Each year in November approximately 150 high school juniors and seniors from across Iowa take part in a unique activity, as they take the roles of representatives, legislative staff members, media and lobbyists.
The session tades place in the same House of Representatives Chamber that is used by the real Iowa legeslature. In order to apply for the Model Session, each student must create a bill which he/she hopes will make it through the simulated legislative process at the model session. One hundred student representatives are chosen to represent all 100 House of Representatives Seats across Iowa. On
 November 15-17, the 1998 Model Session was held.

We started off with a victory at North Tama. Then we played competitively all year including games against Aplington-Parkersburg, Hudson, and Grundy Center.
