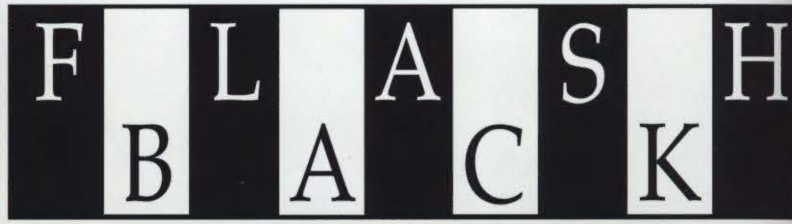
Although it's been great these last

This year was the last for several favorite NUHS faculty and staff members. After thirty-one years of teaching, Nick Teig said good-bye. For years his industrial technology classes were the favorite of students who built train sets, insect boxes, and even bubble gum machines. Lately students have enjoyed Mr. Teig in the driver's education classroom. His patience and clear instruction helped many an NUHS student get a driver's license.

Math teacher Earl Ockenga retired after twenty-one years of superior instruction. Students agreed that he was one of the best teachers they have ever known. When asked, they cite his patience and true concern for individual learners as qualities that make him outstanding in the classroom. Two staff members also left this year.

Lillian Marks, the social studies department secretary, retired after ten-and-a-half

years. The social studies department will miss her hard work and students will miss her ever-present smile and genuine interest in them. Joanne Heath, the manager of food services, retired at midyear. Students missed her great disposition and good food after she left. They will always remember her willingness to offer the cafeteria for fund raising suppers and special events.

Favorite Memories of a Beautiful Place

One common theme emerged when this year's retirees shared their favorite memories: the importance of the people who make up the NUHS family. Lillian Marks believes the people at NUHS are special. She said, "Many individuals touched my heart with their concerns and prayers when I had to go to Chicago for the brain surgery of our son John last year." She was overwhelmed by everyone's show of support—but not sur-

prised. She said, "We are one big family." Although Mr. Teig also believes that NUHS is a family, he especially appreciates the students. His favorite memories center on teaching the industrial technology classes. He said, "I'll always remember the sheer joy of learning and discovery manifested by those students."

Mr. Ockenga's favorite memory involves the grandmother of a student who taught him an important lesson about our school. He remembers walking down the hallway with her, pointing out items of interest and looking into classrooms. The walls of the hall showed a few cracks in their lime green tiles and the floor was a dingy brown and in need of some repair. A little ashamed, he reassured her that the school was working to make the halls look nicer. When they reached her destination, she surprised him by saying, "You know, this re-

ally is a beautiful place." Mr. Ockenga remembers feeling embarrassed at the age and state of the building. Hoping she couldn't sense how awkward he felt, he repeated, "Oh, we're working on it. We're going to make it nicer." And then she said something that made him realize more fully the value of NUHS: "Oh, no. You misunderstand. It's the people that are beautiful."

What They'll Miss...and What We'll Miss

All the retirees agreed that what makes this place beautiful is what they'll miss most: their students and their colleagues. And we'll miss those who retired, too. Every school year brings inevitable changes in the people who walk the halls. 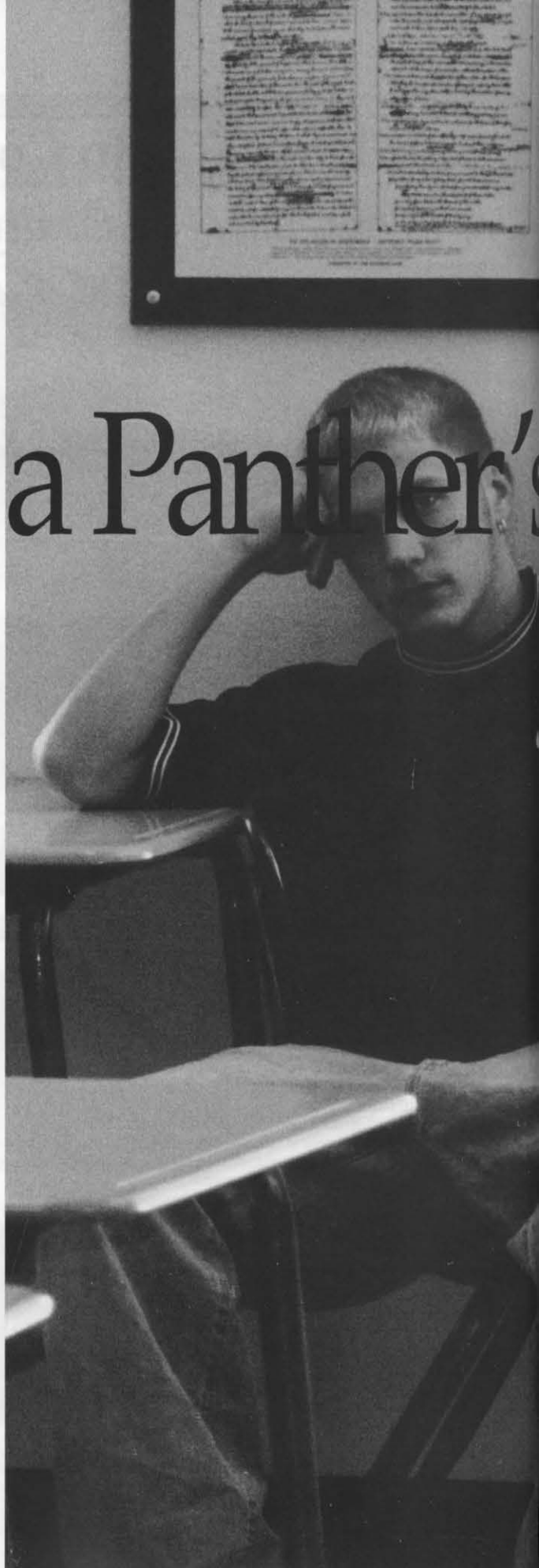

