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## Power House At Kentucky Dam Is Barred To Visitors

Visitors to the new \$104,000 bridge across Kentucky Dam has been declared safe for traffic and is being used daily by the general public, but TVA still has not opened it officially.

Dedication and formal opening of the bridge was set for last Saturday but icy roads and cold weather forced postponement of the program.

Late Saturday officials said the bridge would officially open when a TVA engineer could visit and inspect the span. He apparently has not completed his work.

Steel Construction Company of Birmingham, Ala., built the bridge. A 1,630-foot shell-like bridge is attached to the dam and a 300-foot conventional structure spans the locks. The state department of highways laid a temporary hard surface and put up guard posts and wire on the railway across the earth fill between the dam and the locks.

Dedication of the bridge probably will not be held until next spring.

**Rider Discusses Value Of Pine Trees To Farmers Of This County**

Way back yonder someone said, "a man's best friend is his dog." You can be sure that person had no pine trees.

Now I may be biased in my opinion but I don't believe there is any kind of tree growing in Marshall County that has more uses than the pine tree. That is a very broad statement and anyone making such a statement should be forced to prove it. Here is your proof.

Last week I stopped at W. W. Shemwell's house on the Oak Level road and he showed me his Christmas tree. This, right, it was pine, a three year old pine about four feet tall and a beauty too. Mr. Shemwell stated that he didn't pick the best one because he was saving the best for fence posts and timber production.

On down the road I talked to Newt Tynes. He was raking up the needles under his 14 year old pine to use for strawberry mulch. Mr. Tynes said, "It is the best mulch that I have ever used. It is free of weed seed, spreads easy, lays well and is easy to get." Cordie Henson, East of Benton, has also mulched berries with pine needles and agrees with Mr. Tynes.

Anyone in the county can have pine trees for the asking. They are furnished through the county Agents Office free-of-charge and orders can be placed now for spring delivery.



**4 Kentucky 4-H Champs Win Chicago Trips**



**SUPERIOR** records of achievement work in the 1950 National Farm and Home Electric, Home Improvement, Poultry and Tractor Maintenance programs have won state honors for four Kentucky club members. Their awards were given at the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. Brief outlines of their records follow.

**Lee Ann Leet**, 17, of Utica, has been in club work nine years and completed 19 projects. She always liked to raise chickens, and concentrated especially on this project. Learning the newest and egg production for poultry and home electric program, which allowed her to raise a flock of 123 New Hampshire Reds. The hens were culled every three months to keep the flock in the best condition. She has a milk cooler in the hen house until 9:30 p. m. and turned on again at 4:30 a. m. This increased egg production. Lee Ann found that an important part of her project was to keep accurate records of all sales and expenditures. She has already started her laying program for 1951. Her trip was provided by Dearborn Motors.

With one eye on enhancing her home and the other on the family pocketbook, **Janette Peters**, 18, of Stamping Ground, succeeded in doing a better job than any other girl in the state in the home improvement program. Her reward was provided by Sears-Roebuck Foundation. Janette decided to start with her bedroom by painting the woodwork, sanding and refinishing the floor, papering the walls and ceiling. Later, she made her curtains, cut off the bed to make a Hollywood bed, quilted a bedspread, finished a dressing table, padded a stool, painted a blanket chest and a chest of drawers, and an old rocking chair. The work on her room helped her win the State Room Improvement Judging Contest last year. She also had a blue ribbon exhibit of her Room Improvement at both state and county fairs. During seven years in 4-H, Janette has completed 32 projects and has made 64 state and 33 interstate exhibits. She has won 100 awards. All of these activities are conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA co-operating.

**Chester Prim**, 16, of Lexington, has been in club work for five years and has won 100 awards. He has been a member of the family farm buildings. His demonstrations on the electric milker have won county and district championships. His club work includes four years as junior leader. West-burn Educational Foundation gave Chester a trip to the Club Congress.

**William Weaver**, 15, of Bronston, found that plenty of hard work and diligent study helped him to reach the top in the 4-H Tractor Maintenance program. Acquiring the know-how to care for and operate a tractor, he has saved considerable savings in time and money. Bill has been a club member for five years. Knowing the proper time to lubricate and gaining more knowledge about spark plugs, wiring and the battery of his tractor, have saved time and money. Bill was one of 15 boys entered in the tractor driving contest at the local electric farm show, and won third place. Standard Oil (Ind.) furnished funds for Williams' trip.

