All graduate degree candidates are listed under the college of their academic major.

The Academic Procession

The procession begins with the entrance of the candidates for degrees. Led by faculty marshals, the candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, both the Teaching Program and the Liberal Arts Program, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Liberal Studies, Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Science enter in groups, representing each of the undergraduate colleges. They are followed by the candidates for the highest degrees.

Students wearing a bronze medallion are those graduating summa cum laude (with highest honors), which represent the top three percent of each college by grade point average; or those graduating students receiving a Purple and Old Gold Award, given to those students who have excelled in scholarship or who have shown conspicuous achievement in particular areas.

The procession continues with representatives of the faculty.

The President's Party forms the final section of the academic procession. Headed by the commencement marshal, it includes the president; members of the Board of Regents, state of Iowa; administrative officers; the academic deans; and honored guests.

The individuals leading the procession of the graduates, the faculty and the president's party carry a mace which is a symbol of office. Those individuals are the student body president, the chair of the faculty and the university commencement marshal. Over long tradition, a mace is a symbol of authority and official celebration. The university mace is the largest of the three maces and it embodies the history and dignity of the entire university. The president wears a jeweled "Chain of Office" symbolizing the wearer is the leader of the institution. The silver chain includes links with the names of previous presidents of the institution, as well as previous names of the university.

The academic costumes worn trace their origin to the Middle Ages when long-sleeved hooded gowns were necessary for warmth in the unheated stone colleges. Over the centuries, much diversity occurred, and to bring some order, in the United States in 1894 an intercollegiate system of academic costume was agreed on, now adhered to by American institutions. According to this code, both the styling and colors of the regalia have significance.

The design of the gown indicates the degree. The bachelor's is a simple gown with a full sleeve. The master's gown is much like it except for the long sleeve which hangs loose. The doctoral gown is fuller and more elaborate. It has velvet edging and three velvet stripes on the full sleeve. The color of this velvet may be black or in the color appropriate to the degree.

Hoods, which are worn over the gowns, are similar for all degrees, although differing slightly in length. The candidates for the bachelor's degrees usually do not wear the hood. The hood has a velvet edging which indicates the area of the degree, and the inside or lining of the hood is satin in the colors of the college or university granting the degree.

Robert John Hibbs



Robert John Hibbs was born in Omaha, Nebraska on April 21, 1943. Hibbs graduated from the University of Northern Iowa – then, the State College of Iowa – in 1964. The Spring 2014 Commencement Ceremony would mark his 50 year reunion. While it is unfortunate that he cannot be present to celebrate with the Class of 1964, his incredible personal bravery and uncommon self-sacrifice is not forgotten.

Upon graduation, Hibbs enlisted in the United States Army in Des Moines, Iowa, on August 23, 1964, and after basic training, he went to Officer Candidate School in Fort Benning, Georgia. He was commissioned as an Infantry Second Lieutenant on June 22, 1965. On September 16, 1965, Hibbs arrived in the Republic of Vietnam with the first contingent of the 1st Infantry Division. He was assigned as an Infantry platoon leader in Company B, 2nd Battalion, 28th Infantry, nicknamed “The

Black Lions of Cantigny.” The motto of the 1st Infantry Division was, “No mission too difficult; no sacrifice too great – duty first.”

Hibbs was killed in action on March 5, 1966, just 36 days short of his 23rd birthday, near Don Dien Lo Ke, Republic of Vietnam, while leading a 15 soldier ambush patrol. His body was returned to Cedar Falls, Iowa, and was buried in Greenwood Cemetery.

Hibbs was recommended for the Medal of Honor by the commander of the 2nd Battalion, 28th Infantry, Lieutenant Colonel Kyle Bowie. President Lyndon B. Johnson signed Hibbs' Medal of Honor order on March 5, 1966. On January 26, 1967, his family and fiancé were flown into Washington, D.C., where they were presented the Medal of Honor by Secretary of the Army, Stanley Resor at Fort Meyer, Virginia. Army Chief of Staff, General Harold K. Johnson, said of Hibbs, “A man can choose no more honorable professional than wearing the uniform of his country in the defense of freedom and safeguarding the right of man to choose their own destiny.”

