House Votes Reapportion Memberships

Refuses Michigan One Of Arkansas Seats

Washington, —The House voted 210 to 143 Tuesday to reapportion its membership under the 1940 census by the "equal proportions" method, thereby refusing to give one of Arkansas seven seats to Michigan.

Under either method, California will gain three seats in the next Congress, and Oregon, Arizona, New Mexico, Florida, Tennessee and North Carolina will gain one each.

Drive On Spies In England Is Started To Halt Ship Sinking

London, —Alarmed over ship losses described as apparently due to information leaks, Britain is launching a new campaign to ferret out spies and still tongues which drop tips to Axis agents.

He declined to estimate the proportion of the weekly average of 52,000 tons merchant shipping losses believed due to tips by Axis agents. "When a newly-arrived ship is bombed in harbor or when merchant ships with a weak convoy or none at all are caught out it may be due to aerial reconnaissance, to an agent's tip or to luck, or all three," he said, "we want to eliminate agents' tips."

Clinton Tops Bulldogs Again Last Night, 36-21

After holding Coach Jim Phillips' conference leading Central five in check during the first half, the Bulldogs loosened and went down in defeat, 36-21, at Clinton last night, this being their second defeat this season at the hands of the Clinton outfit.

The Bulldogs grabbed an early lead and held their opponents at bay, 9-4 as the first quarter ended. The Clinton lads came back strong in the second quarter to tie the score and a free shot put them out in front at the half, 14-13. Binford, outstanding player of this section, was the high scoring star, putting 7 field goals through the loops plus 3 free tosses, making a total of 17 points. McAllister was high point man for Fulton with 7 points.

Last night's game was the 12th straight victory for the Central team in the Jackson Purchase conference. Coach Phillips' quintet is highly favored to take off the first district tournament honors.

Tonight the Bulldogs square off with their Tennessee rivals for the second game of the three games series to decide the championship of Fulton. The Red Devils of South Fulton, newly crowned Obion county champs, are the favorites in the contest. The preliminary game between the Pups and the South Fulton reserves will begin at 7:15 at Science Hall.

English City Is Gassed In Mock Attack To Warn Coming Dangers

Brighton, England. —The first of a series of practice gas attacks to be staged throughout Britain was held here Monday and maskless persons tearfully regretted their unpreparedness. A mild tear gas was used.

Shoppers scurried to safety or calmly donned their respirators— if they had them—as the gas swirled from cylinders planted in downtown streets and quickly enveloped a three-quarter-mile-square area. The "attack" lasted half an hour.

It was as close to the real thing as civil defense authorities could contrive. Brighton, a seaside resort of 147,000, lies 50 miles due south of London, facing the "invasion coasts" of German-occupied France.

Policemen, bus drivers, waitresses, clerks and others who had to remain at their posts went about in their big-snouted masks until the

all clear sounded. For two days loud speakers and posters had given advance warning of the "exercise," but there had been no indication that gas actually would be used.

The Mayor said the test was a "great success." An air raid precautions official reported that tear gas had been used "to impress the public that they need to carry gas masks. If they do get the real thing, they won't have advance warning."

Free masks have long been available and anyone who doesn't have one now or has lost or disposed of his. Forgetful travelers still leave thousands of masks in trains and busses each week.

Prime Minister Churchill's recent warnings that the Germans may use gas (the Germans say they won't if the British don't) have renewed interest in the subject.

Rotary Club In Annual Dinner Here Last Night

Enjoyable Program Is Given, With Dr. Richmond As Speaker

The Fulton Rotary Club gave its annual dinner meeting at the First Methodist Church last night with 65 persons present. A very enjoyable program was given, with music, stunts, contests, along with speaking, cleverly welded together into a pleasing fabric of entertainment. The church itself was beautifully decorated, this work being done by the gifted Mr. Morgan of Greenville, Ky. A. F. L. Head Calls Arnold Anti-Labor

Miami, Fla., —The American Federation of Labor's president, William Green, Tuesday accused Thurmon Arnold, leader of the Government's trust-busting campaign, of an antagonistic attitude, toward labor and denied Arnold's charge that union practices boost U. S. food and housing costs.

