Comments from the Director

April is a busy time at Price Laboratory School as we continue with all of the spring programs and activities leading to a strong finish to the current year, while at the same time, implement planning for the 2003 - 2004 school year. A range of activities continue to reflect student learning and achievements for the current academic year. All eight PLS students that participated at the State Individual Events speech competition earned Division I ratings. Three of these students were selected to showcase their work at lowa's "All-State" speech event, co-hosted by UNI and PLS. A number of our students earned the opportunity to participate in international travel by enrolling in a third level of world language classes. Fifteen students traveled to France and seven to Chile, participating in home-stay trips with families. We hope to reschedule the trip to Russia for five students when world events stabilize. The girls' basketball team won the district championship and our boys' team played in the district finals game.

This year has been especially challenging as we confront the specific budget reduction identified for PLS. Working with Dean Callahan, we are addressing the budget reduction while at the same time planning an outstanding program for the 2003 – 2004 school year. There will be some faculty staffing realignments for the 2003 – 2004 year, however, we are confident PLS will continue to provide outstanding programs for our students. Providing challenging, innovative programming is critical, because in addition to supporting student learning for our Pre-K through grade 12 students, these programs provide the foundation for all the teacher preparation experiences and work with our professional colleagues in lowa.

In looking forward to the 2003 – 2004 school year, we have received permission to proceed with a tenure-track search for the PLS principal's position. The current position has been filled on a temporary basis for the past two years. Dean Callahan has appointed the following individuals to serve on the search committee: Jody Stone, chair; Amy Lockhart, elementary; Becky Hawbaker, middle/high school, Leonard Upham, elementary, middle/high school; John Henning, Department of Educational Psychology and Foundations; and Ron Bremner, parent. As the search process proceeds, time will be scheduled for parents and other constituent groups to have an opportunity to meet with the candidates. These times will be communicated through the PLSPublic listserve as well as student notes.

There is also search being conducted for the Dean of the College of Education. Dr. Bill Callahan is currently serving as the Interim Dean. The Dean's Search Committee has selected four people for interviews. They are Interim Dean William (Bill) Callahan, UNI; Dean Paul Beare, Armstrong Atlantic State University, Savannah; Chair Jeffery Cornett, Department of Educational Research, Technology, and Leadership, University of Central Florida, Orlando; and Provost Marlene Strathe, University of Northern Colorado, Greeley. It is expected that the candidates will be on campus for interviews from approximately April 10th through April 25th.

Many positive things are happening at PLS. We were notified on March 31st that

we received a grant for \$89,000 to partner with schools in Area Education Agency 9 to provide a professional development institute focusing on algebraic thinking across the grade levels. On March 28th we welcomed our new pre-kindergarten and kindergarten students at Round-Up. Almost daily we are receiving applications for new students applying to attend Price Laboratory School. Over the last few months, the PLS community has demonstrated the highest degree of dedication and commitment. Our work is ongoing with an exciting and bright future!

What's Under the Support Services Umbrella?

School Team Meetings

PLS Support Services is the umbrella that covers a wide variety of services designed to meet the individual needs of students at PLS. These services are initiated and coordinated through school team meetings (STM) (If you are interested in this please check out the information located at http://www.uni.edu/~east/STM.html)—a process in which we put our heads together to come up with a good plan for meeting an individual student's needs.

The STM process at Price Laboratory School is designed to assist in meeting the needs of any student who has identified concerns in the school setting. The purpose of the process is to generate and implement interventions that support the student in the regular curriculum

The STM process has both informal and formal parts. The informal portion consists of parent and teacher working together to implement modifications and interventions with the aim of providing success for the student. If successful progress is not reached at this level, the teacher or parent may request formal STM.

The formal STM process is used by a team of people who know the student or have expertise which may help in devising appropriate interventions. This process is based on the IDEAL model: Identification of the issue Defining the issue in specific terms Exploring all possible solutions Applying selected interventions Looking back to evaluate the success of the interventions.

Middle School Students Study Digital Photography

The 7th and 8th grade technology classes recently completed a unit of study on digital photography. The lessons covered basic camera handling, taking still photos, and using the control panel, LCD monitor and other features on the digital camera. The students learned about the advantages of using digital photography including the convenience of instant review and retakes, the ability to transfer digital images to a computer for use on the web and in multimedia productions, the capability to edit before printing, and that there are no film processing costs.

The class was then able to use a set of ten newer Olympus cameras and editing software from AEA 7 to complete their assignments and activities. They worked in pairs and individually, composing and taking photographs, and then editing the photos in Adobe PhotoDeluxe. By the end of the section on photography, each student had an opportunity to take still photos, transfer digital images to the computer, and perform photoediting processes on their pictures.

The students prepared individual portfolios which consisted of three photographs that had been edited in PhotoDeluxe, including some with special effects. They became familiar with the features and capabilities of digital photography and produced a variety of interesting photographs. Here are some samples of their work:



Nomination Committee – Cindy Page will chair and have a slate ready for the annual meeting; Audit Committee – Steve will chair.





As our season has come to a close, I would like to recognize the accomplishments of the Northern University High School varsity and competition squads.

Throughout the year, the squad took part in planning Homecoming, assemblies, Winter Formal, the PLS/NU Cheer Clinic, making locker signs, fundraising, and competing in cheerleading competitions throughout the Midwest. In addition, the cheerleaders had a lot of new faces to cheer for during the inaugural NU-Janesville football season.

This year, the competition cheerleaders had another incredible competition season. In only their second appearance at the State Championships, the squad beat three-time defending State champs BCLUW and took the Division 1A State Title. In January 2003, the squad took first place in small varsity at the Hawkeye Cheerleading Championships, beating Cedar Rapids Prairie, Urbandale, Waverly Shell-Rock, and many other 3A and 4A schools. The squad also competed at the Badger Cheerleading and Dance Championships in Madison, Wisconsin in February and took second place in the small varsity division.

Senior Kate Kilbourn was recently awarded the lowa Cheerleading Coaches Association (ICCA) scholarship and was honored at the annual ICCA Conference on April 5th in Ames. Each year, the ICCA picks five outstanding senior cheerleaders in the State of Iowa to receive this scholarship. Recipients are chosen based on school and community leadership, academics, recommendations from school faculty members and the head cheerleading coach, and an essay written by the cheerleader. Congratulations to Kate on this prestigious honor!

They have been leaders within our squad and have helped with the success of our program.