Hibbs was later inducted into the Officer Candidate School Hall of Fame on March 11, 1967. He was Iowa's first Medal of Honor recipient in the Vietnam War, and he is the only graduate of the University of Northern Iowa to have been bestowed such an honor.

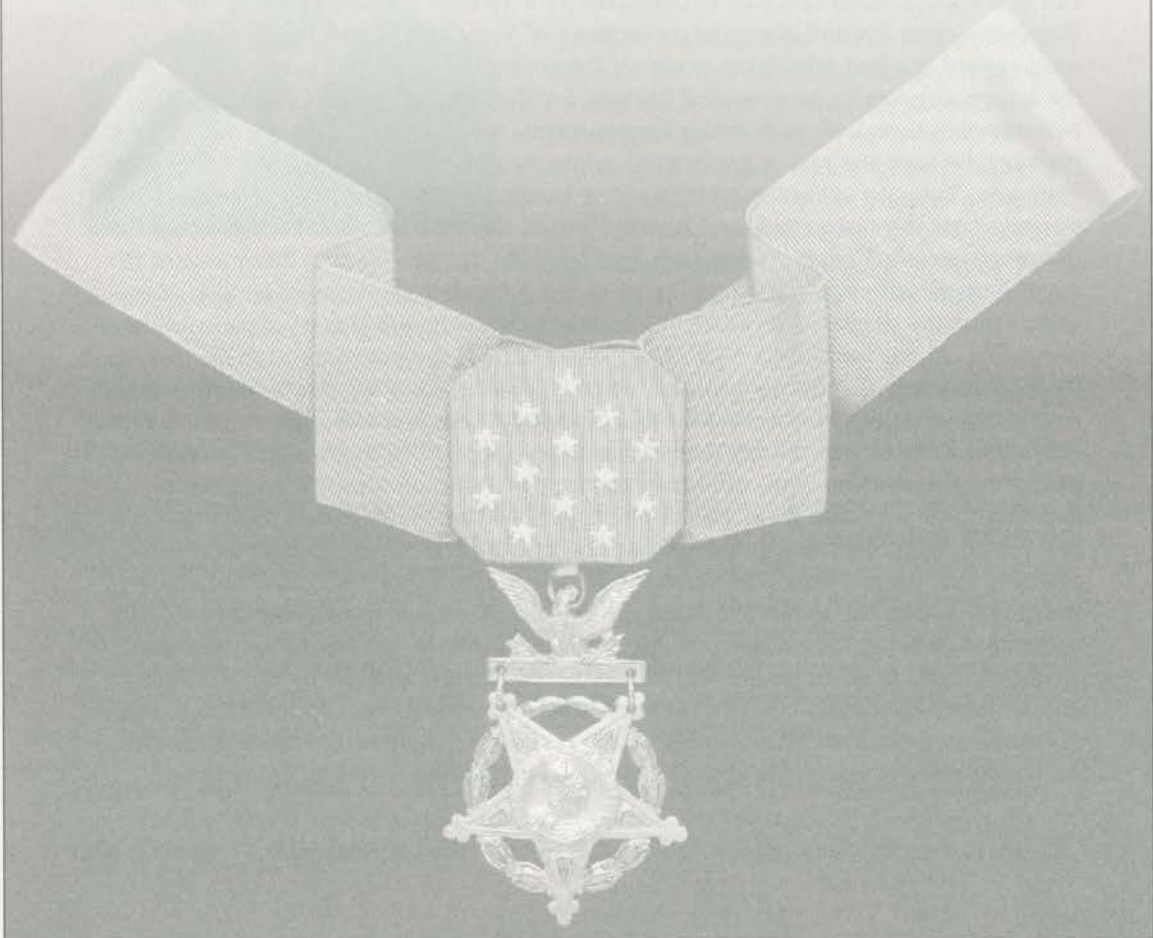
Rank and organization: Second Lieutenant, U.S. Army, Company B, 2nd Battalion, 28th Infantry, 1st Infantry Division. Place and date: Don Dien Lo Ke, Republic of Vietnam, 5 March 1966. Entered service at: Des Moines, Iowa. Born: 21 April 1943, Omaha, Nebr. G.O. No.: 8, 24 February 1967.