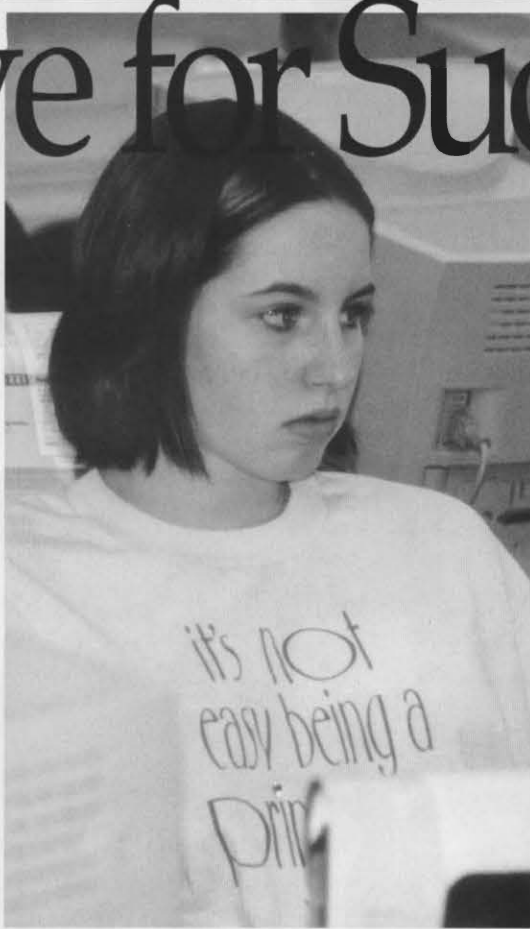
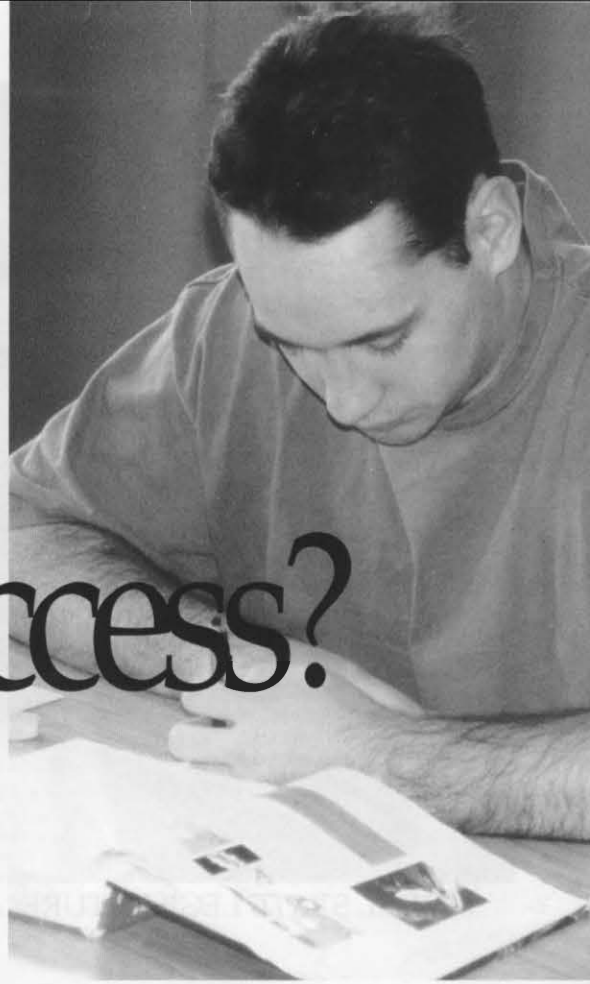

What is Model State Legislature?

Each year in November approximately 150 high school juniors and seniors from across Iowa take part in a unique activity, as they take the roles of representatives, legislative staff members, media and lobbyists.

The session takes place in the same House of Representatives Chamber that is used by the real Iowa legislature. In order to apply for the Model Session, each student must create a bill which he/she hopes will make it through the simulated legislative process at the model session. One hundred student representatives are chosen to represent all 100 House of Representatives Seats across Iowa. On

November 15-17, the 1998 Model Session was held.