Arnold, an assistant attorney general, had testified before a Congressional committee that labor's insistence on maintaining obsolete methods, among other things, resulted in higher prices. His testimony was sent to Green by the committee with a request that he reply by February 20.

"Amazed At Testimony." "We gain the impression that Mr. Arnold has shown an antagonistic attitude toward labor," Green said. "It doesn't seem to be shown by others, some others, in the Justice Department."

Office Holders Needn't Resign To Run Again

Frankfort, Ky., —Office holders can run for re-election legally or for another post without resigning, Assistant Attorney General Guy H. Herdman said Monday.

With elections of county officials coming on this year, he gave that opinion to Guy Holbrook of Fleming.

An exception, Herdman added, is that a school board member "cannot become a candidate for an office which is incompatible with his office without resigning."

Herdman also gave it as his opinion that a candidate for county tax commissioner who has passed a previous examination may run this year without taking it again. The opinion, backed by a Court of Appeal decision, was given to Roy Colvin, Paintsville, and County Attorney R. L. Sisson, Eddyville.

Man Who Shared Profits With His Workers Dies In Cleveland Home

Cleveland, —Death came Monday to Nathan G. Richman, guiding force in a far-flung, factory-to-business consumer men's clothing business, but his plan for sharing profits with employees lives after him.

The chairman of the board of Richman Brothers Company—last of three brothers who built their chain from their father's tailor shop—died of a heart attack at 72. To some 3,700 employees in the company's Cleveland factory and sixty-two retail stores from Boston to Kansas City, Nathan Richman was humanitarian as well as employer. They regarded him as the "spirit and brains" of a company which lent them money to pay for a new baby or buy a house.

One of the first to introduce profit-sharing into the clothing business, the Richman company established an example in employer-employee relations that has been studied widely.

Britain, Mexico May Soon Try To Repair Break

Talks Held Likely If U. S. Completes Pending Agreement

Washington, —Great Britain and Mexico may soon open negotiations, informed sources said today, to repair a break in diplomatic relations which resulted three years ago from the Mexican expropriation of American, British and Netherlands oil properties.

An impending agreement on major difficulties existing between the United States and Mexico was said to have led to informal conversations looking to a settlement of the British-Mexican dispute.

U. S., Mexico Negotiate Forman talks were understood to be waiting on the outcome of the present United States-Mexican negotiations, with particular reference to settlement of the oil question. These were said to have created a favorable atmosphere for an effort to heal the breach between Britain and Mexico.

The United States-Mexican conversations are aimed at an all-inclusive settlement of all major problems pending between the two countries, including the oil expropriation dispute.

Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles said today that both the United States and Mexican governments were approaching the general problem in a friendly and cooperative way and indicated an agreement may be reached within a few weeks.

In what manner the oil question may be solved has not been disclosed. There have been indications, however, that the present Mexican government might offer more favorable terms of compensation than those proposed by the Cardenas administration, or an arrangement under which the private companies from whom the properties were taken would operate them and share the profits with the government.

Passports To Visit Naval Base Areas Take More Time

Washington, —The State Department gave notice Tuesday that at least ten days would be required in the future for Americans to obtain passports to visit seven of the British possessions where United States naval and air bases are being established.

No reason was given but it indicated that a closer investigation would be made of persons desiring to visit areas near the defense bases.

Senator Asks Crop Clause In British Bill

Washington, —Senator Russell (D., Ga.), said Tuesday he would offer an amendment to the Lease-Lend Bill to make it applicable to agricultural products as well as implements of war.

Although he pointed out the measure in its present form might be broad enough to include food and clothing materials, he contended it would be wise to make the authority specific. The Georgian said he also wanted to be sure that tobacco would be included.

