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

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CURTAIN CLUB PAST

Dramatics at Ursinus College goes back to unrecorded history and has been perpetuated over the years by the overwhelming desire of certain students and faculty members to show off. Trying to recall in some accurate measure its history is like being called upon to recite the geneology of the House of Hapsburg. Its story is told, sometimes entangled, sometimes magnificent, and always interesting. So is ours.

In the dim years before World War I there were at Ursinus two literary societies, the Schaff and the Zwinglian. Their offerings consisted of several one-act plays staged in either the East or West Music Studios of Bomberger Hall and one major production (usually Shakespearean) performed in the Bomberger Chapel. In 1919 the student YM-YWCA began giving plays, the first of which had as its leads myself and my wife Anna.

During the years 1920-35 the Senior Class each year produced a major play. One "Pygmalion" was taken on the road—all the way to Phoenixville. It was during this time, the late twenties, that the present stage was adopted, and the Bomberger Hall resumed a less extracurricular nature. The 1920's were also the time of outdoor musicals held on The East Campus. Light operettas such as the "Red Mill" were directed by John Myron Jolls, an "Instructor in Voice Culture and Choral Singing" who had previous training as a "student under the direction of the Tonic Soh Fah College, London, 1893-96." Other dramatic coaches included Professor Franklin I. Sheeder, and Professor Reginald Sibbald of the French Department. In 1934 the U. C. Curtain Club became a charter member of Alpha Psi Omega, National Dramatic Fraternity.

From 1936 to 1946 Mrs. Helfferich and myself directed the group. I believe our most successful play was "Jupiter Laughs" although "Arsenic and Old Lace" has always been a difficult favorite to top. In 1942 Seymour Berman, a student from Brooklyn, gave what I remember as perhaps the best performance of Dr. Einstein in "Arsenic" I ever witnessed, and that includes both amateur and professional characterizations.

The early 40's, even with many male students off to military service, saw the largest Curtain Clubs in its history. Of an enrollment of approximately 700 students, 365 were involved in acting and staging work. The V-12, U. S. Navy officer candidate training program, brought many interested participants and many delightful and original skits to our stage.

The early and middle 50's saw me grudgingly and gradually remove myself from extensive and direct participation. The demands of college business and administration increased. During this transition Professor Geoffrey Dolman, Director of Admissions oversaw the Curtain Club efforts. His father, John Dolman, Jr., was for 42 years Professor of English and Dramatics at University of Pennsylvania and wrote definitive texts on the arts of action and play production. Both our director's grandfathers were professional actors and his paternal grandmother spent her infant and childhood years in a wardrobe trunk emerging to play on the stage with the great May Rokeson. Mr. Dolman has particularly fond memories of "Light Up The Sky." The increased complexity of admissions work drew him from the active directing, and Mr. H. Lloyd Jones assumed directorship in the mid-50's. "Our Town." "Mad Women of Chaillot," "She Stops to Conquer," "Charlie's Aunt" are a few of those years fruits. Mr. Jones also adapted "Pride and Prejudice" and "David Copperfield" to one-act plays for production on WFIL's educational television series. Mr. Jones accepted the position as assistant director of admissions, and, well, the usual. (This history begins to resemble more a sequence of Latin American presidencies—with a happy ending in our case.) Dr. Ivy Leaman, a Pottstown dentist (and a man still very active in suburban little theater) with tremendous energy and loyalty finished out the decade.

The Curtain Club History—sometimes inscrutable, sometimes fretful, sometimes magnificent has always been exciting and interesting.

CURTAIN CLUB PRESENT

Upon my appointment as Faculty Advisor to the Curtain Club in the fall of 1960, I inherited a material plant lacking one can almost say, in some degree, in everything. (Our program credits might well and truthfully read: Lights, courtesy of T. Edison; Costumes, courtesy of B. Ross and Goodwill Industries; and Curtain, courtesy of Ford's Theater.) My legacy was, however, rich indeed in talent and enthusiasm.

Riding light rein on our group of would-be actors has been a revelation for me. The desire and ability of the Curtain Club to put in order that infathomable process called a play proves to me that this is the most exciting and imaginative undertaking on the Ursinus Campus.

In these three brief years we have had on this stage six major productions, most of them successful. However, I believe that a fuller recognition should be made of the "smaller" efforts. The Curtain Club has put on innumerable productions for many types of audiences. Some, unhappily, space forbids a complete list, of these were: "Parting at Imsdorf" and "The Heiress" in 1960, in 1961 "A Pair of Lunatics" which was directed by tonight's student director, Betsy Thompson, and in 1962, a particularly delightful "When Shakespeare's Ladies Meet." Just a few weeks ago in the Bomberger Chapel, Jean Anouilh's version of Sophocles' tragedy "Antigone" provided the students, faculty, and friends of the college with a truly great dramatic experience. In contemporary dress and on a stage devoid of any set, Harry Serio as King Creon and Sue Higley as Antigone proved to all present the beauty and value of undergraduate dramatic endeavour.

It has been the highlight of my association with Ursinus to have been involved with these intense and capable men and women. As a teacher I learned much.

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
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
