, we had to buy ads. When we were doing the [inaudible] combo thing, we did a porch party at my house. We asked the Denton Record Chronicle if they would put it in their community. What's happening in Denton- and they wouldn't do it so we bought" (Interviewee, 5). This is showing us how these anti-fracking groups were trying to get their message out to these individuals in denton, and how hard it was with fracking groups also trying to persuade these people of denton that fracking is good.

Conclusion

In conclusion, we found that both anti and pro fracking groups make valid statements. When talking about anti-fracking, people were mainly upset that their land was being taken over and that they couldn't do anything about it, it was a burden to their lives. With pro fracking, there was all sorts of money to be made. They understood that taking over land was a bad thing, but that we had to look at the bigger picture, and that was gaining more revenue for the community. For us, being able to see both sides was a turning point because we got to get insight from a positive perspective and a negative one. At the end, no one is right, people need more money, but people also need space.