Senate Lee (D., Oklahoma) has proposed an amendment to extend the lease-lend authority to those agricultural stocks held by the Government by reason of default of crop loans. Russell declared that if, as Vice President Wallace and Senator Barkley (D., Ky.), argue, the present bill covers agricultural commodities, Lee's amendment would constitute a limitation on the authority.

NOT FOOLING.

When Congress, on the recommendation of high naval authorities, enacted the bill last autumn which will eventually give America a two-ocean navy and a fleet twice as powerful as any the world has ever seen before.

But subsequently the Navy and its congressional friends have recommended and introduced other bills, providing other billions of dollars for developing vital new bases, for new shipyards, thousands of new planes, housing for the thousands of additional personnel the new ships will require, and to provide deck armor and other needed protection against the threat of air attack.

By the time the two-ocean Navy is completed, it and its sea and shore auxiliaries will be a much greater organization than the original double-fleet legislation provided.

The Army command is giving proof it isn't fooling either, in its plans to deal effectively with any attacker should the nation's first defense line fail.

Both the Army and the Navy have asked for all the additional planes that can be provided, in view of present plane production capacity.

The military services are planning, in effect, to provide the country with the most powerful Navy, one of the largest and certainly the best equipped armies, and the mightiest air force in the world.

The cost is and will be terrific. But the cost of defense will be measured in work and taxes. The cost of failing to provide such defense could easily be so much greater, not only in our plundered treasure and lost territory but in the loss of national independence.

College quartet, four charming girls, who gave two appreciated numbers.

J. O. Lewis then introduced the speaker of the evening, Dr. J. H. Richmond, Murray College president, paying a well deserved tribute to the school and to Mr. Richmond as being powers in the educational system of the Commonwealth.

Dr. Richmond, speaking in serious vein, spoke of the problems that now face this nation in coming days and years. He reviewed briefly some of the highlights of Washington's career, and said solemnly that the nation now faced as dark problems as Washington knew at Valley Forge.

"I grow a little tired," Dr. Richmond said, "of the attitude of apology which I see now and then of our part in the last war. I am proud of what we did then. I believe that we may have to do the same thing again. If it becomes necessary I believe that we will send troops to Europe. Of course, none of us ever raises a boy to be a soldier, but we do raise him to be an American citizen. In being an American citizen it is sometimes necessary for him to be a soldier. The rights and liberties for which

our fathers fought are still worth defending, still worth fighting and dying for."

It is from within that our danger will come, the Murray educator said bluntly. "This nation will never be destroyed by outside foes," he said. "We can prevent that from happening, but I fear many times that we have forces within us, the various isms which are found in the East and the great industrial sections, may some day overthrow this American Republic. We should be on guard against this danger, for eternal vigilance is always the price of liberty."

Dr. Richmond has spoken here many times, but he was never more thoughtful, never more convincing than in his brief address last evening.

Paul Hornbeak led the singing of "God Bless America" as the closing number of the program.

RECOVERY OF BONDS SOLUTION OF HOLDUP REPORTED BY BURNS

Frankfort, Ky. — Recovery of \$4,000 worth of United States government bonds and solution of an \$11,000 holdup at Knoxville, Tenn., was announced tonight by Major Leland Barnes, assistant state high-

way patrol director, with the arrest of three men sought by officers of five southern states.

Barnes identified the three, all held in jail at London, Ky., on store robbery charges, as Edwin Sharp, 27; Vernon Kimbrough, 22, and Bill Sanders, 22, all of Knoxville.

He said the bonds, identified as part of the loot taken in a safe robbery at McRee, Ga., were found in a room at Lexington which Sharp had occupied.

The highway patrol official said Sharp admitted also he was one of two men who held up the Southern Amusement Company of Knoxville Dec. 6 and escaped with \$11,000. Kimbrough admitted he was wanted by Asheville, N. C., police on forgery charges, Barnes said.
