### Homecoming weekend finally arrives -3,000 alumni and friends expected

### Tiger team promises two exciting nights of roundball

The Olivet Nazarene College ONC Tigers Athletic Department, the Home- 10 coming Commission, and the var- 20 sity basketball team has done 44 much to assure Tiger spectators- 40 students, visitors, and alumni alike--an impressive two nights of roundball.

Trying to spoil the weekend for Tiger constituents will be the Eagles from Oklahoma Christian College, Oklahoma City. Under Coach Bill Villines the 1972-73 Eagle squad compiled a 13-15 record. OCC has one victory under their belt already this season. They squeaked past the School of the Ozarks last week, 75-71, for their own Homecoming victory.

Last year in the BNC invitational tournament, our Tigers nipped the OCC Eagles in the championship game. ONC finished its season with a 22-8 overall record.

A public relations brochure published by the OCC Athletic Department included this statement concerning their estimation of ONC as a basketball foe, "With dedication, spirit, and hard work they should be a worthy opponent."

Coach C.W. (Butch) Ward is optimistic but he is shying away from an idealistic point of view. Ward realizes his team's potential and is looking for a successful season, despite the tough schedule. At the present the Tiger mentor is concentrating on these two games and then looking on toward the rest of the season. He chooses to make no predictions; rather he will let his roundballers' performance speak for itself.

### Advisor editorializes on tragedy

Tragedy befalls a nation when its leaders fail as persons of integrity, of responsibility, and of deep spiritual faith in God.

King Solomon seemed to have everything going for him. God had passed on to him the covenant made with his father King David. Solomon's government was the only strong center of power in the Near East at that time. It was a time of peace, and he soon gained fame for his wisdom and wealth. But he failed to hold true to God spiritually and neglected to order his affairs on a sound moral basis. His failure was a personal tragedy, but it was also a national calamity for Israel was soon to lose an international position which it was never able to regain.

If Solomon had continued to the end of his reign as he began, he doubtlessly would have gone down in history as one of the greatest men. But, in spite of his wisdom, he was not all-wise. Solomon was not wise enough to consider seriously God's evaluation of his actions, and as a result he suffered the penalty of knowing that his powerful empire must fall apart.

An hour of crisis has come to our nation. Some of our national leaders have failed. 'Tis true their reasons for failure may not be the same as Solomon's, but, nonetheless, they have failed, and the nation is suffering in much the same way as did ancient Israel.

As a result of human failure, there is a rumbling in this great land of ours. The people of the nation are disillusioned, angry, and fearful. Day by day, week by week, the consequences of the failures of these men have been spread before the American public through the newspapers, radio, and television. We have read and listened to the angry, unkind, and hasty words of people from every walk of life.

It is not for any of us to sit in judgement on any of these people. But it is well for us to remember in our duties as citizens that first of all we must be Christians. Christians in attitude even if we feel that individuals are guilty. This does not mean that we condone wrong doing, but rather we should remember as Christians we should pray for a man if he be overtaken in a fault. We should not be a part of the screaming mob. There is no place for lynch-mob Christians regardless of the failure on the part of any man. We should speak out against the evils of the government, but Christians should be able to govern the unruly tongue while doing so.

Whether the leader of our nation has been betrayed by his associates or if, indeed, he is responsible for this sordid affair the appalling consequences are the same: Failure of such magnitude is a personal tragedy, the destinies of untold numbers of people have been affected, the moral fiber of this country has been weakened, and the international position 8:00 p.m. of this country may never be regained.

The Persian poet, Nizami, said: In the hour of adversity be not without hope For crystal rain falls from black clouds.

Solomon once prayed, "God give thy servant an understanding heart to judge thy people that I may discern be-tween good and evil." Perhaps in this dark night of adversity our leader could pray such a prayer and in time restore faith and confidence in our government. And, perhaps, go down in history as one of our greatest men. He has monstrous obstacles to overcome and he must have help from the American people. This crisis is not a "first" in the history of this great country, nor will it be the last. The country may have been weakened, but under God we will survive.





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### **Alumni Association**

celebrates Fiftieth Anniversary

September 1973 marks the Golden Anniversary of the Olivet Alumni Association. Fifty years ago in September of 1923 the Association was organized.

A committee representing the departments of the college, then located at "Old" Olivet in Olivet, Illinois, was set up at Commencement time in 1923. This committee consisted of Carl McClain, representing the college; Albert Young, the Bible School department; Miss Ruth White, Fine Arts department; and James Floyd, the High School.

Under the chairmanship of Carl McClain, the committee drew up a tentative constitution and called for an alumni meeting in conjunction with the fall meeting of the Chicago Central District Assembly which convened at the college.

At this fall meeting the constitution was adopted and Rev. Ed Gallup, pastor of the Springfield, Illinois Church of the Nazarene was elected the first President.

The next fall, Prof. Carl McClain was elected president and served in this capacity until 1940. McClain, who as chairman of the organizing committee and as president during the formative years of the association, had a large part in establishing the association as a strong organization.

In 1941 Dr. S.D. Kelley was elected president followed by R.A. Carter (1942), Remiss Rehfeldt (1943), W.S. Purinton (1944), Harvey Galloway (1945), and Fred Hawk

In 1947 S.T. Ludwig was elected president and served in this position until 1951 when T.W. Willingham was elected to the presidency.

The Alumni Association minutes record Fred Reedy (1955) as the next president followed by Fred Chalfant (1956) who led the association as president until 1961 when the present president, Selden Dee Kelley, was elected.

The purpose of the Alumni Association as stated in the constitution is "to promote the interests of Olivet Nazarene College and to cultivate the spirit of fellowship among its alumni." This purpose is clearly reflected in the early project of the association, that of raising and granting student scholarships. The first scholarship was one of \$50. Other scholarships of \$50 and \$100 were granted in later years with members of the Board of Trustees and faculty, as well as alumni, making contributions.

Another project was the T.S. Greer Greenhouse which serves the Science Department and is located west of the Health Clinic near Brodien Power Plant. This was built in honor of an early alumnus and popular teacher at Olivet

In 1956 the association approved the "O" Awards which the association began presenting in 1957. The purpose of the award is "to recognize those alumni who have achieved success in their chosen fields of endeavor and reflect the ideals of the institution." Each year one award is given to an alumnus who is a minister and one is given to an alumnus of non-ministerial classification.

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
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Beta Remains Undefeated
