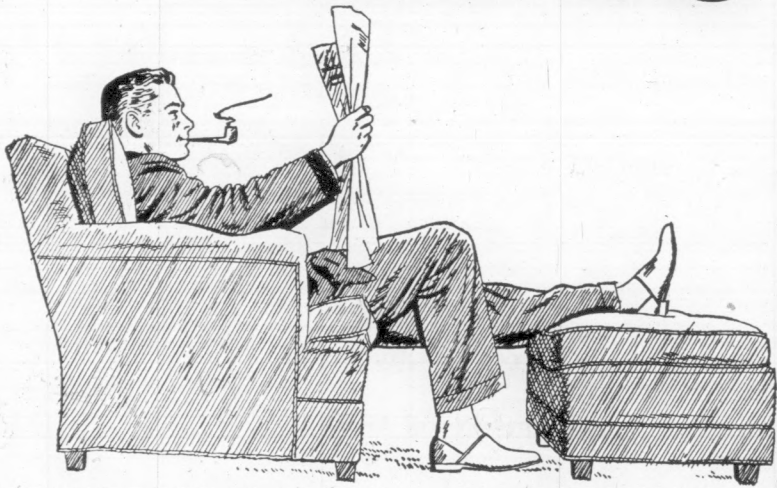
### Murray Leaf Sales Largest; Mayfield Has Best Average

Murray dark-fired tobacco markets had the largest volume Friday and Mayfield markets chalked up the best average as sales ended for the week.  
At Murray, floors reported sales of 227,804 pounds for \$75,546, an average of \$33.16.  
At Mayfield where only 78,238 pounds were sold, growers grossed \$28,173, or an average of \$36.01 a hundredweight.  
Totals for both markets were 306,042 pounds, \$103,720 and an average of \$33.89.  
At Hopkinsville, in the Eastern fire-cured district, Friday sales amounted to 359,078 and \$136,054, or a sales average of \$37.89.

## County Soil Notes

ly unless they have small fish such as bluegills to feed on. Many farmers want their ponds stocked with catfish, crappie, and other kinds of fish. Experiments have been run and have proven that the bass-blue gill combination produces the best fishing and most pounds of fish per acre. Other species were seldom successful.

Many farmers have been asking when and how much they should fish their ponds. It is almost impossible to fish your pond too much. A lot of fishing is one of the most important practices in fish pond management.

In the second year after stocking, your pond will contain its limit of fish, measured in pounds. Production will equal the amount of fish you take out each year.

Take out 50 pounds of fish and 50 pounds of fish will grow back. Take out one pound of fish and 1 pound will grow back.

Heavy fishing will bring about large production. Light fishing will create small production.