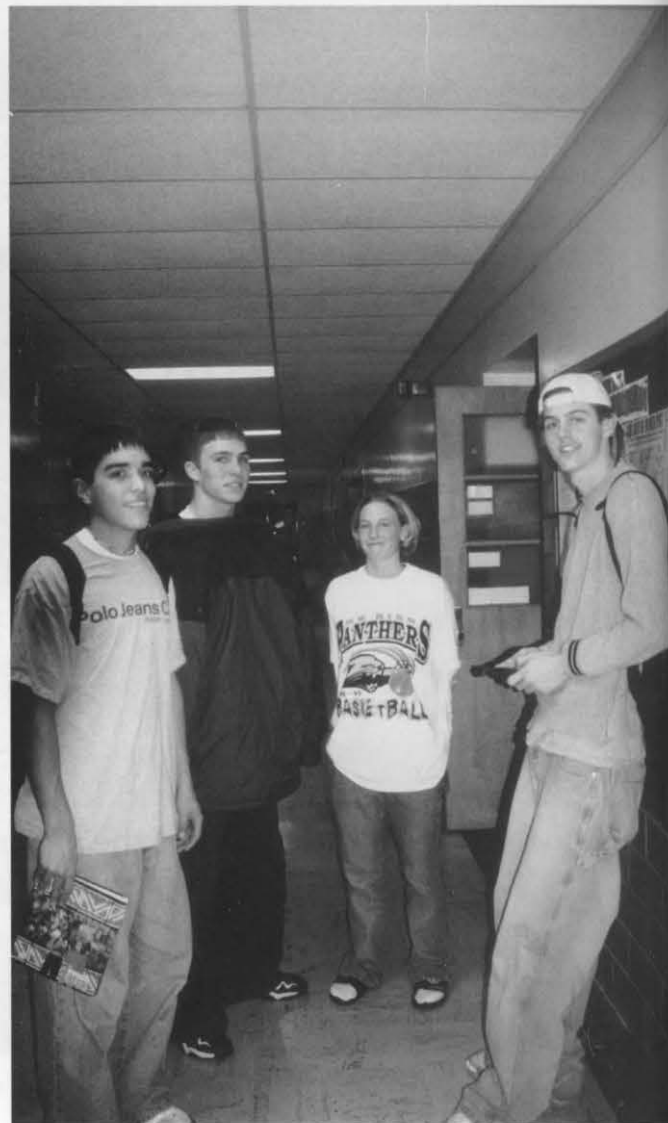

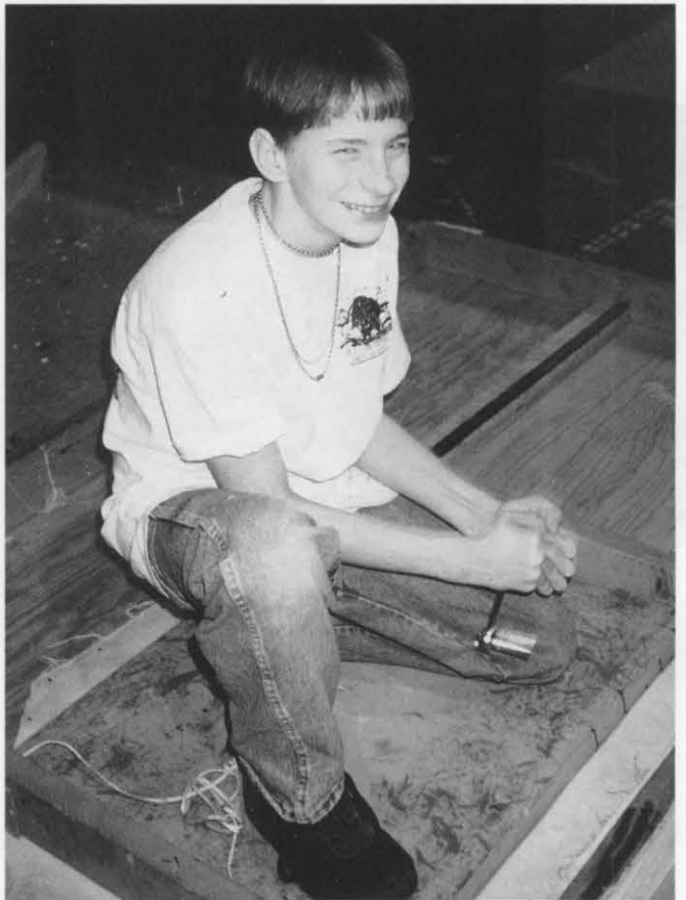

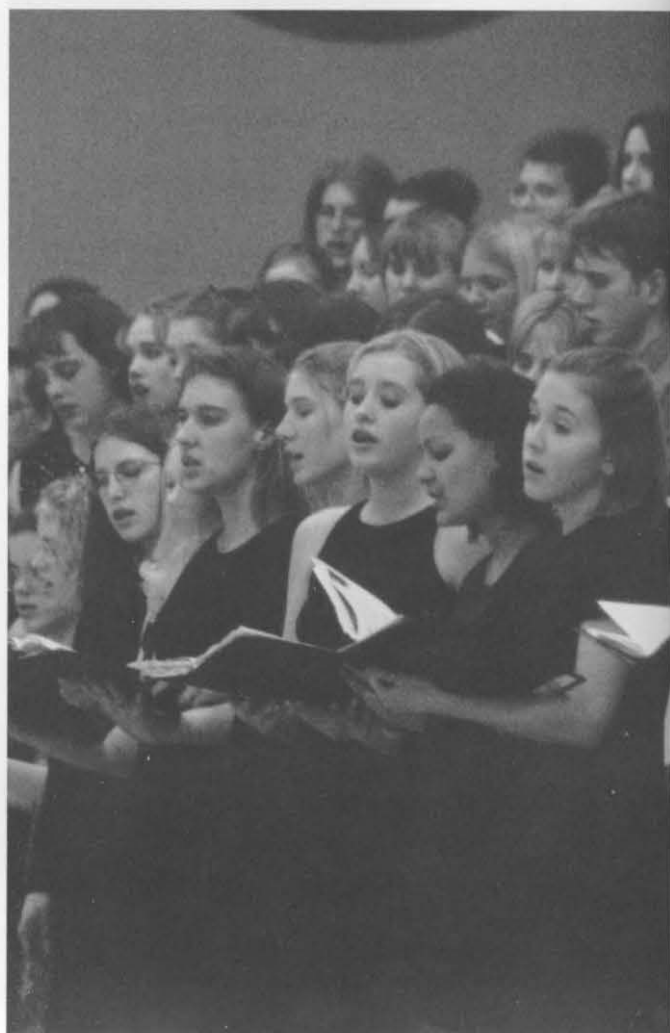

