Tuberculosis X-Ray Trailer Here June 21

The X-ray trailer donated for use in Marshall and surrounding counties by the Protective Order of Elks will be in Benton from June 21 to June 22, and everyone 20 years and over is urged by the County Health Department to visit the trailer for lung examinations.

Those who have had contact with TB cases and have positive tests are especially urged to have x-rays made.

According to Dr. Norman Partridge, county health officer, a positive skin test does not mean that the individual has tuberculosis. It does indicate, however, that someone in his family or close acquaintance may have active tuberculosis to which he has been exposed.

No person under 20 years of age is to come for an x-ray unless he has had a positive skin test, Dr. Partridge said. Exceptions will be made only at a physician's request. Also no women in the first three months of pregnancy can be x-rayed at the mobile unit. Other pregnant women may come if they have had a positive skin test reading.

Tuberculosis skin tests will be made at the Marshall County Health Center from 1 to 4:30 p.m. on each Wednesday during the rest of April, all of May and until June 15.

The water has been used for the bank's air-conditioning system. But that was changed, and the well no longer was useful.

The bank is doing extensive remodeling work, and in this atomic age there seems to be no use for an old water well or cistern.

It hasn't been too many years ago, however, when every Benton home and many business houses had their own water wells. After the city put in its water system, the old wells gradually have been filled with rock and soil until few remain in use as water sources.

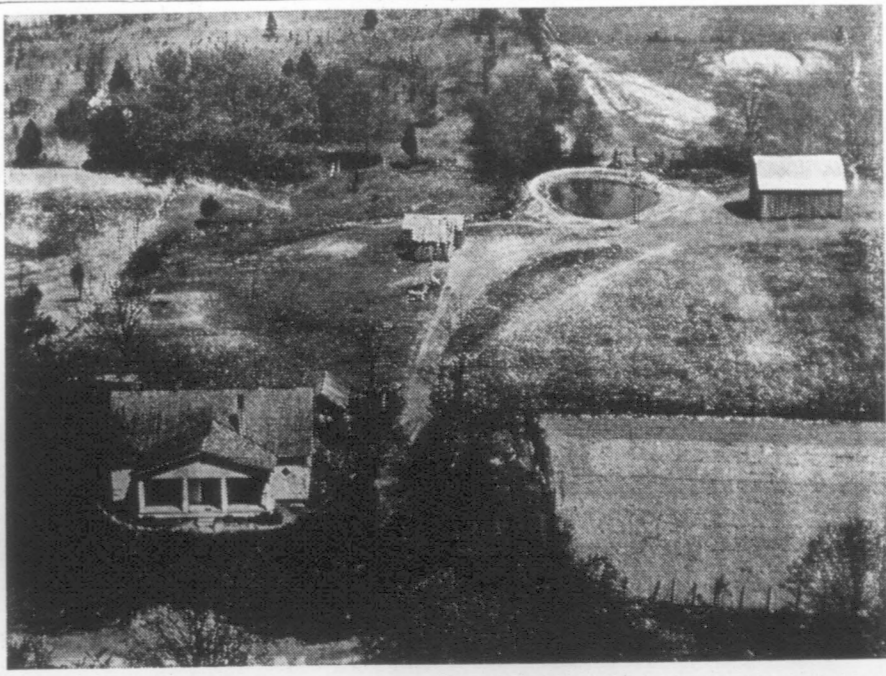

The "clean up" interviewers will make personal visits to the households from which report forms have not been received and obtain the answers to the Census questions. They will also seek, by telephone and personal visits, the answers to questions left blank or incorrectly answered in the report forms already sent to the census office.

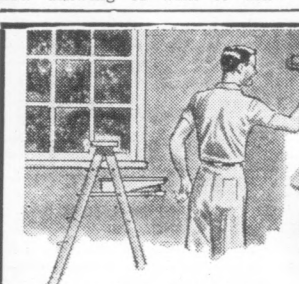
Mrs. Stegman Is Hostess To Calvert Arts, Crafts Club