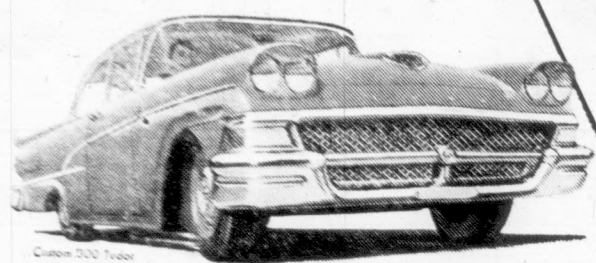

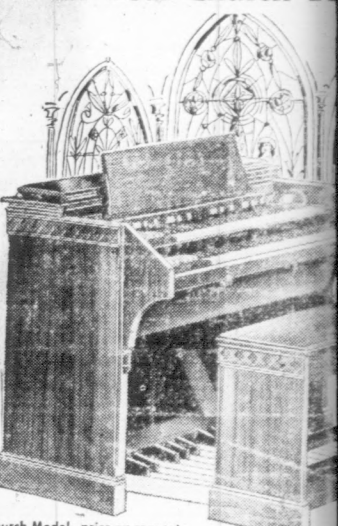

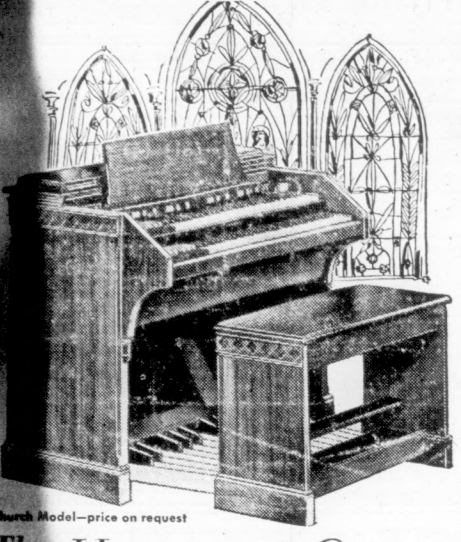

## Farm Bureau Outlines Its Legislative Goals

Kentucky Farm Bureau President Burl St. Clair Saturday outlined a five-point program his organization will present in the 1958 Legislature. He spoke at the annual meeting of the Kentucky County Farm Bureau at Madisonville.

St. Clair listed the goals as they are considered by the organization:

1. Brucellosis control funds to do a good cleaning up of this disease in cattle herds.
2. Daylight saving time change to be made in some towns and cities.
3. Tobacco — Lowering the "high tax" on tobacco in the state and repeal of the 1950-called fair-trade law.