Citations:

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty. 2nd Lt. Hibbs was in command of a 15-man ambush patrol of the 2nd Battalion, when his unit observed a company of Viet Cong advancing along the road toward the 2nd Battalion's position. Informing his command post by radio of the impending attack, he prepared his men for the oncoming Viet Cong, emplaced two mines in their path and, when the insurgents were within 20 feet of the patrol's position, he fired the two antipersonnel mines, wounding or killing half of the enemy company. Then, to cover the withdrawal of his patrol, he threw hand grenades, stepped onto the open road, and opened fire on the remainder of the Viet Cong force of approximately 50 men. Having rejoined his men, he was leading them toward the battalion perimeter when the patrol encountered the rear elements of another Viet Cong company deployed to attack the battalion. With the advantage of surprise, he directed a charge against the Viet Cong, which carried the patrol through the insurgent force, completely disrupting its attack. Learning that a wounded patrol member was wandering in the area between the two opposing forces and although moments from safety and wounded in the leg himself, he and a sergeant went back to the battlefield to recover the stricken man. After they maneuvered through the withering fire of two Viet Cong machine guns, the sergeant grabbed the dazed soldier and dragged him back toward the friendly lines while 2nd Lt. Hibbs remained behind to provide covering fire. Armed with only an M-16 rifle and a pistol, but determined to destroy the enemy positions, he then charged the two machine gun emplacements and was struck down. Before succumbing to his mortal wounds, he destroyed the starlight telescopic sight attached to his rifle to prevent its capture and use by the Viet Cong. 2nd Lt. Hibbs' profound concern for his fellow soldiers, and his intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty are in the highest traditions of the U.S. Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of his country.

Medal of Honor

Established on December 21, 1861, by President Abraham Lincoln during the American Civil War, the Medal of Honor is the highest decoration for valor in action against an enemy force which can be bestowed upon an individual serving in the Armed Services of the United States. There are three versions of the Medal of Honor, one for each of the military departments of the United States Department of Defense: Army, Navy, and Air Force. Members of the Marine Corps and Coast Guard are eligible to receive the Navy version. The Medal of Honor is awarded by the President of the United States of America on behalf of, and in the name of, the Congress of the United States. It gives recognition to men and women who distinguished themselves "conspicuously by gallantry and intrepidity" in combat with an enemy of the United States. The deed performed must have been one of personal bravery or self-sacrifice so conspicuous as to clearly distinguish the individual above his or her comrades, and it must have involved the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty. Since the American Civil War, 3,487 Medals of Honor have been awarded. Today there are 77 living recipients of the Medal of Honor. According to the State Historical Society of Iowa, 108 Iowans from 10 conflicts have received the Medal of Honor.

Graduates wearing a white stole are members of Omicron Delta Kappa which is a junior-senior honorary organization which recognizes students who have demonstrated high levels of academic achievements, leadership in campus affairs, and community service.

Student Admissions Ambassadors

Graduates wearing purple and gold intertwined cords are members of the Student Alumni Ambassadors (SAA). Since 1989, SAA has served the University in a variety of ways. From giving campus tours to prospective students, alumni and University guests, to serving as representatives of the student body at special events, SAA is recognized as one of the premier service organizations on campus.

National Residence Hall Honorary

Graduates wearing royal blue and white cords are members of the National Residence Hall Honorary, an honorary organization recognizing the top one percent of leaders who live on campus. Members are inducted for showing continual service to the community, leadership within the residence halls, recognition of others in their endeavors, and outstanding scholarship during their tenure living on campus.

Phi Eta Sigma

Graduates wearing black and gold cords are members of Phi Eta Sigma which recognizes first-year students who have a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.5 on a 4.0 scale at the close of any full-time curricular period during their first year.

Northern Iowa Student Government

Graduates wearing gold stoles are members of the Northern Iowa Student Government (NISG). Since 1916, various governing bodies comprised of students have represented the student body as a whole. NISG, as the student governing body has been called since 1989, is committed to improving the administration of student affairs, encouraging the greatest level of communication and cooperation, ensuring the protection of student rights, and providing excellence in education.

CATS

Graduates wearing purple and black cords are members of Connecting Alumni To Students (CATS), the official student chapter of the UNI Alumni Association. These dedicated students represent the UNI student body to alumni and friends. CATS create and promote the lasting connections between past, present and future Panthers.