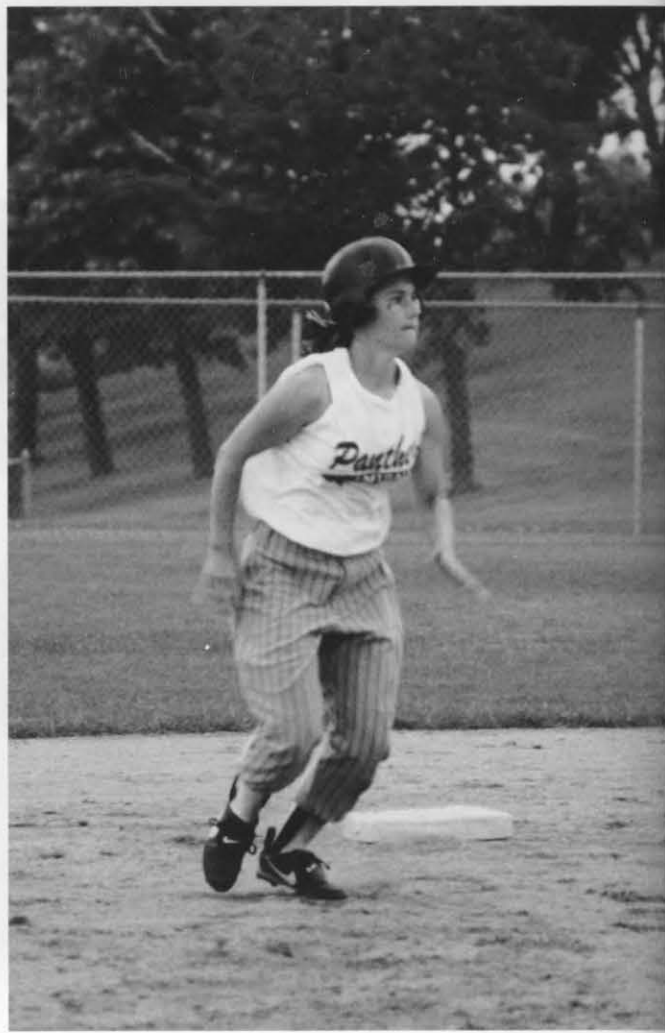

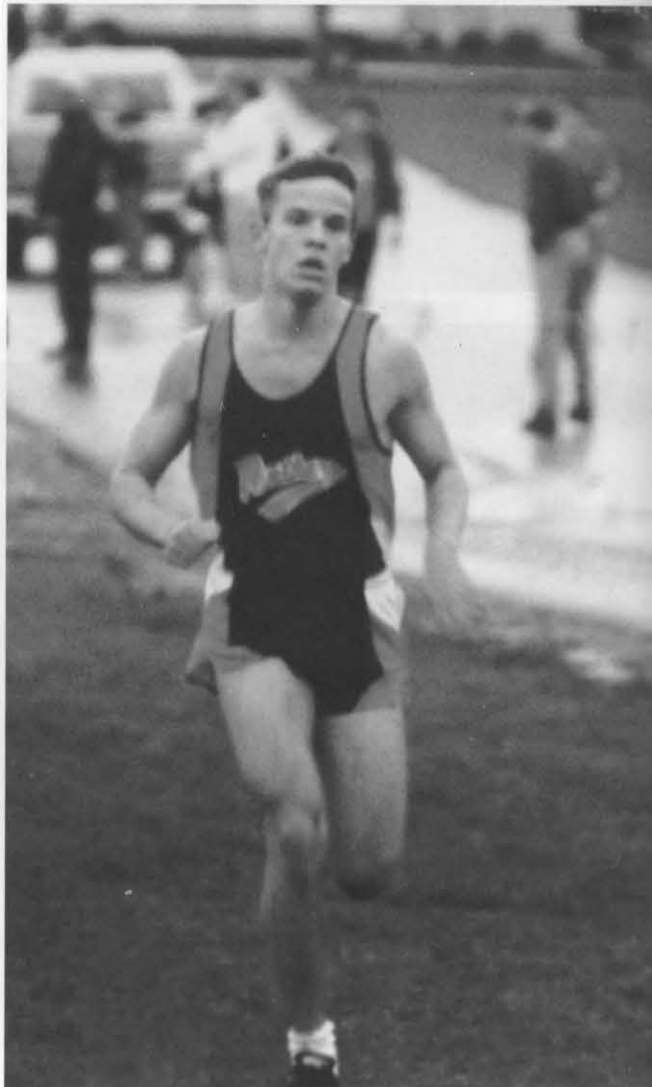