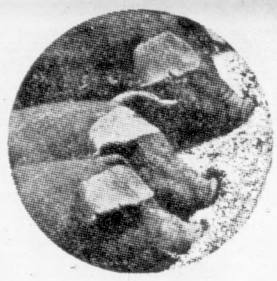

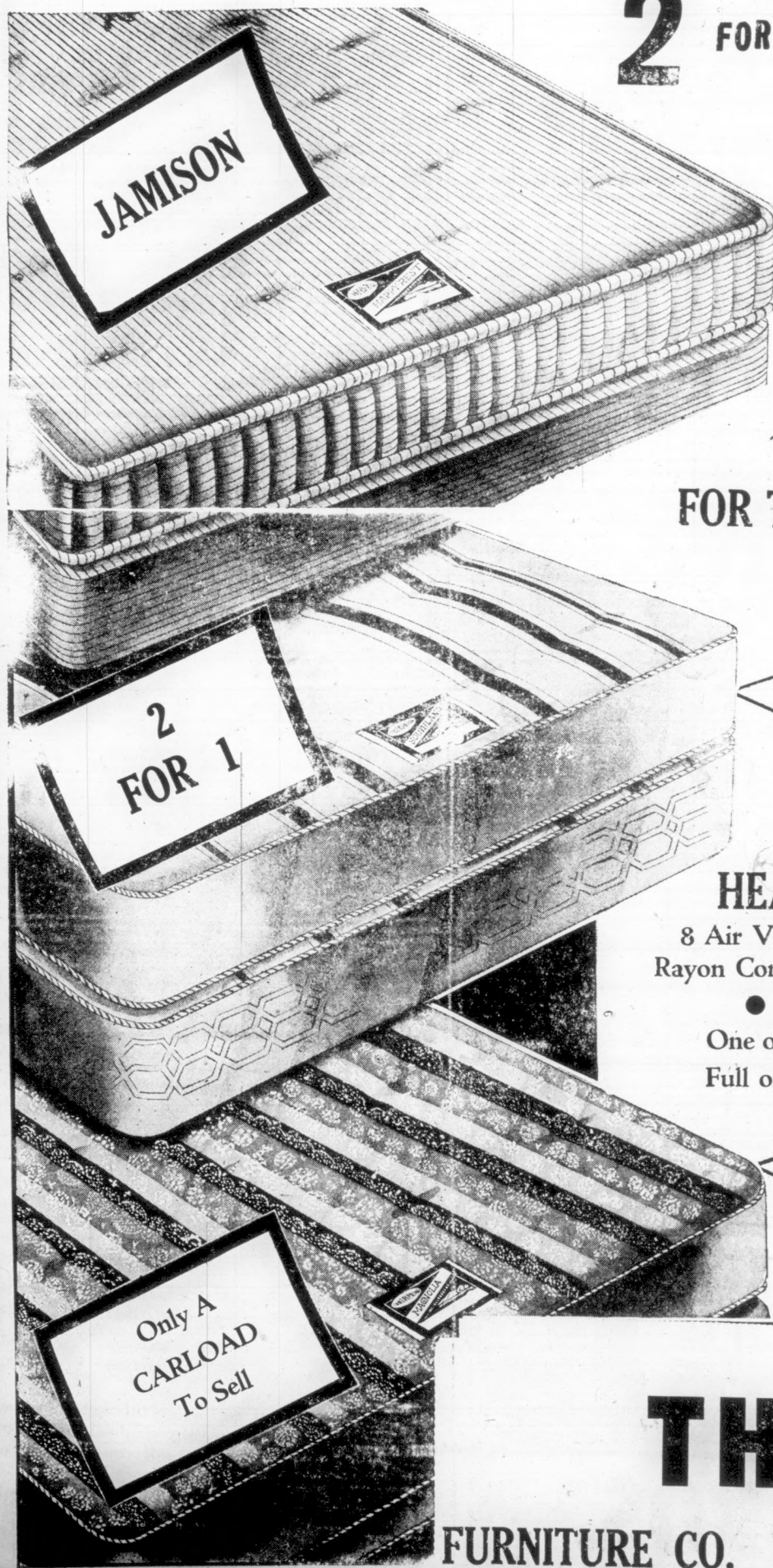

## 20 YEARS AGO

From The Courier  
Files of 1938-39

This column was discontinued a few months back for two reasons:

The first, and principal reason, was that no more copies of 1937 Couriers were available in the permanent files.

The second reason was that the fall and Christmas business rush was on and there was little time for research.

We have found a few old 1938 copies of the Courier, but these are dated in November and December of 1938. When we exhausted these few 1938 copies, we will have to use 1939 Couriers for this column.

We suspect, however, that no matter the date, the news of 19 or 20 years ago will bring happy and sad memories to many a Marshall Countian.

So, we will devote the next few weeks to news of November and December 1938. Here goes:

Benton, in November 1938 was raising funds for a new fire truck. G. A. Thompson, now deceased, was chairman of the drive. He reported contributions totaling \$1,499 thus far. Circuit Judge Joe Price, also deceased, had mailed a donation from Paducah.

A new federal judge was about to be named for the Western Kentucky district. Senator M. M. Logan of Bowling Green had announced his personal choice as Lawrence B. Finn of Bowling Green. Others in the running were James W. Stites of Louisville, Lorenzo K. Wood of Hopkinsville, Schacelford Miller of Louisville, Marion Blackwell of Dixon, Wilbur Miller of Owensboro, Ralph Gilbert of Shelby-

ville and Joe Price of Paducah.

Rev. Ray Pafford had been returned to Benton as pastor of the Methodist Church. The conference had been held at Martin, Tenn. Rev. O. W. Boatwright had been transferred from Birmingham to Dyersburg. His successor at Birmingham was Rev. J. E. Parr, District superintendent at Paducah was F. B. Jones.

Among those from here who had attended the conference were Messrs. and Mesdames Cliff Treas, Rollie Creason, Burnett Holland, Clint Smith, Ivory Adair, Gip Watkins, S. E. Roberts, Van Roberts and Mr. Sam Creason.

The Benton Theatre was showing "The Arkansas Traveler." Burns and Irvin S. Cobb. And the theatre was happy that the film was being shown in Benton the same week as it was being shown at the Brown Theatre in Louisville.

The first snow of the season had fallen in Benton. The ground was covered, but the Courier failed to say how deep the snow was.

Joe F. Boatwright had observed his 80th birthday. He was the father of Rev. O. H. Boatwright. The birthday party was held in Paducah at the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Alexander.

And then there was a bright little story on the front page headed "Warning to Hunters." It said this: "A warning is issued to all hunters. Don't shoot until you

see it move. It might be a WPA worker."

Such was life in 1938 in Benton. See you next week with some more of the 1938 doings.

## Bids Due Jan. 31 on New Student Union Building at Murray

Contract bids for construction of the Murray State College Student Union building will be opened in Frankfort at 2 p.m. Jan. 31.

A loan of \$670,000 was recently received from the Community Facilities Administration of the Housing and Home Finance Agency to assist in financing construction of the building.