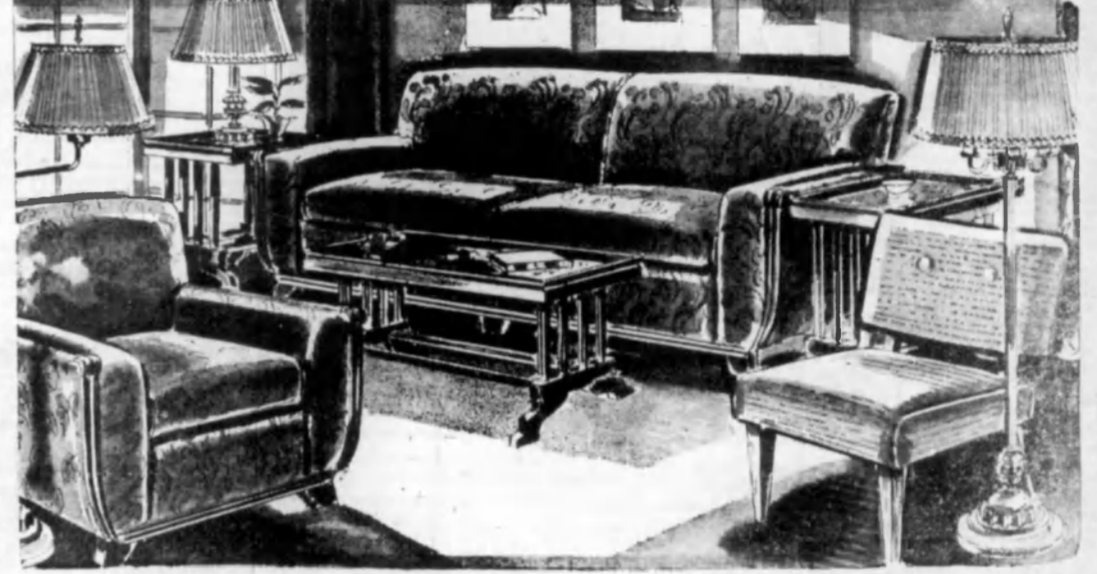

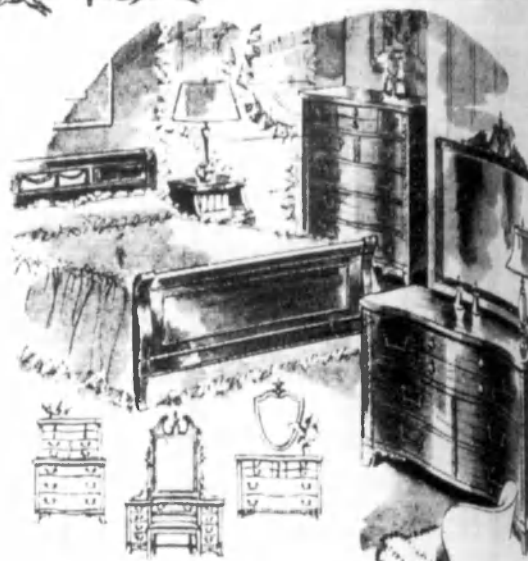

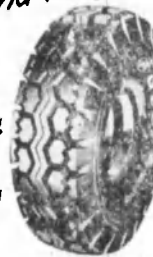

When breathed into the lungs, carbon monoxide combines 210 times more easily than oxygen with the hemoglobin in the blood, depriving it of the ability to carry oxygen to the body. The amount of carbon monoxide in the air, the respiratory rate of the exposed individual and the length of exposure determine the severity of the symptoms. Although the danger of war-

ing up a car motor in a closed garage has frequently been pointed out, deaths still result from this practice. It is also unwise to drive without ventilation in the car, particularly if the car heater is turned on. The fresh air intake on the car should be closed in congested traffic otherwise, exhaust fumes from the car ahead may be drawn in.

Sleepiness while driving may indicate the presence of carbon monoxide, or symptoms such as headache, dizziness or nausea may occur. If such symptoms develop, the car should be stopped and the person or persons in the car should get out and sit or lie down in the open air.

Other causes of avoidable deaths from carbon monoxide include improperly installed gas water heaters, furnaces banked with the drafts closed and bathroom heaters which have not been properly vented.



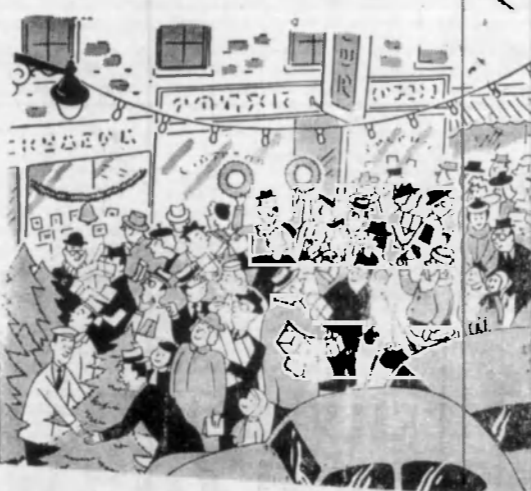