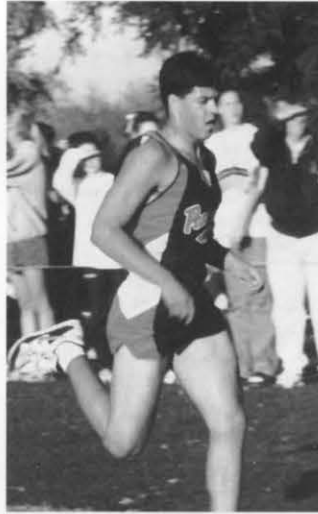

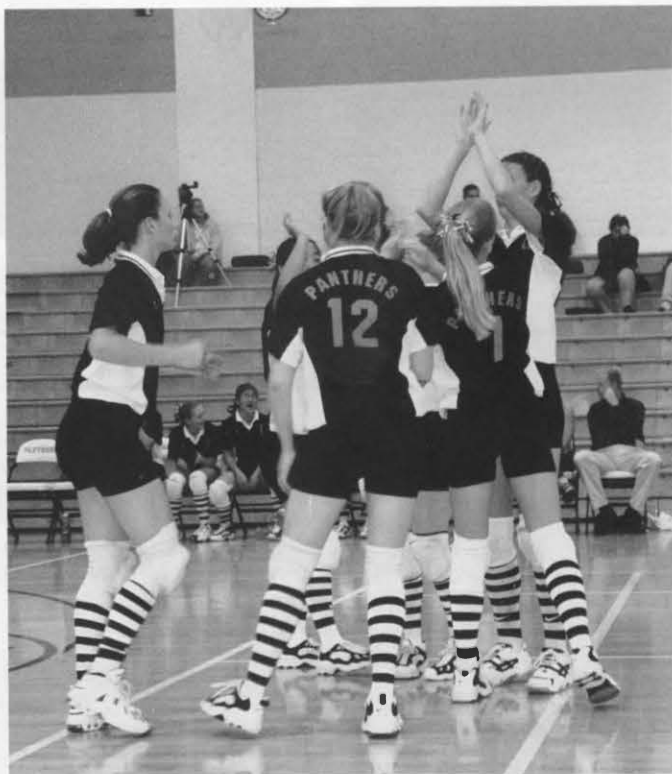
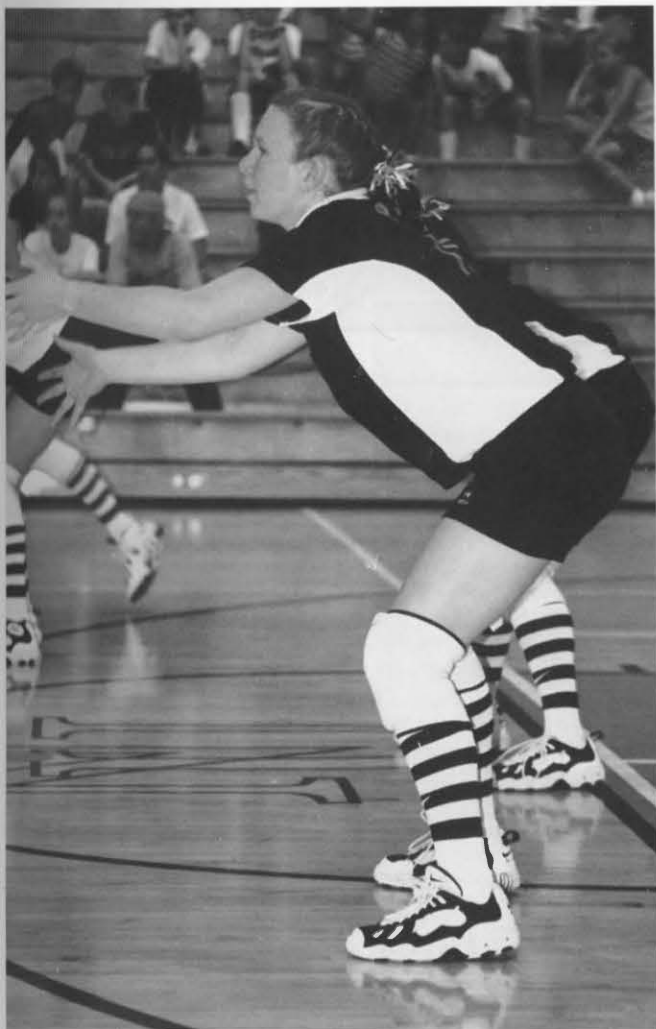

