THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

The Fulton Chamber of Commerce is the oldest civic organization in Fulton, and it gives evidence at present of taking a new lease on life and really settling down to work. Selection of Bob White as president marks a step in the right direction, for Mr. White is a man who can and will really do things. When he was first asked to accept the post he objected, saying that he would be very busy on the building project for the proposed new school building. After being reasoned with, and told the old truth that only the busy men really do things, he finally agreed to take the position if his board of directors would agree to really work with him. It is a good board that he has, made up of men who are accustomed to doing whatever jobs come up, and so, on this note of cooperation, Mr. White agreed to take the job.

Work of the Chamber of Commerce in recent years has been largely of the consolidating type, and no spectacular things have been done. Work of the organization in bettering town and country relations is its most important work, and this has been carried on steadily, and with glowing success. Never before was the poultry inclustry in better shape, and never before has dairying been of more interest in this particular territory. With Basil Ross working on poultry and Paul DeMyer working on dairying, and **both** of them working together at all times, more has been accomplished than people realize. Those who keep up with this work know how much has really been done, but every business man in Fulton benefits by this tremendous expansion of poultry and dairying.

is to continue as America's first line of defense in a military sense, and the Navy people aren't fooling about it.

The Army command is giving proof it isn't fooling either, in its plans to deal effectively with any attacker should the nation's first defense line fail. Associated Press revealed on Saturday that sites for additional camps and cantonments are being quietly surveyed all over the country, so that the army of 1.420,000 contemplated by next June could be quickly doubled in size if such a step were deemed warranted.

Both the Army and the Navy have asked for all the additional planes that can be provided, in view of present plane production capacity,- by the entire airciaft industry during the next several years.

The military services are planning. in effect, to provide the country with the mest powerful Navy, one of the largest and certainly the best equipped armies, and the mightiest air force in the world. While debate rages over lease-lend plans and foreign policy, there is surprisingly little argument over these plans. The public, including even most isolationists, are in hearty agreement over the necessity for America's attaining such strength.

The cost is and will be terrific. But the cost of defense will be measured in work and taxes. The cost of failing to provide such defense could easily be so much greater, not only in our plundered treasure and lost territory but in the loss of national independence -an independence of which Americans have made better use than any other people in history .-- Sun-Democrat.




