New Plant To be Built At Calvert

Another new chemical plant will be erected at Calvert City. The new plant will be constructed by American Aniline and Extract Co. Size and cost of the plant were not announced, but the company stated that the plant would be erected late this year.

American Aniline leased a site adjacent to the new Air Reduction plant at Calvert City and will pipe vinyl acetate monomer from Air Reduction.

American Aniline's factory will be a polyvinyl plant.

Another aniline firm, General Aniline and Film Corp., also is constructing a chemical plant at Calvert. This plant will cost \$8,000,000.

Other major corporations with plants at Calvert City are B. F. Goodrich Chemical Co., Air Reduction, Pennsylvania Salt Mfg. Co., and Pittsburgh Metallurgical Co. Total investments of these firms at Calvert City is approximately \$80,000,000.

Easy Ways To Chase Stains

Water alone remove many common stains from washable fabric while fresh. Some stains need a two-part treatment. Detailed directions follow:

Chocolate or Cocoa: Wash in warm soapuds. If brown stains remain, treat with hydrogen peroxide and launder promptly.

Ced-Liver Oil: Sponge with glycerine or carbon tetrachloride, then launder.

Grease: Four boiling water, then brush with a stiff brush. If not bright, stretch taut over a flat surface, then wash in warm water.

Meat Juices: Soak in cool water, then wash in hot soapuds.

Milk or Cream: Soak in cool water, then wash in hot soapuds.

Paint: If fresh, use lots of hot soapuds. If not, apply turpentine, kerosene, or lard and then wash in hot suds.

Scorch: If light, launder in hot suds; if deep, rub with soap and bleach in sunshine or dampen with peroxide; then launder.

Tomato Juice and Catsup: Dampen with water and rub with glycerine; then launder.

Physical Education for Students is Important

(Editor's Note: This is the eighth in a series of articles by the Department of Classroom Teachers of Kentucky Education Association.)

The teaching of physical education in public schools aims to build the child's body, to teach children to cooperate with others in a sportsmanlike attitude, to teach them skills they can use as long as they live, to teach healthful living.

In good schools physical education begins in the first year and continues through all school years. The well-rounded program is held in a clean, well-ventilated gymnasium, equipped with a shower, dressing rooms, adjoining play area, and is carried out by a qualified teacher.

The Health and Physical Education Code of Kentucky states that every child should have one period of physical education in the daily school program and one semester of health in either ninth or tenth grade. In Kentucky public schools this program is begun in either the seventh or ninth grade.

In the elementary school children act out with various movements a theme, such as going to a fire; they do stunts and tumbling, simple folk dances, catching and fleeing games. In junior high school teaching includes more highly organized games, such as track and field events, stunts, pyramid building, square dancing.

High schools begin highly competitive games like basketball, soccer, softball, football, and dual competitive games like tennis and badminton. This is called the intramural program which provides competitive and recreational sports in which the whole student body may participate and which also provides the backbone of varsity athletics.

The tensions of living today frequently lead to restlessness in children which terminates often in juvenile delinquency. One out of twelve persons today is suffering from some form of mental illness. Part of the treatment juvenile delinquents as well as mental patients receive is recreational activities to release tension and get their minds off themselves.

Weekly Meditation

"Comfort ye, comfort ye my people, saith your God." Isaiah 40:1.

So the prophet began his great sermon during the exile. The people were in sore straits. Jerusalem had fallen. Thousands had been taken captive. In a strange land they found it hard to worship. Many hung their harps on the willow trees, sat down, and wept. If any people needed comfort it was those exiled Jews.

But what sort of comfort did God intend these people to have? What is meant by comfort anyway? We usually consider comfort to be freedom from want or care. Folk often say, "Give me comfort." "Oh, if I could only get comfort." This is not exactly what the Lord means when He says He will bring comfort to His people. It is not an attitude of resignation, free from all work or care, which God gives us. Comfort comes from two Latin words meaning to be brave. That is what God means in this text: Make my people brave. Give Courage to my people. God would have His people strong, brave and courageous.

There are three chief ways in which we may face life. We may run away from it and live in a dream world. We may make excuse, and live in a world of sentimentality. Or we may face life courageously and be brave with the power of God's Spirit. Upon our own choice will depend the method we pursue.

Just before His earthly departure Jesus promised another Comforter. The Spirit of Truth which leads men into all truth. Peace, happiness, joy, and comfort which brings security to the hearts of God's people come from a soul dedicated to the Spirit of Truth. The soul so filled with this Spirit faces life bravely and courageously. No fear is there. Instead there is serenity of soul. What'er betide that soul will go along the way with Christ.

What is there to fear? Pray therefore, "God give me comfort. God give me strength and courage. Let me face life with Thy Spirit. Let me do Thy will." "Comfort ye, my people saith your God." Make my people strong. Make my people brave. Make my people courageous. This life is not our end. Come what may, let storms and troubles assail. God reigns evermore. Ours is an heavenly city. Ours is an eternal life. Be strong in the Spirit of the Lord.
