LOST IN CYBERSPACE: TRACKING FUGITIVE WEB RESOURCES

Wendy Highby, Bette Rathe, Stephanie Wiegand University of Northern Colorado

Can researchers in 2006 locate web resources cited in graduate theses from 2001-2004? Data from a citation analysis study reveals the astounding number of altered, moved, or lost websites. This study quantitatively describes a particular manifestation of the ubiquitous but often undocumented problem of web resource instability. It points to many possible innovative solutions, such as instructional and archival interventions by librarians.

2001-2004 Dissertations: 237 dissertations containing 29,480 bibliographic citations of which 1140 citations or 3.8% are for web resources.

Fact sheets: Information highlights, overviews, general historical information

Instructional materials: Professors' websites, 'how to' information from .edu websites, class notes, etc.

Legal information: statutes, laws, court cases, congressional information, testimony

News: newspapers, magazines, newsletters, television & radio websites, press releases, other general news websites Research: research reports, prepublished research on the web

Statistics: websites that are chiefly statistical in nature

Traditional sources now online: books, journals, dictionaries, encyclopedias, sources that once were print but now being used through a digitized version

Other: software, survey instruments, online calculators, directories/table of contents/pages of links, product websites, vendor websites

Common citation mistakes

The most common web resource citation error was **omission of the date accessed**: almost one-third of citations-32%--did not contain an access date (237 out of a sample of 735).

Another common mistake was the omission of explicit and helpful information about the "host organization." The following APA style guide advice is too often ignored: "If a document is contained within a large and complex Web site (such as that for a university or a government agency), identify the host organization and the relevant program or department before giving the URL for the document itself. . . . When the author of a document is markedly different from the provider (e.g., the host organization), explicitly identify the latter in the retrieval statement"