Ethnic Student Promoters

Graduates wearing purple and silver cords are members of Ethnic Student Promoters (ESP). ESP members are dedicated to creating, sustaining, and supporting diversity at UNI through the Office of Admissions. The promising students provide services to the University by assisting with the recruitment of new and diverse students, hosting events and visit days and creating an inclusive environment.

Team TC/TK

Graduates wearing purple and white cords are members of Team TC/TK, UNI's mascot program. 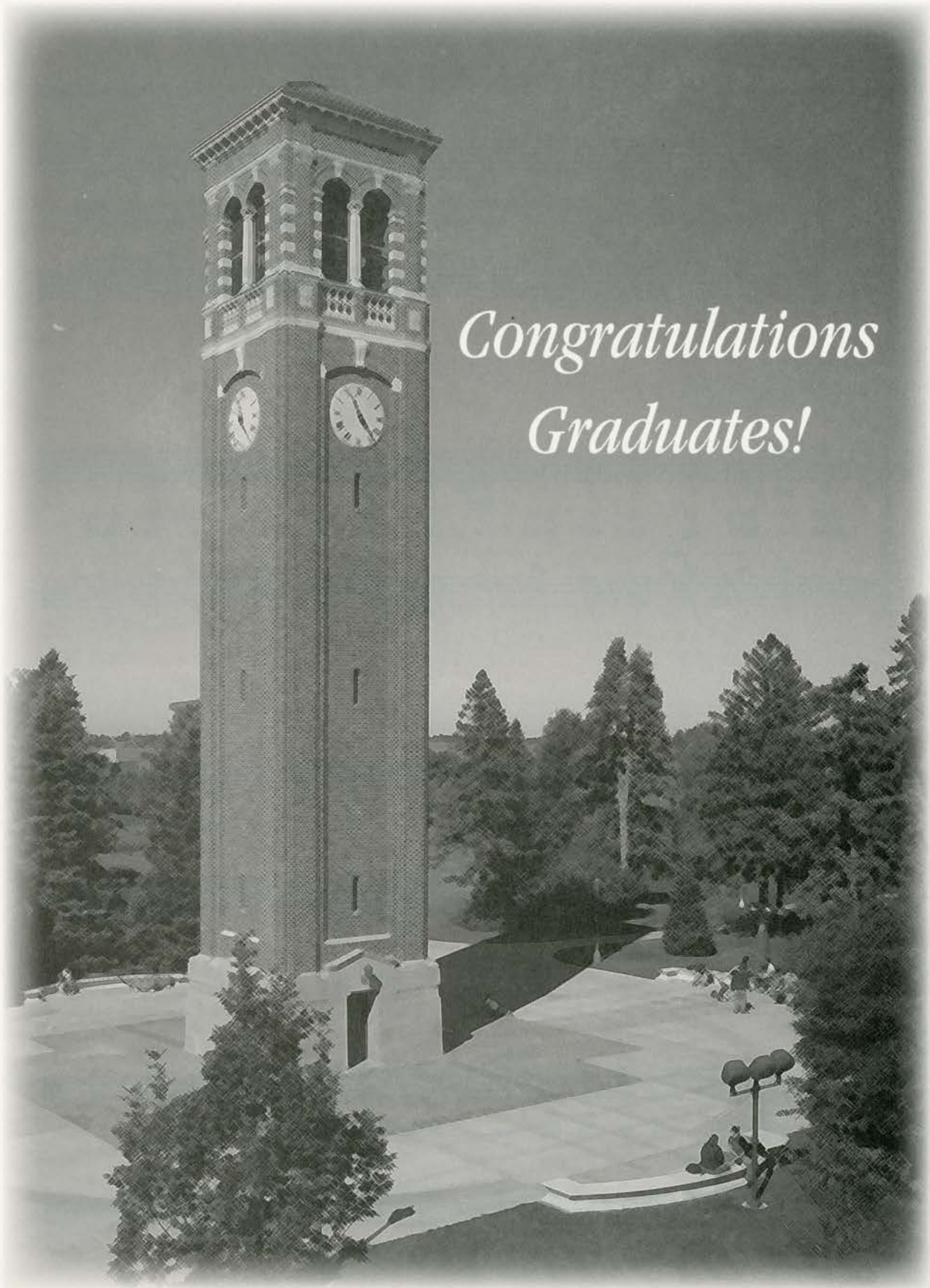