The state has pledged \$146,000 for project development, and \$104,000 for furniture and other related costs. These funds are assigned from the Capital Construction Fund of the Commonwealth of Kentucky to supplement the \$670,000 federal loan.

Lee Potter Smith, Paducah architect, who did the plans for Woods Hall and the gymnasium, designed the structure which will be built on the vacant lot between Ordway Hall and the Carr Health Building.

A cafeteria, snack bar, book store, postoffice, ball room, recreation and meeting facilities will be provided in the two story U-shaped building.

## Organized Church

for January 26, 1958

Does it kill religion to organize? Not at all. It doesn't. It makes water available to the most good. If the pipes and pumps are all right, the water will do the most good.

Does marriage kill love? No, of course. It makes a good school for education and marriages. It is a blessing to a well-organized church is a help to faith, a hindrance.

The eighty-fold church community in the study of these international lessons are not organized in the same way. But the fact that our organizations differ does not keep us from uniting in the study of the same Word of God. It would be interesting to try the many ways in which churches are organized, but right now we are sticking to one thing: organization of the Christian church in its earliest days.

What came first? Three things can be said of organization in the early church. First, it is that it grew out of needs, not the other way around. In the beginning we are so used to everything being organized down to the sub-section, that we are inclined to think a church isn't organized unless it has some definite organization. But in the book of Acts we hear about the church before we hear of the deacons, that is, before the people who were appointed by the apostles to deal with the tricky problem of caring for the needy in the church,—those who were elected because they were needed. The church did not organize itself because some organization chart called for such officers.

Paul did not want Timothy to ask about a prospective officer, but kind of executive did he want? Rather, how well has he managed his marriage, his family? Is it a more vital question.

Church came first. To apostle known to us ever set a pattern organization, a cadre they say in the army, and left to collect a church around it. It's a great figure of speech in the Bible and the members. A body is not come into existence by recruitment of some loose arms, it grows insides to get together. A body develops these various parts as it grows. The body is important than any of its members. So with the church, as was going in the New Testament. The church produced the officers, not the officers the church.

A church does not exist, for example, to give preachers jobs. Preachers exist to serve and build the church. Further, if the church always first, and every one else this, then no man or woman can think "I am indispensable. I die or move away I can't be replaced." Every one in the church has something to do, and he or she can do better than any one else, and an officer or not. Every one should try to make himself indispensable, yes; but he must remember that the one and only indispensable person in any church is God.

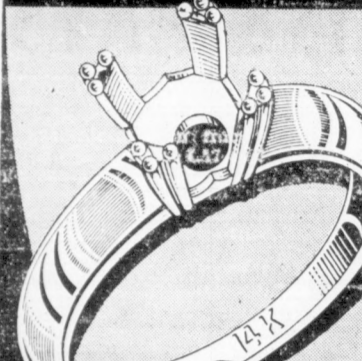

Massachusetts.

Result: A stamp with a background showing an engine-turned lathework used on banknotes of the day and a portrait of the British queen on her first visit to London in 1837. The idea and stamps were put into use May 6, 1840.

FIRST UNITED STATES system of "posts" was legalized in Massachusetts in 1839. The ordinance directed that all mail brought from overseas was to be left at the home of Richard Fairbanks in Boston, who would have it sent to its destination. Fairbanks was allowed one penny per letter.

A post was established between New York and Boston in 1872. This was the famous Boston post road—U. S. Highway 1. A post from Maine to Georgia was established in 1883.

In 1892, Thomas Neale was granted authority to establish postoffices in North America. In 1753, Benjamin Franklin was made postmaster general and served until 1774, when he was fired by England because of his sympathy for the Colonies. He made vast improvements in the postal system. The Continental Congress, in 1775, made him head of our postal system at a salary of \$1,000 a year and he served until Nov. 7, 1776.

WHEN GOLD was discovered in California in 1848, the mail service moved westward with the population. The Pony Express, a private enterprise, was started between St. Joseph, Mo., and Sacramento, Calif., on April 3, 1860, to provide faster service. First mail took 10 1/2 days and 75 ponies. Fastest time was 7 days and 17 hours to deliver Lincoln's inaugural address in 1861. The company charged \$5 per half ounce of mail at first but later reduced it to only \$1.