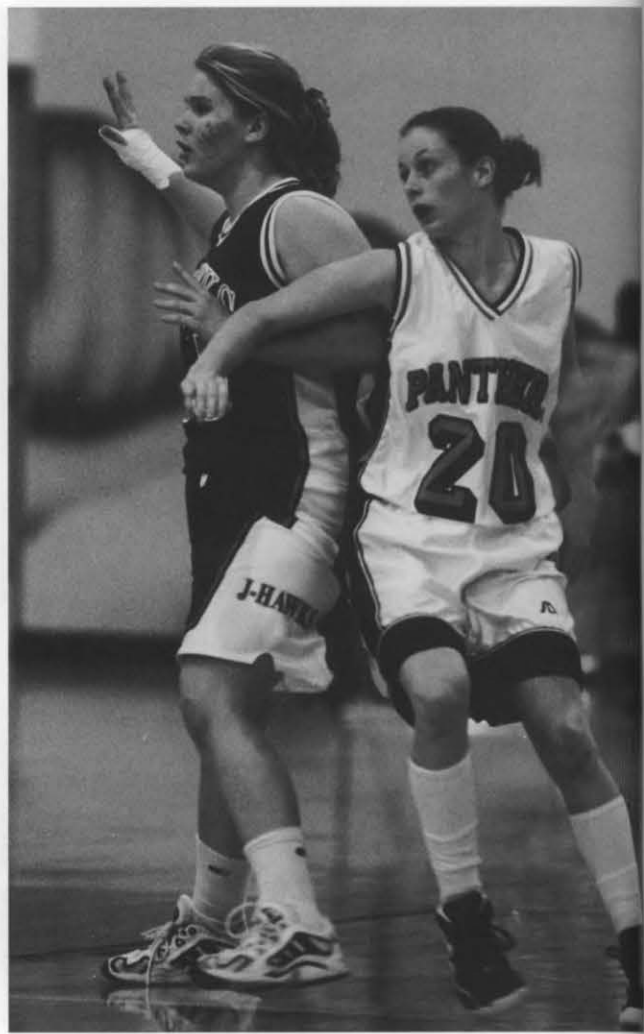

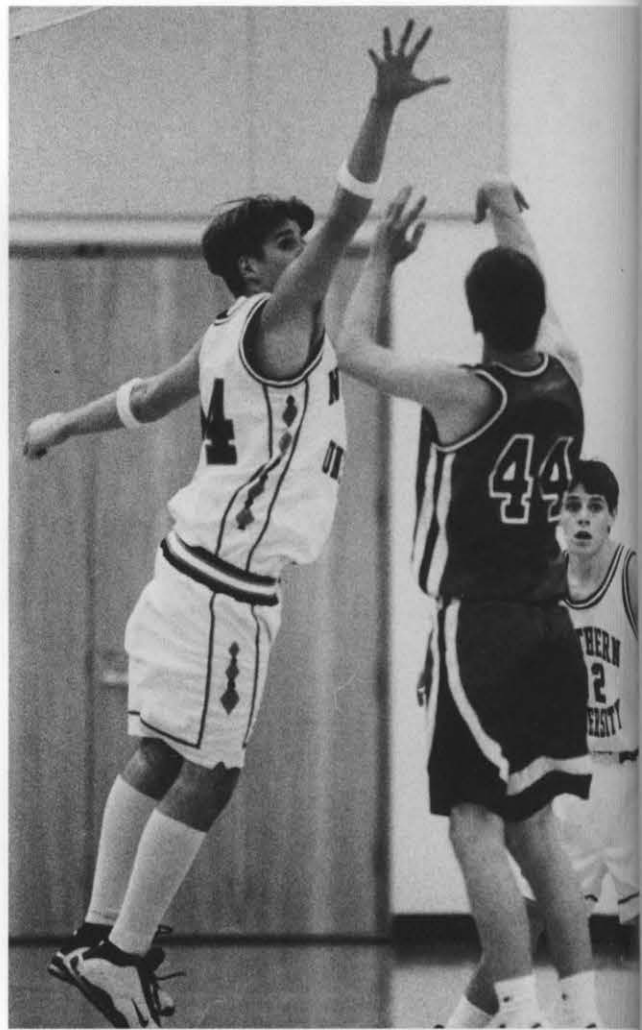

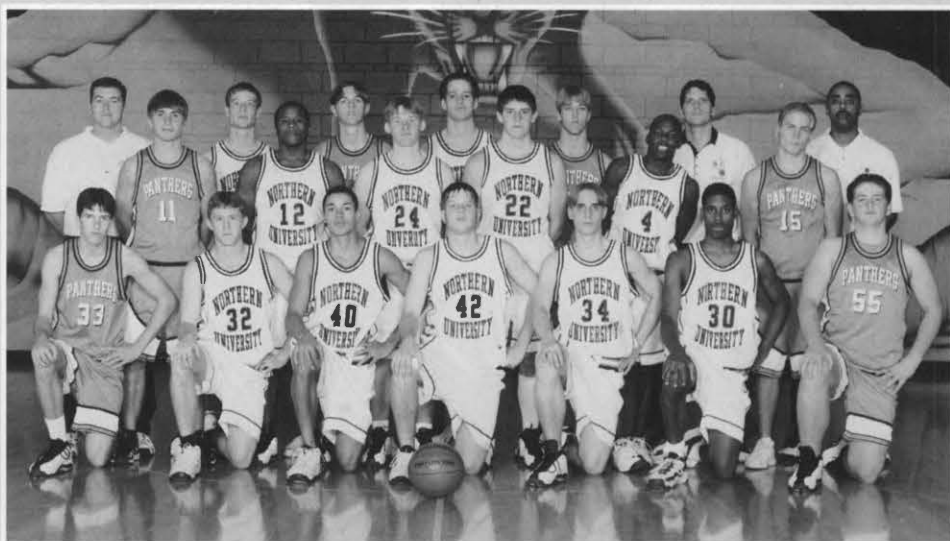

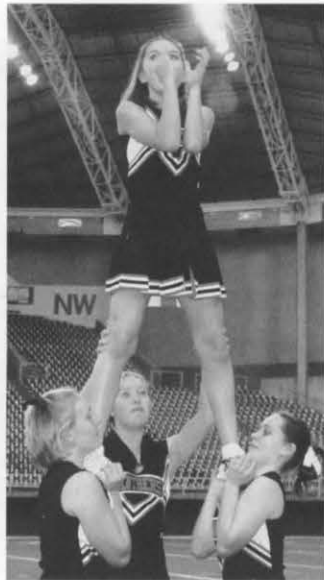

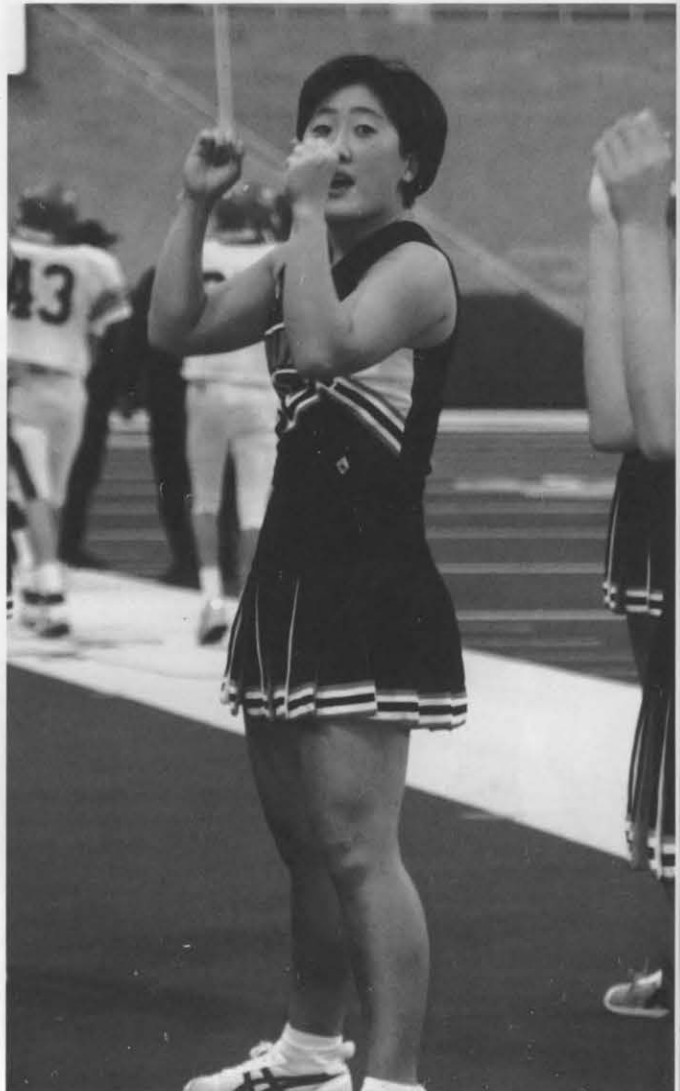

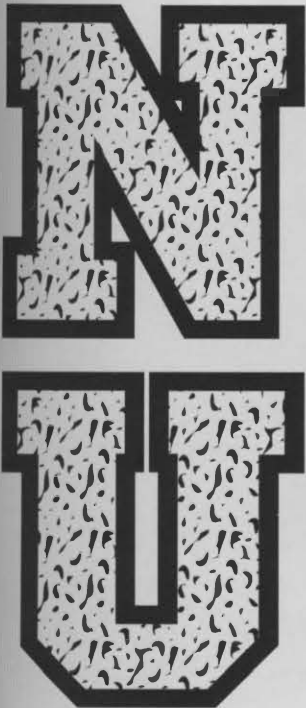

GOLF SEASON IS COMPETITIVE

After a memorable season last year that included a feat no other NU golf team had accomplished in more than 20 years--making it to the State tournament--the golf team had high hopes for the 1998-1999 season. Coach Lee Weber was doing some of the best coaching of his life, and we were all thirsty for another shot at State.

We started off with a victory at North Tama. Then we played competitively all year including games against Aplington-Parkersburg, Hudson, and Grundy Center. The challenging competition really helped us during tournaments, as evidenced by a fourth place finish at Conference in South Hills. After this, at the Sectional tournament, we took home gold medals with a first place finish in the team race and junior Kody Asmus carding a 79 to take the individual gold medal. Sophomore sensation Alan Johnson got third place at the Sectional tournament.

Next was Districts, where Kody won his second gold medal with a 74. The Panther team tied at 333 with Gladbrook-Reinbeck. But the Little Panthers lost in a three-hole play-off for the District title. 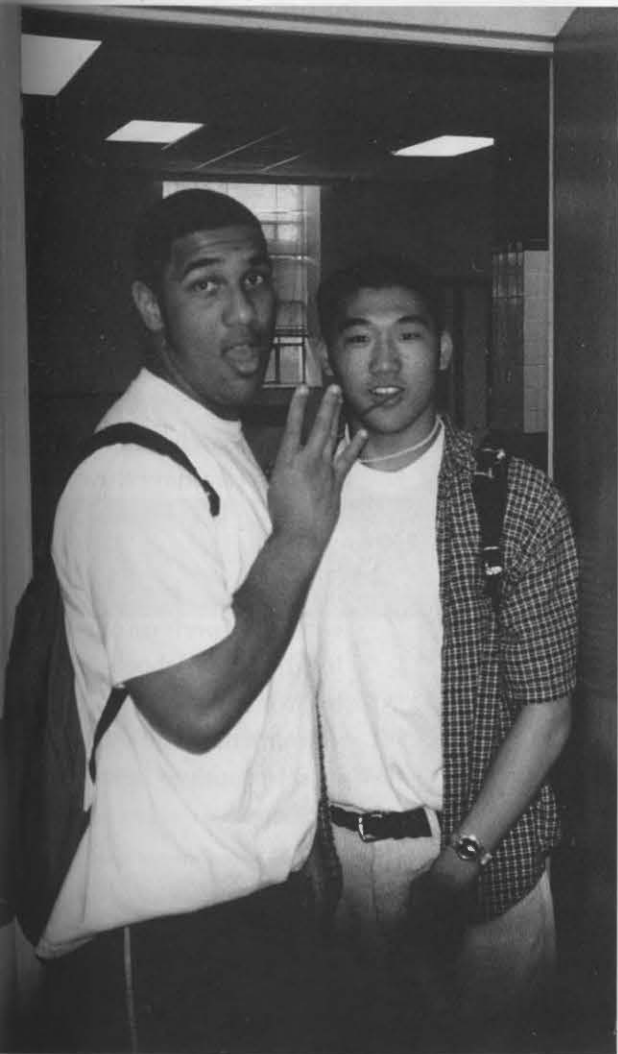

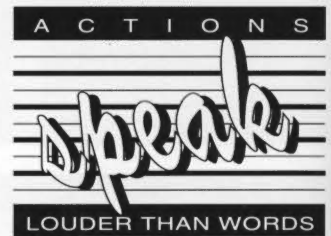

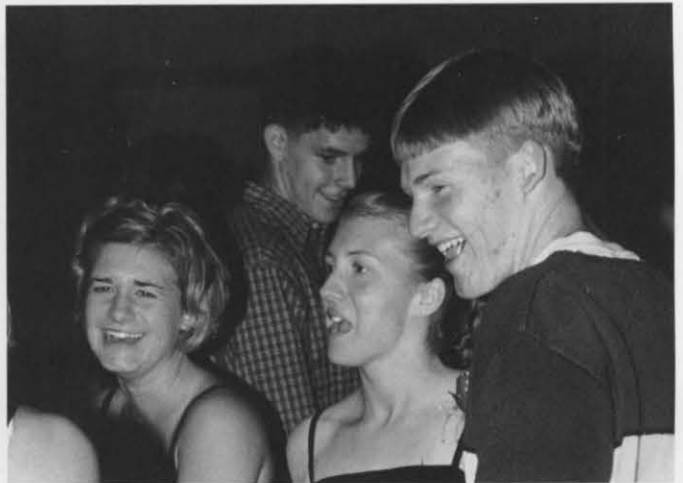

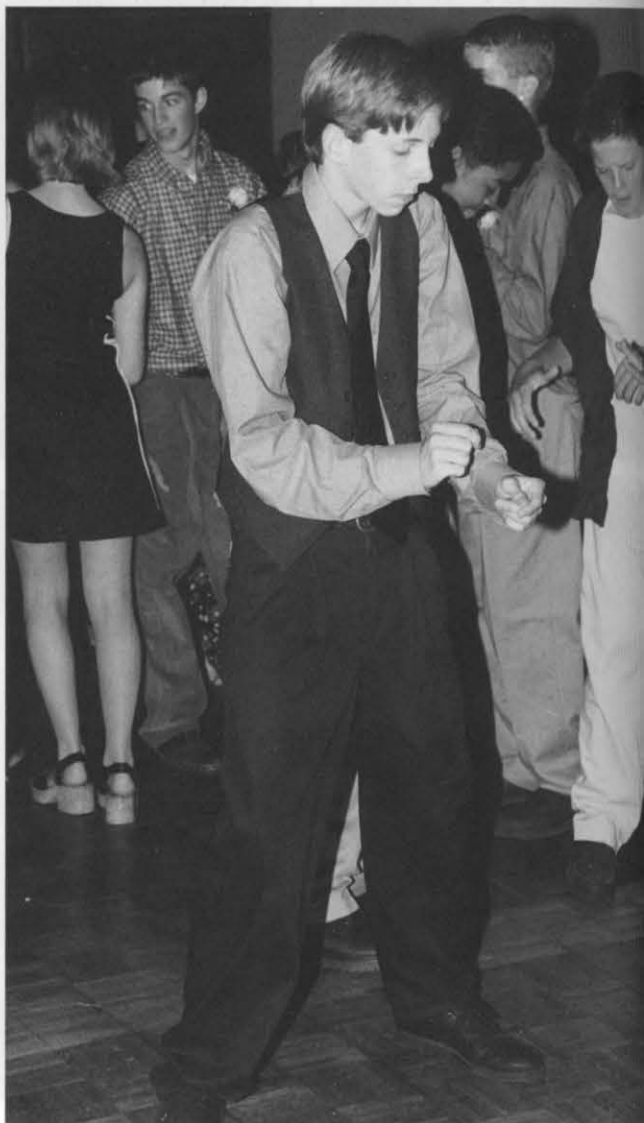

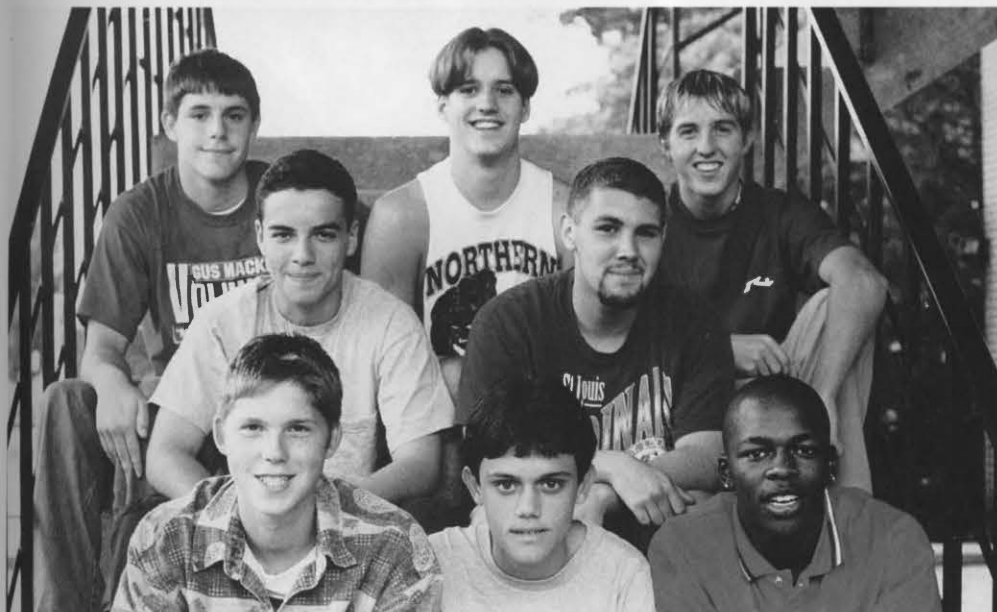

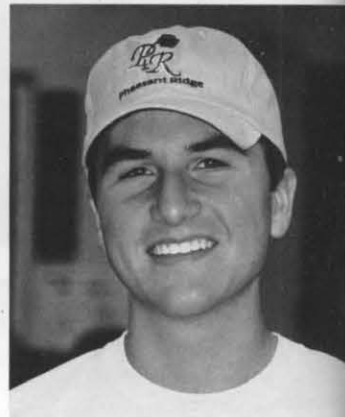

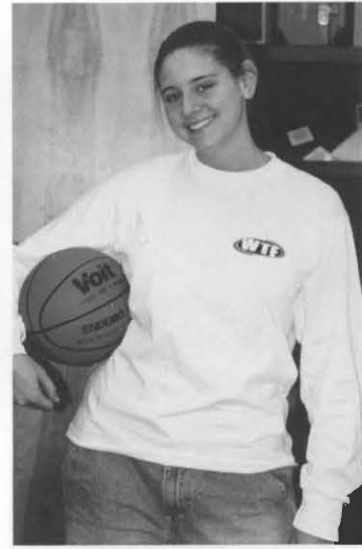
